## FINAL DETERMINATION

THE Scientific Committee, established by the Threatened Species Conservation Act has made a Final Determination to list the Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion, as a CRITICALLY ENDANGERED ECOLOGICAL COMMUNITY in Part 2 of Schedule 1A of the Act. Listing of Critically Endangered Ecological Communities is provided for by Part 2 of the Act.

The Scientific Committee has found that:

1. Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion is the name given to the ecological community characterised by the species assemblage listed in paragraphs 2 and 5. In NSW all sites are within the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion (*sensu* Thackway and Creswell 1995).

2. Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion is characterised by the following assemblage of species:

3. The total species list of the community is larger than that given above, with many species present in only one or two sites or in low abundance. The species composition of a site will be influenced by the size of the site, recent rainfall or drought condition and by its disturbance (including fire) history. The number of species, and the above-ground relative abundance of species, will change with time since fire, and may also change in response to changes in fire regime

(including changes in fire frequency). At any one time, above ground individuals of some species may be absent, but the species may be represented below ground in the soil seed banks or as dormant structures such as bulbs, corms, rhizomes, rootstocks or lignotubers. The list of species given above is of vascular plant species, the community also includes micro-organisms, fungi, cryptogamic plants and a diverse fauna, both vertebrate and invertebrate. These components of the community are poorly documented.

4. Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion varies in structure from tall mallee woodland with an open to mid-dense shrub layer and ground cover (sparseness perhaps an artifact of grazing history), to open or very dense mallee shrubland, with or without Broombush. Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion varies between sites in the assemblage of species dominating the canopy layer. Three variants have been described (Benson 2008) as distinct communities, based largely on canopy composition and their tendency to occur on somewhat different landforms. These are 'ID 355: Bull Mallee – White Mallee tall mallee woodland on red sandy loam soils in the central western slopes of NSW'; 'ID 177: Blue Mallee – Bull Mallee – Green Mallee very tall mallee shrubland of the West Wyalong region, NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion', and 'ID 178: Broombush – Green Mallee – Blue Mallee very tall shrubland on stony rises in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion'. Benson noted however that these units do intergrade. Other data (D. Johnson 2004; S. Lewer 1998 data *in litt.*) suggests that the floristic composition of shrub layer and ground cover varies widely within, and overlaps between, the variants. Variability in the density and floristic composition of the shrub and ground layers may be partly a consequence of grazing history. The three Benson (2008) communities are all here regarded as variants included within, and as together comprising, Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion.
5. Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion typically has a canopy layer co-dominated by the mallee eucalypts *Eucalyptus behriana* (Bull Mallee) and *E. dumosa* (White Mallee), with either (on flat land) *E. socialis* (Red Mallee) or (on low rises) *E. polybractea* (Blue Mallee) and *E. viridis* (Green Mallee). More rarely, on higher rocky rises, the dominant species may be *E. polybractea* and either *E. viridis* or *E. dwyeri* with a tall shrub layer of *Melaleuca uncinata* (Broombush). Additional conspicuous tree species may include *E. dwyeri* (Dwyer's Red Gum), *Casuarina cristata* (Belah), *Callitris glaucophylla* (White Cypress Pine), and *Callitris endlicheri* (Black Cypress Pine). The shrub layer may vary strongly from site to site but typically includes *Acacia* species such as *A. hakeoides* (Hakea Wattle), *A. havilandiorum* (Havilands Wattle), *A. rhigiophylla* (Dagger-leaf Wattle), *A. rigens* (Nealie), *A. tetragonophylla* (Dead Finish) and *A. homalophylla* (Yarran); *Eremophila* species such as *E. deserti* (Turkeybush), *E. longifolia* (Berrigan, Emu Bush) and *E. sturtii* (Narrow-leaf Emu-bush, Turpentine Bush); *Melaleuca uncinata* (Broombush); *Alectryon oleifolius* subsp. *canescens* (Western Rosewood); *Dodonaea viscosa* subsp. *cuneata* (Wedge-leaf Hopbush); and *Myoporum montanum* (Western Boobialla). Ground cover is variable but includes daisies, small chenopods, *Sida corrugata*, *Cheilanthes* spp. (Rock Ferns) and a variety of other forb and grass species.
6. Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion may intergrade to a limited extent with the adjacent communities Inland Grey Box – White Cypress Pine woodland (ID 80 of Benson 2008), Belah Woodlands (ID 55), Yarran Tall Shrubland (ID 77), Dwyers Red Gum – Black Cypress Pine mallee (ID 186), Mugga Ironbark – Inland Grey Box (ID 127), and may occur near Green Mallee – Black Cypress Pine mallee woodland (ID 256).
7. Parts of Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion (the Bull Mallee – White Mallee variant) have been included in the Red Mallee Complex in Mid-Lachlan Regional Vegetation Committee (1999), and some remnants of it around West Wyalong were included as a component of map unit P1 by Sivertsen and Metcalfe (1995). Some other occurrences, of the Blue Mallee – Bull Mallee – Green Mallee variant, were partly mapped as a component of map unit H2 by Sivertsen and Metcalfe (1995). Benson (2008, *sub* ID 177) lists numerous other references.
8. Some other vegetation types occurring in the South Western Slopes Bioregion (*sensu* Thackway and Creswell 1995) contain mallee eucalypts, but are not considered to be part of Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion. These excluded vegetation types are those described by Benson (2008) as: 'ID 243: Mugga Ironbark – White Cypress Pine woodland on low rises mainly in the Cobar Peneplain Bioregion', in which White Mallee (*Eucalyptus dumosa*) and the mallee form of Dwyers Red Gum (*E. dwyeri*) are only a minor element; 'ID 217: Mugga Ironbark – Inland Grey Box – cypress pine tall woodland on footslopes of low hills in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion', in which Green Mallee (*Eucalyptus viridis*) and the mallee form of Dwyers Red Gum (*E. dwyeri*) are only a minor element; 'ID 173: Sandplain mallee of central NSW', which occurs on sandy soils and has Porcupine Grass (*Triodia scariosa*) in the ground layer; 'ID 193: Red Mallee – White Mallee extremely tall "tree mallee" on silty-loam-clay soils of central South Western NSW' in which Red Mallee (*Eucalyptus socialis*) is a major element and in which Bimbil Box (*Eucalyptus populnea* subsp. *bimbil*) and *E. intertexta* (Gum Coolibah) often occur; 'ID 186: Dwyers Red Gum – Black Cypress Pine – Currawang shrubby low woodland on rocky hills mainly in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion', in which Dwyers Red Gum (*Eucalyptus dwyeri*) and Black Cypress Pine (*Callitris endlicheri*) are co-dominant; and 'ID 176: Green Mallee – White Cypress Pine very tall mallee woodland on gravel rises mainly in the Cobar Peneplain Bioregion'. Benson (2008) also refers to 'ID 256: Green Mallee woodland on rises in sandstone forests of the southern Brigalow Belt South Bioregion' as occurring in the northern part of the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion, but has subsequently advised (J. Benson pers. comm. Nov. 2009) that this reference is erroneous; the community in any case can be differentiated from Mallee

and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion by the lack of mallee eucalypts other than Green Mallee (*Eucalyptus viridis*), the sandstone substrates, and a different suite of shrubs.

9. Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion mainly occurs on red loamy soils. The variant of the community dominated by Bull Mallee and White Mallee tends to occur on plains to the east and north of West Wyalong, on red earths including the aeolian soil known as parna. The variant dominated by Blue Mallee – Bull Mallee – Green Mallee tends to occur on low hills and rises in sandy loam soils over substrates including gravel ferricrete (ironstone) and mixed sedimentary, metamorphic and granitic substrates (Benson 2008). The third variant, Broombush – Green Mallee – Blue Mallee, occurs in loamy sands on rocky rises of sandstone and other sedimentary rock types, mainly to the south-west of West Wyalong (e.g. Buddigower Nature Reserve, The Charcoal Tank Nature Reserve).
10. Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion has been recorded from the local government areas of Bland and Temora, within the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion (*sensu* Thackway and Creswell 1995), but may occur elsewhere in the Bioregion.
11. Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion occurs mainly on private lands and roadside easements, and is poorly represented in conservation reserves. The Bull Mallee – White Mallee variant (ID 355 of Benson 2008) is not represented in any reserves. The Blue Mallee – Bull Mallee – Green Mallee variant (ID 177) occurs (Benson 2008) in Buddigower Nature Reserve and in Blue Mallee Forest Reserve. A stand of Blue Mallee in Big Bush Nature Reserve (Fleetwood 1987) has been tentatively assigned to this variant (Benson 2008), although J. Brickhill (*in litt.* 2008) does not consider that it has the characteristics of either ID 177 or 178. The Broombush – Green Mallee – Blue Mallee variant (ID 178) is recorded (Benson 2008) for Buddigower Nature Reserve, Blue Mallee Forest Reserve, and The Charcoal Tank Nature Reserve.
12. Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion has a very highly restricted distribution, with known occurrences falling within a region of less than 4000 km<sup>2</sup> bounded by Lake Cowal – Temora – Ardlethan – Ungarie. Estimation of the extent of occurrence within this region is difficult due to the lack of detailed mapping, but is probably of the order of 1 200 km<sup>2</sup>. An area of occupancy estimate of between 1 630 ha and 2970 ha, with a best estimate of 2 300 ha, can be derived from Benson's (2008) figures for current extent (comprising 100 ha +/- 10% of ID 355, 2 000 ha +/- 30% of ID 177, and 200 ha +/- 30% of ID 178). Using IUCN (2008) guidelines for calculating area of occupancy for species via a 2 x 2 km grid, this would imply a highly restricted AOO of less than 500 km<sup>2</sup>. Benson (2008) estimates the decline since settlement of ID 355 as more than 70% from a pre-European extent of 2 000 ha +/- 10%, the decline of ID 177 as more than 70% from a pre-European extent of 15 000 ha +/- 30%, and the decline of ID 178 as 75% from a pre-European extent of 800 ha +/- 30%.
13. Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion provides habitat for the following species listed under the Threatened Species Conservation Act 1995: Bush Stone-curlew (*Burhinus grallarius*) – Endangered; Malleefowl (*Leipoa ocellata*) – Endangered; Gilbert's Whistler (*Pachycephala inornata*) – Vulnerable; Shy Heathwren (*Hylacola cauta*) – Vulnerable; Southern Scrub-robin (*Drymodes brunneopygia*) – Vulnerable; and the herb Spiny Peppergrass (*Lepidium aschersonii*) – Vulnerable. The Malleefowl is also listed as Vulnerable under the Commonwealth Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999. Brickhill (*in litt.* 2008) reports that malleefowl have seriously declined in the variant of the community dominated by Broombush – Green Mallee – Blue Mallee, and relates reports from birdwatchers and bird-banders that the Shy Heathwren and Southern Scrub-robin are also in serious decline in the occurrence of this community in The Charcoal Tank Nature Reserve.
14. Current or potential threats to the Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion community include (Benson 2008; D. Johnston *in litt.* 2008; J. Brickhill *in litt.* 2008): clearing of remnants for agriculture and road and easement works, inappropriate fire regimes, deterioration of genetic health and loss of ecosystem function due to small patch size, weed invasion, grazing and browsing by domestic and feral herbivores, and (in the Broombush – Green Mallee – Blue Mallee variant) potential over-harvesting for eucalyptus oil production and cut broombush. D. Johnston (*in litt.* 2008) identifies additional threats at one roadside site, and potentially applying at others, as including rubbish dumping, firewood collection, changes in grazing management, continuous grazing, and herbicide spraying.

Past clearing activities have severely fragmented the community, creating patches with large edge-to-area ratios and reducing movement of animals and plant pollen and propagules. Fire regime (frequency, intensity and seasonality) may have profound effects on mallee vegetation types, and particular sequences of fire and subsequent wet or dry seasons may drive structure and floristics of mallee assemblages in very different and long-lasting directions (Bradstock 1989; Noble 1989; Wellington 1989; Cohn and Bradstock 2000). High fire frequency is likely to eliminate resprouting canopy species, exhausting their lignotubers; conversely, absence of fire may exhaust the long-lived soil seed bank of shrub and ground-cover species. 'High frequency fire resulting in the disruption of life cycle processes in plants and animals and loss of vegetation structure and composition' is listed as a Key Threatening Process under the Threatened Species Conservation Act 1995

Weed invasion may constitute a threat to the persistence of constituent species of the Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion community, and/or to elements of its ecological function. Benson (2008) reports low weed presence in the variant dominated

by Blue Mallee – Bull Mallee – Green Mallee, which occurs on higher ground, although D. Johnston (*in litt.* 2008) reports occurrence, at one site of this variant, of a low incidence of the introduced annual grasses *Aira caryophylla* (Silvery Hairgrass), *Vulpia muralis* (Rats-tail Fescue), *Lamarckia aurea* (Golden-Top), and the introduced perennial grass *Anthoxanthum odoratum* (Sweet Vernal Grass). Lewer (*in litt.* 1998) reports *Avena fatua* (Wild Oats), *Aira cupianna* (Silvery Hairgrass), and *Vulpia myuros* (Rat's Tail Fescue) for another site probably including transition zones to other communities. Data in Benson (2008, *sub* ID 355) and C. Bower (*in litt.* undated.) suggest markedly greater presence and cover of weeds in the variant dominated by Bull Mallee – White Mallee, which tends to occur on flatter ground near roads and agricultural land – weed species in this latter variant include *Lycium ferocissimum* (African Boxthorn), *Trifolium angustifolium* (Narrow-leaved Clover), *Trifolium campestre* (Hop Clover), *Lolium rigidum* (Wimmera Ryegrass), *Medicago polymorpha* (Burr Medic), *Kickxia elatine* subsp. *elatine* (Woolly Toadflax), *Spergularia rubra* (Red Sand-spurrey), and *Sonchus oleraceus* (Common Sowthistle). Much of the remnant Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion occurs as small patches, including along road verges, and in such situations may be expected to be more exposed and vulnerable to weed invasion.

15. Mallee and Mallee-Broombush dominated woodland and shrubland, lacking *Triodia*, in the NSW South Western Slopes Bioregion is eligible to be listed as a Critically Endangered Ecological Community as, in the opinion of the Scientific Committee, it is facing an extremely high risk of extinction in New South Wales in the immediate future, as determined in accordance with the following criteria as prescribed by the Threatened Species Conservation Regulation 2002:

Clause 27

The ecological community has undergone, is observed, estimated, inferred or reasonably suspected to have undergone or is likely to undergo within a time span appropriate to the life cycle and habitat characteristics of its component species:

- (a) A very large reduction in ecological function,  
as indicated by any of the following:
- (d) change in community structure,
  - (e) change in species composition,
  - (f) disruption of ecological processes,
  - (g) invasion and establishment of exotic species,
  - (h) degradation of habitat.
  - (i) fragmentation of habitat.

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## FINAL DETERMINATION

THE Scientific Committee, established by the Threatened Species Conservation Act has made a Final Determination to list the Marsh Club-rush sedgeland in the Darling Riverine Plains Bioregion, as a CRITICALLY ENDANGERED ECOLOGICAL COMMUNITY in Part 2 of Schedule 1A of the Act. Listing of Critically Endangered Ecological Communities is provided for by Part 2 of the Act.

The Scientific Committee has found that:

1. Marsh Club-rush sedgeland in the Darling Riverine Plains Bioregion is the name given to the ecological community characterised by the species assemblage listed in paragraph 2. The community typically forms dense stands to 2 m high in which trees are absent but structural characteristics of the community may vary, depending on the intensity and characteristics of past disturbances including grazing, fire and alteration of flow regimes.
2. Marsh Club-rush sedgeland in the Darling Riverine Plains Bioregion is characterised by the following assemblage of species:

3. The total species list of the community is larger than that given above, with some species present in only one or two sites or in low abundance. The species composition of a site will be influenced by the size of the site, recent rainfall or drought condition and by its disturbance history. The number of species, and the above ground relative abundance of species will change with time since flooding, and may also change in response to changes in flow regime (including changes in flooding frequency, depth and duration). At any one time, above ground individuals of some species may be absent, but the species may be represented below ground in the soil seed banks or as dormant structures such as bulbs, corms, rhizomes, rootstocks or lignotubers. The list of species given above is of vascular plant species; the community also includes micro-organisms, fungi, cryptogamic plants and a diverse fauna, both vertebrate and invertebrate. These components of the community are poorly documented.
4. Marsh Club-rush sedgeland is dominated by the Marsh Club-rush *Bolboschoenus fluviatilis* which forms dense stands up to 2 m tall with an understorey including *Carex appressa* (Tussock Sedge), *Eleocharis plana* (Ribbed Spike Rush), *Lachnagrostis filiformis* (Blown Grass), *Paspalum distichum* (Water Couch) and *Ranunculus undosus* (Swamp Buttercup) (Bowen *et al.* 2008). The ecological community is distinguished from other surrounding ecological communities by a combination of lack of trees and dominance of *Bolboschoenus fluviatilis* (Marsh Club-rush), generally over 40% of the vegetation cover is dominated by this species. Surrounding communities may include *Eucalyptus coolibah* (Coolibah) and *E. largiflorens* (Blackbox) woodlands, shrublands of *Acacia stenophylla* (River Coobah) and *Muehlenbeckia florulenta* (Lignum) or treeless communities dominated by *Paspalum distichum* (Water Couch), *Eleocharis plana* (Spike Rush), *Juncus aridicola* (Tussock Rush) or *Phragmites australis* (Common reed). *Bolboschoenus fluviatilis* is widespread in NSW and may occur as a component species in these surrounding communities and in a range of other wetland locations.
5. Marsh Club-rush sedgeland is associated with grey clay soils usually with a surface layer of organic matter several centimetres thick. The community has been described by Benson (2008) as ID 205 Marsh Club-rush very tall sedgeland of inland watercourses.
6. Marsh Club-rush sedgeland has been recorded in the Gwydir wetlands but may occur elsewhere in the Darling Riverine Plains Bioregion.
7. Marsh Club-rush sedgeland has a very highly restricted geographic distribution and an estimated area of occupancy of 8 km<sup>2</sup> based on 2 x 2 km grid cells, the scale of assessment recommended for species by IUCN (2008).
8. Floodplain wetland communities have undergone significant changes to their hydrological regimes as a result of river regulation (Kingsford 2000). The construction of large dams to utilise unpredictable river flows and facilitate the expansion of irrigated agriculture has altered the frequency, size and duration of floods, often reducing the connectivity between rivers and their floodplains (Boulton and Brock 1999). Within the Gwydir wetlands the cycles of floodplain wetting and drying have a major influence on the productivity of Marsh Club-rush sedgeland and the maintenance of flow regimes into these wetlands is essential for sustaining vegetation condition (Wilson *et al.* 2008). However, since regulation of flows to the Gwydir Wetlands began in 1972 and the development of Copeton Dam in 1976, there has been a decrease in available flows to the wetlands (Bowen and Simpson 2009; B Southern *in litt* 2010). A large proportion of the water that historically reached the wetlands of the Lower Gwydir Watercourse is now diverted for various purposes, such as irrigation and stock and domestic use. Bowen and Simpson (2009) note that the Lower Gwydir Wetlands have only received managed environmental releases and waters from a few larger floods in 1984, 1996, 1998, 2000, 2001 and 2004. 'Alteration to the natural flow regimes of rivers and streams and their floodplains and wetlands' is listed as a Key Threatening Process under the Threatened Species Conservation Act 1995.
9. Analysis of the distribution of the Marsh Club-rush sedgeland community in the Gwydir wetlands by Bowen *et al.* (2008) showed a decrease in geographic distribution from 317 ha in 1996 to 132 ha in 2005. Bowen and Simpson (2009) estimated an area of occupancy of 181 ha in 2008 which represents only 9% of the 1974 extent of the Marsh Club-rush sedgeland community. This indicates a very large reduction in the community's geographic distribution over the past 35 years, a time span appropriate to the life cycle and habitat characteristics of this community's component species. This magnitude of decline is consistent with local observations since the 1950's (B Southern *in litt*. 2010).

10. Grazing by livestock and changes to patterns of wetland inundation may accelerate the invasion of weeds into Marsh Club-rush sedgeland. Comparisons of grazed and ungrazed enclosure plots in the Gwydir wetlands showed lower cover of *Bolboschoenus fluviatilis* and increased abundance of *Cirsium vulgare* (Thistle) at grazed sites, indicating a significant change in both community structure and composition (Wilson *et al.* 2008). Similarly, Taylor and Ganf (2005) have highlighted the likely correlation between reduced grass canopy cover via grazing and proliferation of the floodplain weed, *Phyla canescens* (Lippia), in the northern Murray-Darling Basin. Particularly within the Gwydir wetlands, Bowen *et al.* (2008) have noted that Lippia invasion is one of the most important factors contributing to the overall loss of wetland vegetation.
11. Marsh Club-rush sedgeland in the Darling Riverine Plains Bioregion is eligible to be listed as a Critically Endangered Ecological Community as, in the opinion of the Scientific Committee, it is facing an extremely high risk of extinction in New South Wales in the immediate future, as determined in accordance with the following criteria as prescribed by the Threatened Species Conservation Regulation 2002:

The ecological community has undergone, is observed, estimated, inferred or reasonably suspected to have undergone or is likely to undergo within a time span appropriate to the life cycle and habitat characteristics of its component species:

- (a) a very large reduction in geographic distribution.

- (a) very highly restricted,

and the nature of its distribution makes it likely that the action of a threatening process could cause it to decline or degrade in extent or ecological function over a time span appropriate to the life cycle and habitat characteristics of the ecological community's component species.

The ecological community has undergone, is observed, estimated, inferred or reasonably suspected to have undergone or is likely to undergo within a time span appropriate to the life cycle and habitat characteristics of its component species:

- (a) a very large reduction in ecological function,

as indicated by any of the following:

 (f) disruption of ecological processes,  
 (g) invasion and establishment of exotic species,  
 (h) degradation of habitat,  
 (i) fragmentation of habitat.

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## FINAL DETERMINATION

THE Scientific Committee, established by the Threatened Species Conservation Act has made a Final Determination to list 'Porcupine Grass – Red Mallee – Gum Coolabah hummock grassland / low sparse woodland in the Broken Hill Complex Bioregion', as a CRITICALLY ENDANGERED ECOLOGICAL COMMUNITY in Part 2 of Schedule 1A of the Act. Listing of Critically Endangered Ecological Communities is provided for by Part 2 of the Act.

The Scientific Committee has found that:

1. Porcupine Grass – Red Mallee – Gum Coolabah hummock grassland / low sparse woodland in the Broken Hill Complex Bioregion is the name given to the ecological community characterised by the species assemblage listed in paragraph 2. In NSW all sites are within the Broken Hill Complex Bioregion *sensu* Thackway and Cresswell (1995). This community is fully congruent with Benson's (2008) 'ID 359: Porcupine Grass – Red Mallee – Gum Coolabah hummock grassland / low sparse woodland on metamorphic ranges on the Barrier Range, Broken Hill Complex Bioregion'.
2. Porcupine Grass – Red Mallee – Gum Coolabah hummock grassland / low sparse woodland in the Broken Hill Complex Bioregion is characterised by the following assemblage of species:

3. The total species list of the community is considerably larger than that given above, with many species present in only one or two sites or in low abundance. The species composition of a site will be influenced by the size of the site, recent rainfall or drought condition and by its disturbance (including fire) history. The number of species, and the above ground relative abundance of species will change with time since fire, and may also change in response to changes in fire regime (including changes in fire frequency). At any one time, above ground individuals of some species may be absent, but the species may be represented below ground in the soil seed banks or as dormant structures such as bulbs, corms, rhizomes, rootstocks or lignotubers. The list of species given above is of vascular plant species; the community also includes micro-organisms, fungi, cryptogamic plants and a diverse fauna, both vertebrate and invertebrate. These components of the community are poorly documented.
4. Porcupine Grass – Red Mallee – Gum Coolabah hummock grassland / low sparse woodland in the Broken Hill Complex Bioregion typically forms an open hummock grassland with or without a low sparse woodland canopy. This community is characterised by an unusual co-occurrence of Red Mallee (*Eucalyptus socialis*) and Gum Coolabah (*Eucalyptus intertexta*), growing as scattered trees in a landscape dominated by Porcupine Grass (*Triodia scariosa* subsp. *scariosa*) on rocky ranges. All three species, especially the eucalypts, are normally plants of plains or sand-dune country and rarely occur on rocky range substrates in NSW. Their presence on such ranges is likely to be a result of the aeolian soil layer. Shrubs are very sparse and include Mulga (*Acacia aneura sens lat.*), Prickly Wattle (*Acacia victoriae* subsp. *arida*), Dead Finish (*Acacia tetragonophylla*), Black Bluebush (*Maireana pyramidata*), Ruby Saltbush (*Enchylaena tomentosa*), Silver Cassia (*Senna artemisioides*) and Bladder Saltbush (*Atriplex vesicaria*). Ground cover additional to the *Triodia* includes Silver Tails (*Ptilotus obovatus* var. *obovatus*), Frosted Goosefoot (*Chenopodium desertorum*), *Sida petrophila*, Lemon Grass (*Cymbopogon ambiguous*), Thargomindah Nightshade (*Solanum sturtianum*), Rock Fern (*Cheilanthes sieberi* subsp. *sieberi*), Native Carrot (*Daucus glochidiatus*), Angular Saltbush (*Atriplex angulata*), Jointed Nineawn (*Enneapogon cylindricus*) and Limestone Copperburr (*Sclerolaena obliquicuspis*).
5. Porcupine Grass – Red Mallee – Gum Coolabah hummock grassland / low sparse woodland in the Broken Hill Complex Bioregion occurs (Benson 2008) on rocky hills in the Umberumberka Range section of the Barrier Range, north of Silverton, in the Unincorporated area. It occurs on thin red sandy loam soils of primarily aeolian origin, deposited (possibly during the last glacial maximum) over rocky outcrops of the Willyama complex, composed of Proterozoic gneiss, phyllite, schist, sandstone and slate. Fire is likely to be infrequent.
6. Porcupine Grass – Red Mallee – Gum Coolabah hummock grassland / low sparse woodland in the Broken Hill Complex Bioregion is not known to occur in any conservation reserves and is known only from leasehold lands. It occupies a total area estimated at 400 ha +/- 30% (Benson 2008; Sass *et al.* in press), in two main areas of about 300 ha and 200 ha, each with some natural fragmentation. Benson (2008) assesses this as a naturally very highly restricted community and estimates decline since European settlement as of the order of 20%.
7. Porcupine Grass – Red Mallee – Gum Coolabah hummock grassland / low sparse woodland in the Broken Hill Complex Bioregion is "possibly similar to [the South Australian] Floristic Group 9, *Eucalyptus socialis* open tree mallee, in Playfair and Robinson (1997) but the South Australian community lacks *Triodia*" (Benson 2008). It may grade into Bluebush and Saltbush communities on adjacent lower slopes and plains, and on higher ground into more

widespread hill Mulga communities such as Dead Finish – Mulga Shrubland (ID 123 of Benson 2008), and Curly Mallee open woodland (ID 169); the latter has a ground layer not dominated by *Triodia*.

8. Porcupine Grass – Red Mallee – Gum Coolabah hummock grassland / low sparse woodland in the Broken Hill Complex Bioregion is habitat for a reptile fauna that includes the Slender Mallee Blue Tongue Lizard (*Cyclodomorphus melanops elongatus*), the Marble-faced Delma (*Delma australis*), and the Tawny Crevice-dragon (*Ctenophorus decresii*), all listed as Endangered under the Threatened Species Conservation Act 1995. This ecological community represents an extension of habitat and range for the first two of these species, which were previously known only from *Triodia* vegetation on sandplain or sand-dune substrates (Sass *et al.* in press). It provides a similar extension of habitat for the widespread and *Triodia*-dependent Unbanded Delma (*Delma butleri*) which usually occurs on sandy substrates, and the local population of this species is thought to be disjunct from the nearest occurrence, at Coombah Station, by about 140 km (Sass *et al.* in press). The region in which this ecological community occurs is also known habitat for a number of listed threatened mammal and bird species (NGH Environmental 2008), but their utilisation of this specific community is not yet documented.
9. Porcupine Grass – Red Mallee – Gum Coolabah hummock grassland / low sparse woodland in the Broken Hill Complex Bioregion may have undergone past disturbance including cutting of trees for use in fencing and local towns and mines. Porcupine Grass (*Triodia*) is likely to be a crucial component of ecological function for this community, and also an important element in retaining the thin aeolian soil layer; any processes leading to widespread loss of Porcupine Grass hummocks or loss of soil or changes in soil nutrient fluxes, are likely to be a significant threat to the community as a whole. Significant areas of die-off of *Triodia* and of tree species were noted in 2009 during severe drought (J. Benson, Sass *et al.* in press; NGH Environmental 2008), with no evidence of recent regeneration of tree species (Sass *et al.* in press). The community is threatened by continuing grazing and browsing by feral goats, with this identified as a likely major contributing reason for the lack of apparent recruitment of the tree and shrub species (Benson 2008; Sass *et al.* in press). Goats also threaten particular crevice-sheltering reptiles, such as the Tawny Crevice-dragon, through the filling of rock crevices with goat scats (Sass *et al.* in press). ‘Competition and habitat degradation by Feral Goats, *Capra hircus* Linnaeus 1758’ is listed as a Key Threatening Process under the Threatened Species Conservation Act 1995. Browsing by domestic stock, including newly adopted breeds of sheep with a propensity for browsing such as dorpas and damaras (J. Pickard *in litt.* April 2008), is a potential threatening factor for the community. A potential threat, now much reduced (J. Benson pers. comm. Nov. 2009), was proposed works associated with a wind farm (Silverton Windfarm Developments 2008; NGH Environmental 2008). Construction and maintenance of remaining works will however have some direct impact, and there is a risk that roads and construction sites will act as colonisation routes for weeds (J. Pickard *in litt.* 2008) and possibly feral animals. Reduced rainfall and higher temperatures and evaporative rates associated with climate change may affect the community; ‘Anthropogenic Climate Change’ is listed as a Key Threatening Process under the Threatened Species Conservation Act 1995. The community has a low incidence of weeds as yet, with only the aggressive perennial weed Rosy Dock (*Acetosa vesicaria*) recorded by Benson (2008), but NGH Environmental (2008) notes the presence in the community of the introduced Winged Sea Lavender (*Limonium lobatum*), Common Sow-thistle (*Sonchus oleraceus*), and Wards Weed (*Carrichtera annua*), and the occurrence in nearby communities of a range of potentially significant weeds including the Sea Lavender, African Boxthorn (*Lycium ferocissimum*), and the introduced annual grasses Roughtail (*Rostraria pumila*), and Arabian Grass (*Schismus barbatus*).
10. Porcupine Grass – Red Mallee – Gum Coolabah hummock grassland / low sparse woodland in the Broken Hill Complex Bioregion is eligible to be listed as a Critically Endangered Ecological Community as, in the opinion of the Scientific Committee, it is facing an extremely high risk of extinction in New South Wales in the immediate future, as determined in accordance with the following criteria as prescribed by the Threatened Species Conservation Regulation 2002:

Clause 26

The ecological community’s geographic distribution is estimated or inferred to be:

- (a) very highly restricted,

and the nature of its distribution makes it likely that the action of a threatening process could cause it to decline or degrade in extent or ecological function over a time span appropriate to the life cycle and habitat characteristics of the ecological community’s component species.







- (b) complies with the mass and dimension limits prescribed in the Road Transport (Mass, Loading and Access) Regulation) 2005.

**2.2** This Notice does not apply to a:

- (a) AB-Triple; or
- (b) BA-Triple; or
- (c) B-Triple; or
- (d) BB-Quad; or
- (e) AB-Quad; or
- (f) ABB-Quad; or
- (g) AAB Quad; or

Note: The vehicles described in Clause 2.2 may only be operated in accordance with a specific permit issued by the RTA Special Permits Unit.

**Part 3 – Operating and travel requirements****3.1 Operating requirements**

3.1.1 A copy of this Notice, **excluding Appendix 1** must be carried in the driving compartment whenever the vehicle is operating as a road train under this Notice, and must be produced when requested to do so by a police officer or an authorised person.

3.1.2 All requirements and conditions of this Notice are to be observed when a vehicle is operating as a road train under this Notice.

**3.2 Approved road train routes**

3.2.1 Road trains operating under this Notice, with an overall length not exceeding 36.5 metres, may operate on the approved routes listed in Part 1 of Appendix 1, and must observe any travel conditions which applies to an approved route.

1.4.2 Except where a contrary intention is indicated, a note in the text of this Notice do not form part of this Notice.

**PART 2 – APPLICATION AND DIMENSIONS**

- 2.1** This Notice applies to a combine harvester towing a comb trailer and an air compressor trailer (coupled in that order only) where a dimension limit for the combine harvester, comb trailer, air compressor trailer or combination exceeds a dimension limit specified in clauses 71 and 74 (1) (d) of Schedule 2 to the Road Transport (Vehicle Registration) Regulation 2007 or the dimension limits specified in Schedule 1 and clause 24 of Schedule 2 to the Road Transport (Mass, Loading and Access) Regulation 2005, but does not exceed a dimension specified in Table 1 to this Notice.
- 2.2** This Notice applies provided that a vehicle, of the kind described in 2.1, is operated in accordance with the relevant provisions of the General Class 1 Oversize (Agricultural Vehicle) Notice 2007.

**PART 3 – OPERATING AND TRAVEL REQUIREMENTS****3.1 Operating requirements**

**3.2 Travel zones**

This Notice remains in force up to and including 30 September 2015 unless it is amended or repealed earlier.

**1.4 Interpretations**

Unless otherwise defined in Part 5 of this Notice, the words and expressions used in this Notice have the same meanings as those defined within the Road Transport (General) Act 2005

**PART 2 – APPLICATION****2.1 This Notice applies to a vehicle that:**

- 2.1.1 Was first registered prior to 1 July 2006; and
- 2.1.2 has subsequently been fitted with a:
  - (i) Fall Arrester Safety System; or
  - (ii) Mechanical Tarping System.

**PART 3 – OPERATING AND TRAVEL CONDITIONS****3.1 Operating conditions**

- 3.1.1 Unless stated otherwise by this Notice, a vehicle fitted with driver safety harness or mechanical tarping system operating under this notice must comply with the provisions of the road transport legislation as defined by section 5 of the Road Transport (General) Act 2005.
- 3.1.2 A copy of this Notice, must be carried in the driving compartment and must be produced in response to a request by a police officer or an Authorised Officer.

**PART 4 – DIMENSION LIMITS**

- 4.1 The maximum width of the vehicle including any part of the Fall Arrester Safety System or Mechanical Tarping System referred to in Part 2 must not exceed 2.60 metres.
- 4.2 The maximum width of the vehicle excluding any part of the Fall Arrester Safety System or Mechanical Tarping System referred to in Part 2 must not exceed 2.50 metres.
- 4.3 The Fall Arrester Safety System or Mechanical Tarping System must not protrude by more than 50mm on either side of the vehicle.
- 4.4 Any part of the vehicle that is wider than 2.50 metres must be more than 2.0 metres from the ground.
- 4.5 A mechanical arm used to wind a tarp in or out must be folded to either the front or rear of the vehicle body only.

**PART 5 – DEFINITIONS**

“*Fall Arrester Safety System*” means a device fitted to the side of a vehicle designed to transport livestock, which is designed to prevent the risk of falling from the top or side of the vehicle.

“*Mechanical Tarping System*” means a device fitted to the rear of the vehicle that is designed to cover the vehicle load with a tarp without requiring a person to climb to the top of the vehicle.

**PART 1 – PRELIMINARY****1.1 Citation**

This notice may be cited as the Class 2 Controlled Access Bus Notice 2010.

**1.2 Commencement**

This Notice takes effect on 1 October 2010.

**1.3 Effect**

This notice remains in force up to and including 30 September 2015 unless it is amended or repealed earlier.

**1.4 Interpretation**

1.4.1 Unless stated otherwise by this Notice, the words and expressions of this Notice have the same meaning as those defined in the Road Transport (General) Act 2005.

1.4.2 Unless a contrary intention is indicated, the notes in the text of this Notice do not form part of this Notice.

**PART 2 – APPLICATION****2.1 This Notice applies to a Controlled Access Bus that exceeds 12.5 metres , but does not exceed 14.5 metres, in length.**

Note: A passenger ‘coach’ is regarded as a bus. The rear overhang of a Controlled Access Bus must not exceed 70% of the distance between the centre of the foremost axle and the foremost extremity of the rear overhang or 4.9 metres, whichever is the shorter length.

**PART 3 – OPERATING AND TRAVEL CONDITIONS****3.1 Operating Conditions**

3.1.1 A copy of this Notice, must be carried in the vehicle whenever operating as controlled access bus and must be produced in response to a request by a police officer or an authorised officer.

3.1.2 All requirements and conditions of this Notice must be observed when a vehicle is operating as a controlled access bus to which this Notice applies.

3.1.3 Except where contrary intention is stated by this Notice, a vehicle operating as a controlled access bus under this notice, must comply with the statutory requirements of road transport legislation as defined in section 5 of the Road Transport (General) Act 2005.

**3.2 Travel Conditions****3.2.1 Approved Routes**

(a) A Controlled Access Bus may travel on any road if it can operate in accordance with the “Route Assessment for 14.5 metre buses manual”.

(b) A Controlled Access Bus may travel on any of the roads listed as “Routes suitable for Controlled Access Buses” in the Appendix A of this Notice.

**3.2.2 Where a Controlled Access Bus may not travel**

(a) A Controlled Access Bus may not travel on a road, bridge, causeway or ferry where there is a load limit specified by a sign or notice.

(b) A Controlled Access Bus may not travel on any road specified as “not suitable for Controlled Access Buses” in Appendix B of this Notice.

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**SCHEDULE****Explanatory Note:**

This Notice replaces the 26-metre B-Double Exemption Notice 2005, that was published in Government Gazette No. 142 at pages 9793 to 9795 on 25 November 2005 and subsequently amended from time to time.

**PART 1 – PRELIMINARY****1.1 Citation**

This Notice may be cited as the Class 3 26-metre B-Double Exemption Notice 2010.

**1.2 Commencement**

This Notice takes effect on 1 October 2010.

**1.3 Effect**

This Notice remains in force up to and including 30 September 2015 unless it is amended or repealed earlier.

**1.4 Interpretation**

1.4.1 Unless stated otherwise in Part 5 of this Notice, the words and expressions used in this Notice have the same meaning as those defined in Road Transport (General) Act 2005.

1.4.2 Except where a contrary intention is indicated, the index and notes in the text of this Notice do not form part of this Notice.

**PART 2 – APPLICATION****2.1 Application**

2.1.1 This Notice applies to a B-Double where the combination exceeds the dimension limit specified in clause 74(1) (a) of Schedule 2 to the Road Transport (Vehicle Registration) Regulation 2007, but does not exceed 26-metres.

2.1.2 This Notice applies provided that the combination, of the kind described in 2.1.1, is operated in accordance with the provisions of Part 3 – Operating and Travel Requirements.

Note: This notice applies to B-Doubles longer than 25-metres that comply with the requirements of this Notice. B-Doubles carrying loads of livestock or motor vehicles are permitted to operate at 26 metres. However, this Notice does not provide an exemption from the dimension limit in Clause 74(1)(c) [dimension of car carriers] or Clause 74(2) [dimension of trailer sets of B-Doubles carrying cattle, sheep, pigs or horses which limits the deck length] of Schedule 2 to the Road Transport (Vehicle Registration) Regulation 2007.

**PART 3 – OPERATING AND TRAVEL CONDITIONS****3.1 Operating Conditions**

3.1.1 All requirements and conditions of this Notice are to be observed when a vehicle is operating as a B-Double pursuant to this Notice.

3.1.2 All requirements of the Class 2 B-Double Notice 2010 must be complied with unless the requirement is inconsistent with a provision of this Notice, in which case this Notice prevails.

3.1.3 Except where a contrary intention is stated by this Notice, a vehicle operating under this Notice must comply with the statutory requirements of the road transport legislation as defined by section 5 of the Road Transport (General) Act 2005.

3.1.4 A copy of this Notice, must be carried in the driving compartment, and must be produced in response to a request by a police officer or an authorised officer.

**3.2 Travel Conditions**

3.2.1 A B-Double operating under this notice may only be driven or stood on routes approved for:

- a) 25-metre B-doubles under the Class 2 B-Double Notice 2010.
- b) Road trains under the Class 2 Road Train Notice 2010.

## PART 4 – SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS

**4.1 Dimensions**

4.1.1 The laden or unladen dimensions of a B-Double (including any fittings) must not exceed 26 metres and the distance from centreline of the king-pin of the first trailer to the rear of the combination must not exceed 20.6 metres.

Note: A B-Double may not comprise of a semi-trailer where the distance from the king-pin to the rear of that trailer exceeds 12.3 metres.

**4.2 Front Under-run Protection Systems**

4.2.1 The prime mover must:

- a) be a Front Under-run Protection Vehicle, which is fitted with an Approval Plate that is affixed on the vehicle cabin and in the proximity of the vehicle's CPA (Compliance) plate/label. The approval plate must be clearly visible to, and readable by, a Police Officer or an Authorised Officer; or
- b) be fitted with a Front Under-run Protection Device which is fitted with an Approval Plate that is clearly visible to, and readable by, a Police Officer or an Authorised Officer.

4.2.2 Any protrusion fitted to the front of a prime mover, must be fitted with an Approval Plate, that is clearly visible to, and readable by, a Police Officer or an Authorised Officer. The Approval Plate must stipulate either that the protrusion is a Front Under-run Protection Device as outlined in 4.2.1 (b) or that the fitted protrusion does not negate the prime mover's compliance with 4.2.1.

Note: Protrusions covered by 4.2.2 are fittings such as 'Bull-bars', 'Roo-bars', 'Nudge-bars' 'Cow-catchers' etc. It does not include driving lights, fog lights, 'running' lights, aerials etc (see clause 2 of Schedule 2 of the Road Transport (Mass, Loading and Access) Regulation 2005).

To comply with 4.2 all vehicles will require an approval plate on their protrusion. Some vehicles may require two approval plates – one on the protrusion and one on the cab of the vehicle.

**4.3 Cabin strength**

4.3.1 The prime mover must comply with Regulation No. 29 made under the UN ECE Agreement (UN ECE R29) for cabin strength.

4.3.2 A vehicle complying with Clause 4.3.1 must be fitted with an Approval Plate that is affixed on the vehicle cabin and in the proximity of the vehicle CPA (Compliance) plate/label. The approval plate must be clearly visible to, and readable by, a Police Officer or an Authorised Officer.

**4.4 Prime mover must not have a load carrying area**

4.4.1 The prime mover must not have a load carrying area.

4.4.2 For the purposes of Clause 4.4.1, a load does not include:

- a) the driver or passengers or personal items of the driver or passengers;
- b) fuel, water, lubricants, and readily removable equipment carried on or in the vehicle that is required for its normal operation.

## PART 5 DEFINITIONS

"Approval Plate" means a decal, label or plate issued by a Competent Entity that is made of a material and fixed in such a way that they cannot be removed without being damaged or destroyed and that contains the following information:

- For vehicles complying with Clause 4.2, the Trade name or mark of the Front Under-run Protection Vehicle or Front Under-run Protection Device;
- For vehicles complying with Clause 4.2, the manufacturer of the Front Under-run Protection Vehicle or Front Under-run Protection Device;
- For vehicles complying with Clause 4.2.1 (b), the make of the vehicle or vehicles the component or device has been designed and certified to fit;
- For vehicles complying with Clause 4.2.1 (b), the model or models of vehicle the component or device has been designed and certified to fit;
- For vehicles complying with Clause 4.3, the vehicle manufacturer's name;
- Competent Entity unique identification number;
- Approval Plates relating to 4.2.1 (b) and 4.2.2 must include the Approval Number issued by the Competent Entity; and
- Purposes of the approval i.e. approval for a Front Under-run Protection Device, and/or for a Front Under-run Protection Vehicle (UN ECE 93) or for Cab Strength (UN ECE 29).
- Approval Plates relating to Clause 4.2.1 (b) shall bear the words "UN ECE R93 FUPD" or other words or markings with a clearly equivalent meaning.
- Approval Plates relating to Clause 4.2.2 must bear the words "UN ECE R93 FUP Compatible" or other words or markings with a clearly equivalent meaning.

- Approval Plates relating to either Clause 4.2.1(b) and 4.2.2 may include both the words “UN ECE R93 FUPD” and “UN ECE R93 FUP Compatible” or other words or markings with a clearly equivalent meaning. Each statement must be annotated or marked, such as with either a “Yes” or “XXX”, so as to clearly and unambiguously signify upon the Plate which statement is applicable (A FUP compatible device is one that complies with Clause 3.2.2).
- Approval Plates relating to Clause 4.3 must include the statement “This vehicle was manufactured to conform with the Cab Strength requirements of UN ECE R29” or words with an equivalent meaning.

“Competent Entity” means a person or organisation appointed by an Australian Authority, and issued with a unique identification number, with the power to certify that the UN ECE requirements for Front Under-run Protection and Cabin Strength have been met, and continue to be met, and who may authorise the fixing of appropriate Approval Plates to a Front Under-run Protection Device or a Front Under-run Protection Vehicle.

A Compliance Plate Approval (CPA) holding heavy vehicle manufacturer is deemed to be a Competent Entity.

A Competent Entity, that is not a CPA holding manufacturer, is only approved to inspect and certify those vehicles that are registered in the same jurisdiction as the Competent Entity’s place of business.

“*Front Under-run Protection Device*” means a device fitted to a prime mover:

- That complies with UN ECE Regulation No. 93 and meets all of the requirements set out in section 6 “Requirement For FUPDs” of Part I and section 8 “Requirements for Installation of an Approved FUPD” of Part II of those regulations,
  - Where compliance with the performance requirements of UN ECE Regulation No. 93 was established by laboratory testing carried out in accordance with the procedures set out in Annex 5 of UN ECE Regulation No. 93, and
  - That was tested using the Test Conditions set out in section 1 and the Test Procedure set out in section 3 of Annex 5 of the Guidelines for Implementing Front Underrun Protection and Cab Strength Requirements published by the National Transport Commission (NTC). (Simulation of the test procedure by calculation or other such method as provided for in section 1.3 of Annex 5 is not available under the NTC Guideline, except with the specific approval of the Authority or when approval has been granted using an “E-mark” issued pursuant to Annex 4 of UN ECE Regulation No. 93).
- or
- Complies with ADR 84 – Front Underun Impact Protection.

“*Front Under-run Protection Vehicle*” means a vehicle:

- that complies with UN ECE Regulation No.93 (UN ECE R93) because it is designed and constructed so that it meets all of the requirements of section 10 “Requirements for a vehicle with FUP” of Part III of those regulations.
- or
- Complies with ADR 84 – Front Underun Impact Protection.

This Notice may be cited as the Class 3 Single Steer Axle Mass Limit Exemption Notice 2010.

**1.2 Commencement**

This Notice takes effect on 1 October 2010.

**1.3 Effect**

This Notice remains in force up to and including 30 September 2015 unless it is amended or repealed earlier.

**1.4 Interpretation**

1.4.1 Unless stated otherwise in Part 5 of this Notice, the words and expressions used in this Notice have the same meaning as those defined in the Road Transport (General) Act 2005.

1.4.2 Except where a contrary intention is indicated, notes in the text of this Notice do not form part of this Notice.

**PART 2 – APPLICATION**

2.1.1 This Notice applies to vehicles,

- a) That are not operating under a Permit or Notice made under the Regulation or the Act; or
- b) Are operating under a Permit or Notice made under Divisions 4, 5 or 7 of Part 2 of the Regulation; or
- c) Are operating under an Excess Weight Permit;
- d) With a manufacturer's Gross Vehicle Mass (GVM) of 15 tonnes or more; and
- e) With a single steer axle mass that exceeds the limit for a motor vehicle other than a complying bus specified in Table 1 of Schedule 1 to the Regulation, but does not exceed the single steer axle mass limit in Part 3; and
- f) With a steer axle with a manufacturer's rating of at least 6.5 tonnes; and
- g) Which comply with Front Under-run Protection Device requirements in Part 3; and
- h) Which comply with cabin strength requirements in Part 3; and
- i) Which comply with Australian Design Rule (ADR) 80/01, 80/02 or 80/03 requirements in Part 4.

2.1.2 This Notice does not apply to a complying bus.

**PART 3 – OPERATION AND TRAVEL CONDITIONS****3.1 Operating conditions**

3.1.1 A copy of this Notice, must be carried in the driving compartment of a vehicle and must be produced in response to a request by a Police Officer or Authorised Officer.

3.1.2 All conditions of this Notice are to be observed when a vehicle is operating under this Notice.

3.1.3 Unless a contrary intention is stated by this Notice, a vehicle operating under this Notice must comply with all statutory requirements of the road transport legislation as defined by section 5 of the Road Transport (General) Act 2005.

3.1.4 Without limiting 3.1.3, any other operating conditions applicable to a vehicle (or combination of which the vehicle forms a part) operating under another notice or permit made under the Road Transport (Mass, Loading and Access) Regulation 2005 or an excess weight permit made under the Road Transport (General) Act are not affected by this Notice, other than to permit the additional single steer axle mass allowable under Part 4 of this Notice.

## PART 4 – SPECIAL CONDITIONS

**4.1 Mass Limits**

- 4.1.1 The single steer axle mass of a vehicle to which this Notice applies may exceed the 6-tonne single steer axle mass limit for a motor vehicle other than a complying bus specified in Table 1, Clause 2 of Schedule 1 of the Road Transport (Mass, Loading and Access) Regulation 2005 by up to 500kg.
- 4.1.2 The additional mass permitted under Clause 4.1.1 is additional to the total mass limit allowable for that vehicle (or combination of which the vehicle forms a part) under the Road Transport (Mass, Loading and Access) Regulation 2005 or a Notice or permit made under Divisions 4, 5 or 7 of Part 2 of the Road Transport (Mass, Loading and Access) Regulation 2005 or an Excess Weight Permit.

**4.2 Front Underrun Protective Devices**

- 4.2.1 The vehicle must:
- a) be a Front Under-run Protection Device, which is fitted with an Approval Plate that is affixed on the vehicle cabin and in the proximity of the vehicle's CPA (Compliance) plate/label. The Approval Plate must be clearly visible to, and readable by, a Police Officer or an Authorised Officer; or
  - b) be fitted with a Front Under-run Protection Device which is fitted with an Approval Plate that is clearly visible to, and readable by, a Police Officer or an Authorised Officer.
- 4.2.2 Any protrusion fitted to the front of a vehicle, must be fitted with an Approval Plate, that is clearly visible to, and readable by, a Police Officer or an Authorised Officer. The Approval Plate must stipulate either that the protrusion is a Front Under-run Protection Device as outlined in 4.2.1 (b) or that the fitted protrusion does not negate the vehicle's compliance with 4.2.1.

Note: Protrusions covered by 4.2.2 are fittings such as 'Bull-bars', 'Roo-bars', 'Nudge-bars' 'Cow-catchers' etc. It does not include driving lights, fog lights, 'running' lights, aerials etc. To comply with 3.2 all vehicles will require an approval plate on their protrusion. Some vehicles may require two approval plates – one on the protrusion and one on the cab of the vehicle.

**4.3 Cabin strength**

- 4.3.1 The vehicle must comply with Regulation No. 29 made under the UN ECE Agreement (UN ECE R29) for cabin strength.
- 4.3.2 A vehicle complying with Clause 4.3.1 must be fitted with an Approval Plate that is affixed on the vehicle cabin and in the proximity of the vehicle CPA (Compliance) plate/label. The Approval Plate must be clearly visible to, and readable by, a Police Officer or an Authorised Officer.

**4.4 Australian Design Rule (ADR) 80/01, 02 or 03- verification**

- 4.4.1 A vehicle operating under this Notice must comply with:
- a) ADR 80/01 or
  - b) ADR 80/02, or
  - c) ADR 80/03.
- 4.4.2 For the purposes of this Notice a vehicle fitted with a Compliance Plate dated January 2008 or later, is deemed to comply with ADR 80/01
- 4.4.3 For all other vehicles, compliance with ADR 80/01, ADR 80/02 or ADR 80/03 must be verified by either:
- a) An Approval Plate that is affixed on the vehicle cabin and in the proximity of the vehicle CPA (Compliance) plate/label. The Approval Plate must be clearly visible to, and readable by, a Police Officer or an Authorised Officer;
- or
- b) An original letter from the manufacturer of the vehicle that is carried in the cabin of the vehicle.
- 4.4.4 A letter referred to in Clause 4.4.2 must:
- a) Declare that the manufacturer holds an Compliance Plate Approval (CPA) from the Australian Government;
  - b) Identify the make, model and Vehicle Identification Number (VIN) of the vehicle; and
  - c) State that the vehicle was supplied into the market fully compliant with Australian Design Rule 80/01, 80/01, 80/02 or ADR 80/03.

A Compliance Plate Approval (CPA) holding heavy vehicle manufacturer is deemed to be a Competent Entity.

A Competent Entity, that is not a CPA holding manufacturer, is only approved to inspect and certify those vehicles that are registered in the same jurisdiction as the Competent Entity's place of business.

With respect to ADR80/01, ADR 80/02 and ADR 80/03, a Competent Entity is a Compliance Plate Approval (CPA) holding heavy vehicle manufacturer.

"Excess Weight Permit" means a permit issued under section 27 of the Act.

"Front Under-run Protection Device" means a device fitted to a prime mover:

- That complies with UN ECE Regulation No. 93 and meets all of the requirements set out in section 6 "Requirement For FUPDs" of Part I and section 8 "Requirements for Installation of an Approved FUPD" of Part II of those regulations,
- Where compliance with the performance requirements of UN ECE Regulation No. 93 was established by laboratory testing carried out in accordance with the procedures set out in Annex 5 of UN ECE Regulation No. 93, and
- That was tested using the Test Conditions set out in section 1 and the Test Procedure set out in section 3 of Annex 5 of the Guidelines for Implementing Front Underrun Protection and Cab Strength Requirements published by the National Transport Commission (NTC). **PART 1 – PRELIMINARY****1.1 Citation**

This Notice may be cited as the Class 1 Single Steer Axle Mass Limit Exemption Notice 2010.

**1.2 Commencement**

This Notice takes effect on 1 October 2010.

**1.3 Effect**

This Notice remains in force up to and including 30 September 2015 unless it is amended or repealed earlier.

**1.4 Interpretation**

1.4.1 Unless stated otherwise in Part 5 of this Notice, the words and expressions used in this Notice have the same meaning as defined in the Road Transport (General) Act 2005.

1.4.2 Except where a contrary intention is indicated, notes in the text of this Notice do not form part of this Notice.

**PART 2 – APPLICATION****2.1 Application**

2.1.1 This Notice applies to vehicles that are operating under a Permit or Notice made under Division 3 of Part 2 of the Regulations; and

- a) have a manufacturer's Gross Vehicle Mass (GVM) of 15 tonnes or more; and
- b) have a single steer axle mass that exceeds the limit for a motor vehicle other than a complying bus specified in Table 1 of Schedule 1 to the Regulation, but does not exceed the single steer axle mass limit in Part 3; and
- c) have a steer axle with a manufacturer's rating of at least 6.5 tonnes; and
- d) comply with Front Under-run Protection Systems requirements in Clause 4.2; and
- e) comply with cabin strength requirements in Clause 4.3; and
- f) Which comply with Australian Design Rule (ADR) 80/01, 80/02 or 80/03 requirements in Clause 4.4.

Note: This Notice applies to Class 1 restricted access vehicles that meet the operating conditions set out in this Notice.

**PART 3 – OPERATING REQUIREMENTS****3.1 Affect on other operating conditions**

3.1.1 For a vehicle to which this Notice applies, any other operating conditions applicable to that vehicle (or combination of which the vehicle forms a part) under a Notice or permit made under Divisions 3 of Part 2 of the Regulation, are not affected by this Notice other than to permit the additional single steer axle mass allowable under this Part.

3.1.2 A copy of this Notice, must be carried in the driving compartment whenever operating a vehicle under this Notice, and must be produced in response to a request by a policy officer or an authorised officer.

**PART 4 – SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS****4.1 Mass Limits**

4.1.1. The single steer axle mass of a vehicle to which this Notice applies may exceed the 6-tonne single steer axle mass limit for a motor vehicle other than a complying bus specified in Table 1, Clause 2 of Schedule 1 of the Road Transport (Mass, Loading and Access) Regulation 2005 by up to 500kg.

4.1.2 The additional mass permitted under Clause 4.1.1 is additional to the total mass limit allowable for that vehicle (or combination of which the vehicle forms a part) under the Regulation or a Notice or permit made under

Division 3 of Part 2 of the Road Transport (Mass, Loading and Access) Regulation 2005 or an Excess Weight Permit.

Note: This Notice does not, provide an exemption from the mass limit set be Clause 12(3) of Schedule 2 to the Road Transport (Mass, Loading and Access) Regulation 2005. An Excess Weight Permit issued under section 27 of the Road Transport (General) Act 2005 is required.

#### 4.2 Front Under-run Protection Systems

4.2.1 The vehicle must:

- a) be a Front Under-run Protection Vehicle, which is fitted with an Approval Plate that is affixed on the vehicle cabin and in the proximity of the vehicle's CPA (Compliance) plate/label. The approval plate must be clearly visible to, and readable by, a Police Officer or an Authorised Officer; or
- b) be fitted with a Front Under-run Protection Device which is fitted with an Approval Plate that is clearly visible to, and readable by, a Police Officer or an Authorised Officer.

4.2.2 Any protrusion fitted to the front of a vehicle, must be fitted with an Approval Plate, that is clearly visible to, and readable by, a Police Officer or an Authorised Officer. The Approval Plate must stipulate either that the protrusion is a Front Under-run Protection Device as outlined in 4.2.1 (b) or that the fitted protrusion does not negate the vehicle's compliance with 4.2.1.

Note: Protrusions covered by 4.2.2 are fittings such as 'Bull-bars', 'Roo-bars', 'Nudge-bars' 'Cow-catchers' etc. It does not include driving lights, fog lights, 'running' lights, aerials etc. To comply with 4.2 all vehicles will require an approval plate on their protrusion. Some vehicles may require two approval plates – one on the protrusion and one on the cab of the vehicle.

#### 4.3 Cabin strength

4.3.1 The vehicle must comply with Regulation No. 29 made under the UN ECE Agreement (UN ECE R29) for cabin strength

4.3.2 A vehicle complying with Clause 4.3.1 must be fitted with an Approval Plate that is affixed on the vehicle cabin and in the proximity of the vehicle CPA (Compliance) plate/label. The approval plate must be clearly visible to, and readable by, a Police Officer or an Authorised Officer.

#### 4.4 Australian Design Rule (ADR) 80/01, 02 or 03- verification

4.4.1 A vehicle operating under this Notice must comply with:

- (a) ADR 80/01 or
- (b) ADR 80/02, or
- (c) ADR 80/03.

4.4.2 For the purposes of this Notice a vehicle fitted with a Compliance Plate dated January 2008 or later, is deemed to comply with ADR 80/01.

4.4.3 For all other vehicles, compliance with ADR 80/01, ADR 80/02 or ADR 80/03 must be verified by either:

- a) An Approval Plate that is affixed on the vehicle cabin and in the proximity of the vehicle CPA (Compliance) plate/label. The Approval Plate must be easily accessible to, and readable by, a Police Officer or an Authorised Officer; or
- b) An original letter from the manufacturer of the vehicle that is carried in the cabin of the vehicle.

4.4.3 A letter referred to in Clause 4.4.2 must:

- a) Declare that the manufacturer holds an Compliance Plate Approval (CPA) from the Australian Government;
- b) Identify the make, model and Vehicle Identification Number (VIN) of the vehicle; and
- c) State that the vehicle was supplied into the market fully compliant with Australian Design Rule 80/01, 80/02 or ADR 80/03.

#### PART 5 – DEFINITIONS

“Approval Plate” means a decal, label or plate issued by a Competent Entity that is made of a material and fixed in such a way that they cannot be removed without being damaged or destroyed and that contains the following information:

- For vehicles complying with Clause 4.2, the Trade name or mark of the Front Under-run Protection Vehicle or Front Under-run Protection Device;
- For vehicles complying with Clause 4.2, the manufacturer of the Front Under-run Protection Vehicle or Front Under-run Protection Device;
- For vehicles complying with Clause 4.2.1 (b), the make of the vehicle or vehicles the component or device has been designed and certified to fit;
- For vehicles complying with Clause 4.2.1 (b), the model or models of vehicle the component or device has been designed and certified to fit;
- For vehicles complying with Clause 4.3, the vehicle manufacturer's name;
- Competent Entity unique identification number;
- Approval Plates relating to 4.2.1 (b) and 4.2.2 must include the Approval Number issued by the Competent Entity; and

- Purposes of the approval i.e. approval for a Front Under-run Protection Device, and/or for a Front Under-run Protection Vehicle (UN ECE 93) or for Cab Strength (UN ECE 29).
- Approval Plates relating to Clause 4.2.1(b) shall bear the words “UN ECE R93 FUPD” or other words or markings with a clearly equivalent meaning.
- Approval Plates relating to Clause 4.2.2 must bear the words “UN ECE R93 FUP Compatible” or other words or markings with a clearly equivalent meaning.
- Approval Plates relating to either Clause 4.2.1(b) and 4.2.2 may include both the words “UN ECE R93 FUPD” and “UN ECE R93 FUP Compatible” or other words or markings with a clearly equivalent meaning. Each statement must be annotated or marked, such as with either a “Yes” or “XXX”, so as to clearly and unambiguously signify upon the Plate which statement is applicable (A FUP compatible device is one that complies with Clause 3.2.2).
- Approval Plates relating to Clause 4.3 must include the statement “This vehicle was manufactured to conform with the Cab Strength requirements of UN ECE R29” or words with an equivalent meaning.
- Approval plates relating to Clause 4.4 must include the statement “This vehicle was manufactured to comply with Australian Design Rule 80/01 “Emissions Control for Heavy Vehicles”” or words with an equivalent meaning

“*Competent Entity*” means a person or organisation appointed by an Australian Authority, and issued with a unique identification number, with the power to certify that the UN ECE requirements for Front Under-run Protection and Cabin Strength have been met, and continue to be met, and who may authorise the fixing of appropriate Approval Plates to a Front Under-run Protection Device or a Front Under-run Protection Vehicle.

A Compliance Plate Approval (CPA) holding heavy vehicle manufacturer is deemed to be a Competent Entity.

A Competent Entity, that is not a CPA holding manufacturer, is only approved to inspect and certify those vehicles that are registered in the same jurisdiction as the Competent Entity’s place of business.

With respect to ADR80/01, ADR 80/02 and ADR 80/03, a Competent Entity is a Compliance Plate Approval (CPA) holding heavy vehicle manufacturer.

“*Front Under-run Protection Device*” means a device fitted to a prime mover:

- That complies with UN ECE Regulation No. 93 and meets all of the requirements set out in section 6 “Requirement For FUPDs” of Part I and section 8 “Requirements for Installation of an Approved FUPD” of Part II of those regulations,
  - Where compliance with the performance requirements of UN ECE Regulation No. 93 was established by laboratory testing carried out in accordance with the procedures set out in Annex 5 of UN ECE Regulation No. 93, and
  - That was tested using the Test Conditions set out in section 1 and the Test Procedure set out in section 3 of Annex 5 of the Guidelines for Implementing Front Underrun Protection and Cab Strength Requirements published by the National Transport Commission (NTC). (Simulation of the test procedure by calculation or other such method as provided for in section 1.3 of Annex 5 is not available under the NTC Guideline, except with the specific approval of the Authority or when approval has been granted using an “E-mark” issued pursuant to Annex 4 of UN ECE Regulation No. 93).
- or
- Complies with ADR 84 – Front Underrun Impact Protection.

“*Front Under-run Protection Vehicle*” means a vehicle:

- that complies with UN ECE Regulation No. 93 (UN ECE R93) because it is designed and constructed so that it meets all of the requirements of section 10 “Requirements for a vehicle with FUP” of Part III of those regulations.
- or
- Complies with ADR 84 – Front Underrun Impact Protection.

**PART 2 – APPLICATION****2.1 Application**

2.1.1 Except as provided by Clause 2.1.2, this Notice applies to a vehicles or combinations, complying with the requirements of Parts 3 and 4 of this Notice, that are being operated by an operator accredited under the Mass Management Accreditation Scheme.

2.1.2 This Notices does not apply to:

- (a) Pig trailers or a combination containing one or more pig trailers; or
- (b) A truck and dog trailer combination operating under the Class 3 Truck and Dog Trailer Combination Notice 2010; or
- (c) A Special Purpose Vehicle, an agricultural machine or agricultural implement, a low loader, a low loader dolly and a low loader, a jinker or a low loader dolly and a jinker; or
- (d) A complying bus, an ultra-low floor bus or an articulated ultra-low floor bus or a bus licensed to carry standing passengers; or
- (e) A vehicle or combination operating under Clause 7 (Higher Mass Limits) of Schedule 1 to the Road Transport (Mass, Loading and Access) Regulation 2005.
- (f) A vehicle or combination operating under any other permit, Notice or other exemption that allows axle or axle group, not including the steer axle, above those specified in Table 1 of Schedule 1 to the Road Transport (Mass, Loading and Access) Regulation 2005.

**PART 3 – OPERATION AND TRAVEL CONDITIONS****3.1 Operating conditions**

- (d) the sum of the manufacturer's mass limits for the prime mover (or rigid truck or bus) (GVM) and the trailer or trailers (GTM) it is towing, or
- (e) 5% above the gross mass limit that applies to the vehicle under Table 1, Clause 2, Schedule 1 of the Road Transport (Mass, Loading and Access) Regulation 2005, subject to:
  - (i) A maximum of 1 tonne for a vehicle or vehicle combination with an allowable gross mass not exceeding 55 tonnes;
  - (ii) A maximum of 2 tonne for a vehicle or vehicle combination with an allowable gross mass exceeding 55 tonne

**4.3 Axle and axle group mass limits**

The charitable purposes of both Bali Peace Park Incorporated and Bali Peace Park Association Incorporated are the same or similar in purpose, being a purpose 'beneficial to the community', which is a charitable purpose.

The Solicitor General, as delegate of the Attorney General in Charitable Trusts Act 1993 matters, has determined that this is an appropriate matter in which the Attorney General should approve a cy-pres scheme under section 12 (1) (a) of the Charitable Trusts Act 1993 for the application of the remaining funds.

The proposed scheme will permit the \$580.00 now remaining and held by Bali Peace Park Incorporated to be applied by the Bali Peace Park Association Incorporated towards the purchase of the Sari Club site to construct a memorial garden to the victims of the 2002 Bali bombings.

2. The exemption under clause 16 (d) of the Companion Animals Regulation 2008 from the requirements of section 9 of the Companion Animals Act 1998 only applies to an animal in the custody of an organisation listed in Schedule 1 if the organisation maintains appropriate records that show compliance with the Companion Animals Act 1998, Companion Animals Regulation 2008 and the Guidelines for Approval to be an Organisation Exempt from Companion Animal Registration under clause 16 (d) of the Companion Animals Regulation 2008.
3. The exemption under clause 16 (d) of the Companion Animals Regulation 2008 from the requirements of section 9 of the Companion Animals Act 1998 only applies to an animal in the custody of an organisation listed in Schedule 1 if the organisation maintains a register that is made available to the relevant local council and the Division of Local Government, Department of Premier and Cabinet as requested. The Register must list the names of all carers involved in the rehoming of animals and the locations of all animals received under the exemption while in the custody of the organisation.
4. The exemption under clause 16 (d) of the Companion Animals Regulation 2008 from the requirements of section 9 of the Companion Animals Act 1998 expires five years from the date of this order, unless revoked or varied at an earlier time.

**PRACTICE NOTE No. 2**

Children's Court of New South Wales

Initiating Report and Service of the relevant portion of the Community Services file in Care Proceedings

Issued 23/7/2010  
Amended 27/9/2010

## 1. Preamble

- 1.1 This amended Practice Note takes effect on 27 September 2010.
- 1.2 The Special Commission of Inquiry into Child Protection Services in New South Wales recommended in its November 2008 Report [at Recommendation 13.3] that applications for care orders under sections 45 and 61 of the Children and Young Persons (Care and Protection) Act 1998 (the Care Act) should be made by way of an application filed in the Children's Court supported by a written report which succinctly and fairly summarises the information available to [Community Services] and contains sufficient information to support a

determination that a child is in need of care and protection and any interim orders sought, without any requirement for the filing of any affidavit, unless ordered by the Court in circumstances where establishment is contested. It was also recommended that the [Community Services'] file or relevant portion of it, should be made available to the parties.

- 1.3 The purpose of this Practice Note is to implement the recommendations by prescribing the procedure for Community Services to disclose to the parties relevant documents held on its files.
- 1.4 This Practice Note only applies to care applications made under Chapter 5 of the Care Act with the exception of the following applications:
  - applications for rescission or variation of orders under section 90
  - applications on breach of undertakings under section 76 (5)
  - applications on breach of supervision under section 77 (3)
  - applications for assessment orders under sections 53/54/55
  - applications for contact orders under section 86 and
  - applications for emergency care and protection orders under sections 45 (1) (a)/46
2. The prescribed procedure
  - 2.1 The relevant portions of the Community Services file are to be served on each party to the proceedings in 2 stages.
  - 2.2 Community Services may serve "Stage 1 documents" at the time of service of the Application and Report (Form 1) or at any time up to and including the first occasion the application comes before the court (the first return date). Community Services will then have up to fourteen (14) calendar days from the first return date to provide to the parties further relevant documents from its files ("Stage 2 documents").
  - 2.3 Stage 1 Documents
 

In the ordinary course, Stage 1 documents are to be served upon the parties with the Application and Report. This is consistent with the parties being informed of the case they must meet as soon as is practicable and with the principle that care proceedings are to proceed as expeditiously as possible. Service on the first return date should be the exception to the rule, rather than standard practice.
  - 2.4 The categories of Stage 1 documents to be served by Community Services are copies of:
    - i. All current orders of the Children's Court and any other order being relied upon for an argument pursuant to section 106A of the Care Act.
    - ii. Such current orders of the Family Court, Federal Magistrates Court and any current enforceable apprehended violence order.
    - iii. A summary (in an agreed format) of reports of risk of significant harm concerning the child\*
    - iv. written advices of assessments/examinations from medical practitioners in relation to an

- v. injury/medical condition where that injury/medical condition has contributed to removal/action being taken
- vi. written advices from the police as to relevant incidents, consideration of which has contributed to removal/action being taken
- vii. written advices from any agency providing services to the child or the child's family where consideration of these advices has contributed to removal/action being taken
- viii. parental responsibility contracts/breach notices but only where the breach has prompted the Children's Court application
- ix. birth alerts
- x. relevant photographs
- xi. current case plan(s) and care plan(s)
- xii. any notes of interviews with the child or young person or parents/carers\*\*

\* The summary will be in the form of a 'person history report' and will provide, the following information:

- date report received
- brief description of harm
- person alleged to be causing harm
- outcome (closed without assessment/ investigated and substantiated (in part or whole)/investigated and not substantiated)

\*\* Copies of notes from interviews can be provided in Stage 1 if they were of interviews held within the previous 12 months. These copies are made of the handwritten notes taken during the interview.

### 2.5 Stage 2 Documents

Community Services will have up to fourteen (14) calendar days following the first return date of the care application, to serve on each of the parties the Stage 2 documents. The categories of documents to be produced at this stage are copies of:

- i. Any of the categories of documents produced in Stage 1 that are now held by Community Services and have not been previously produced.
- ii. Where an argument is to be conducted pursuant to section 106A of the Care Act copies of Children's Court judgements, orders or transcripts that Community Services retains on its files.\*
- iii. Information held by Community Services from other agencies only where it is relevant to issues to be considered by the court in determining whether the child is in need of care and protection (for example, a school report where the child's educational needs are not being met)
- iv. A genogram for the child
- v. Any temporary care arrangements (whether current or expired)
- vi. Documents held by Community Services recording what took place at any home visit to

the home of the child in the previous 12 months prior to the commencement of care proceedings

- vii. Any parental responsibility contracts (whether current or expired)
- viii. Third party assessments held by Community Services where they are relevant to the issues to be determined by the court\*\*

\* It is recognised that the primary source of information concerning Children's Court proceedings should be the file held by the Children's Court.

\*\* Given that any assessment loses its reliability after a period of time, Community Services will only be required to provide third party assessments as part of Stage 2 Documents where the assessment was undertaken within the last 2 years. Earlier assessments can be sought by subpoena.

### 3 Further procedures applying to the service of both Stage 1 and Stage 2 documents

3.1 With the exception of a genogram and person history report, only documents held by Community Services at the time for service of each stage of documents are required to be produced. Documents are to be produced in the state in which they exist on the Community Services file. Community Services is not required to convert information into a different format for the purposes of inclusion in a bundle of documents. Community Services is not required to source documents that are not in its possession and that do not come into its possession through the course of its work with a family. If a party wishes to rely on documents not contained in the Stage 1 or 2 Documents, the party should subpoena the person or entity that holds the documents.

3.2 This Practice Note deals specifically with initiating a care application and making relevant documents from Community Services files available to the parties. The Practice Note does not deal with the disclosure of material received by Community Services after it serves the Stage 2 documents. However, Community Services officers have an obligation to adhere to the model litigant principle and disclose to the parties all material relevant to the case. If Community Services considers that there are additional documents (which may assist the court or a party) which come into its possession following serving the Stage 1 and Stage 2 bundles of documents, it will also serve those documents on the parties.

3.3 The supply of documents by Community Services in Stages 1 and 2 is subject to compliance with section 29 of the Care Act. Accordingly, information disclosing the identity of a person who made a report, the report and evidence of the contents of the report may be deleted from documents.

3.4 Neither Stage 1 nor Stage 2 documents are required to be paginated.

3.5 Neither Stage 1 nor Stage 2 documents are to be filed in the Court registry.

- 3.6 Upon application by any party the Court may extend or abridge the time to serve either Stage 1 or Stage 2 documents.
- 3.7 A delegate of the Director General will certify that all relevant documents have been produced at Stages 1 and 2 in accordance with form numbers 1A and 1B respectively.
- 3.8 Documents produced by Community Services in either Stage 1 or Stage 2 need not be produced again in response to a subpoena.
- 3.9 Community Services may re-list the matter after giving reasonable notice to the parties to seek the court's approval not to provide a Stage 1 or Stage 2 document on the ground that provision of the document may endanger a person's safety.

### PRACTICE NOTE SC EQ 10

Supreme Court Equity Division – Revenue List

#### Commencement

1. This Practice Note was issued on 22 September 2010 and commenced on 1 October 2010.

#### Application

2. This Practice Note applies to proceedings in or to be entered in, the Revenue List of the Equity Division of the Supreme Court.

#### Definitions

3. In this Practice Note:

**Act** means the *Taxation Administration Act 1996*

**Chief Commissioner** means the Chief Commissioner of State Revenue and, where appropriate, includes the Commissioner of State Revenue

**Commissioner of Taxation** means the Commissioner of Taxation of the Commonwealth of Australia and, where appropriate, includes a Second Commissioner of Taxation or a Deputy Commissioner of Taxation

**List** means the Revenue List

**List Judge** means the judge designated by the Chief Justice under section 28 of the Supreme Court Act 1970 to be the Revenue List Judge

**UCPR** means the Uniform Civil Procedure Rules 2005.

#### Introduction

4. The purpose of this Practice Note is to set out the case management procedures employed in the List for the just, quick and cheap disposal of proceedings.
5. Proceedings in the List will be case managed by the List Judge. Practice Note SC Eq 1 will not apply to proceedings in the List.
6. It is expected that this Practice Note will be observed in the conduct of proceedings in the List.

#### Entry in the List on commencement of proceedings

7. The plaintiff in proceedings seeking a review of an assessment (or other decision) of the Chief Commissioner under section 97 of the Act must:
  - (a) add "Revenue List" in the heading and title of the Summons filed in the Equity Division;

- (b) follow the procedures applicable to appeals in UCPR Pt 50 r 50, and in particular the Summons must be in the approved form (Form 84) and contain a statement setting out briefly but specifically the grounds relied on in support of the review;
  - (c) annex to the affidavit filed with the Summons in compliance with Schedule 10 of UCPR, copies of the relevant notice of assessment (or other decision of the Chief Commissioner), the objection and the notice of determination of the objection given by the Chief Commissioner under section 93 of the Act.
8. Where a plaintiff commences other proceedings to be entered in the List, "Revenue List" must be added in the heading and title of the Summons or Statement of Claim in the Equity Division.

#### Entry into and removal from the List

9. The proceedings which may be entered in the List include proceedings commenced in the Common Law Division in which either the Chief Commissioner or the Commissioner of Taxation is a party or in which an issue has arisen in relation to a law under which either of them exercises functions.
10. Where proceedings in the Common Law Division or in another specialist list in the Equity Division are entered in the List pursuant to UCPR Pt 45 r 45.2, the Court may give such further directions as to the continuance of the proceedings as it thinks fit.

<sup>1</sup> The proceedings which may be entered in the List are set out in UCPR Pt 45 r 45.7A

#### Appeal Statements

11. Each party to proceedings in which the plaintiff seeks a review of the decision of the Chief Commissioner under section 97 of the Act must file and serve an Appeal Statement which states in summary form and without undue formality:
  - (a) the basic elements of the party's case or defence;
  - (b) where applicable, the relief sought;
  - (c) the issues the party believes are likely to arise;
  - (d) the principal matters of fact upon which the party intends to rely;
  - (e) the party's contentions (including the legal grounds for any relief claimed) and the leading authorities supporting those contentions.
12. (a) The plaintiff must file and serve the Appeal Statement at the same time that the Summons is filed and served upon the Chief Commissioner;
- (b) The Chief Commissioner must file and serve the Appeal Statement within 28 days of the date on which the Summons and the plaintiff's Appeal Statement are served on the Chief Commissioner.
13. All Appeal Statements must include a Front Sheet identifying the names of the parties and their designation as plaintiff(s) or defendant(s).
14. Appeal Statements must identify the real issues in dispute and comply, where possible, with UCPR Pt 14 r 14.6, r 14.7 and r 14.8.

**Initial directions hearing**

15. The Court will hold an initial directions hearing at a time appointed by the Court:
- in proceedings to which paragraph 7 applies, after the filing and service by the Chief Commissioner of an Appeal Statement under paragraph 12(b);
  - in proceedings to which either paragraph 8 or paragraph 10 applies, after the entry in the List of the proceedings.
16. At the first directions hearing orders will be made and directions given with a view to the just, quick and cheap disposal of the proceedings. The orders and directions may relate to:
- the filing and service of pleadings;
  - the provision of proper or further particulars;
  - the service of affidavits of evidence by a specified date or dates ;
  - in an appropriate case, an order that the parties seek to agree some or all of the facts by a statement of agreed facts;
  - orders for discovery;
  - the issue of subpoenas.

2 Affidavits are not filed with the Court until final hearing and, for this reason, provision is made in the Usual Orders for Hearing in Annexure A for originals of the affidavits to be delivered to the Associate to the List Judge shortly before the hearing date.

3 The Online Court Protocol is found in Practice Note SC Gen 12.

17. At the first directions hearing the List Judge would normally make an order that all future directions hearings will be conducted in the first instance via online court. If such an order is made, all legal practitioners involved in the proceedings (including counsel) must ensure that they are registered users.

**Expert evidence**

18. Under UCPR Pt 31 r 31.19 a party considering or intending to adduce expert evidence at trial must promptly seek directions from the Court in that regard. A party to proceedings in the List must seek those directions:
- at the first directions hearing;
  - by a request made on online court if the parties agree on the proposed Expert Evidence Directions in accordance with paragraph 13 of Practice Note SC Eq 5; or
  - if the parties do not agree on the proposed Expert Evidence Directions, the issue should be raised on online court and the party who drafted the proposed directions should provide the Court with a copy via a message posted on online court.
19. Where experts' reports have been or are to be served (whether or not pursuant to an order or direction of the Court) the Court will, unless otherwise persuaded, direct, upon such terms as it thinks fit, that the parties cause the experts or some of them to confer with a view to identification of and a proper understanding of any points of difference between them and the reasons therefore and a narrowing of such points of difference. The Court may, at the same time or subsequently, direct that the parties and/or the experts, prepare an agreed

statement of points of agreement, and of difference remaining, between experts following such conference and the reasons therefore (see UCPR Pt 31 r 31.20).

**Interrogatories**

20. Interrogatories will not be permitted other than in exceptional circumstances.

**Listing for hearing**

21. Upon fixing a date for hearing the Court will normally direct that the Usual Orders for Hearing as set out in Annexure A shall apply with or without modification. If for any reason the parties are of the view that the Usual Orders for Hearing should be modified, they must provide a Consent Modified Orders for Hearing by a message posted on online court.

22. In an appropriate case the Usual Orders for Hearing (Annexure A) may be modified to contain orders regarding expert evidence and provision of a Court Book (as to which see the Usual Order for Hearing set out in Annexure A to Practice Note SC Eq 1).

  - serve on the Plaintiff, and deliver to the List Judge's Associate, a list of affidavits to be read, an outline of submissions, a list of authorities and a list of any objections to the Plaintiff's evidence.
- No later than 2 working days before the hearing date the Plaintiff shall serve on the Defendant, and deliver to the List Judge's Associate, any written reply.
- Each party has liberty to apply in online court.

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# 1 Introduction

The Director General of the Department of Environment, Climate Change and Water NSW (DECCW) is responsible for protecting and conserving Aboriginal objects and declared Aboriginal places in NSW.

Part 6 of the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974* (NPW Act) provides specific protection for Aboriginal objects and declared Aboriginal places by establishing offences of harm. Harm is defined to mean destroying, defacing, damaging or moving an object from the land. There are a number of defences and exemptions to the offence of harming an Aboriginal object or place.

One of the defences is that the harm was carried out under an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP). Information about AHIPs can be found at:

This Code of Practice has been adopted by clause 3A of the National Parks and Wildlife Regulation 2009 (NPW Regulation).

## 1.1 Purpose of this Code of Practice

The purpose of this Code of Practice is to:

- 1 establish the requirements for undertaking test excavation as a part of archaeological investigation without an AHIP  
If you comply with these requirements and you harm an Aboriginal object when undertaking test excavations, your actions will be excluded from the definition of harm and as such you will not be committing an offence of harm to an Aboriginal object.
- 2 establish the requirements that must be followed when carrying out archaeological investigation in NSW where an application for an AHIP is likely to be made.  
Under the NPW Act, the Director General can require that certain information accompany an application for an AHIP. This Code explains what that information is in relation to archaeological investigations.

DECCW recommends that the requirements of this Code also be followed where a proponent may be uncertain about whether or not their proposed activity may have the potential to harm Aboriginal objects or declared Aboriginal places and the proponent is required to:

- undertake further investigation to understand and establish the potential harm their proposal may have on Aboriginal cultural heritage, and
- the further investigation involves archaeological assessment.

For guidance on whether or not further investigation is required, refer to the *Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in NSW* available on the DECCW website.

## 1.2 Objective of archaeological investigation

The objective of any archaeological investigation (where necessary) is to learn about past human societies through the study of material remains and historical, oral and environmental sources. Archaeological investigations locate, identify and study Aboriginal objects, archaeological deposits and potential archaeological deposits, and historical, oral and environmental sources to provide an assessment of the archaeological significance of the objects and the subject area.

In order to fulfil this objective the following steps are taken:

- 1 Clearly describe the aims of the project. The rationale for the archaeological assessment must be clearly defined through these aims.
- 2 Present a feasible and appropriate methodology for the archaeological survey and other investigations to ensure that work can be clearly linked to these aims.
- 3 Present the findings and interpretation of the results within a wider context of archaeological knowledge and Aboriginal history.
- 4 Ensure that the findings and interpretation of the results support the assessment of the archaeological significance of the subject area.

Where archaeological test excavation cannot be undertaken in accordance with this Code, or where the Aboriginal cultural heritage assessment concludes that the proposed activity will result in harm to Aboriginal objects or declared Aboriginal places and an application for an AHIP will be made, the application must be supported by an Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment Report (clause 80D of the NPW Regulation). If an Archaeological Report is required under this Code then that report should be an appendix to an Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment Report.

## 1.3 Preconditions to undertaking an archaeological investigation


Before undertaking an archaeological investigation you must establish that:

- further investigation is required; for guidance on whether or not further investigation is required you should refer to the *Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in NSW* available on the DECCW website
- your proposed activity requires assessment under Part 4 or Part 5 of the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979*.

## 1.4 Application of this Code

This Code has been developed to support the process of investigating and assessing Aboriginal cultural heritage by specifying the minimum standards for archaeological investigation undertaken in NSW under the NPW Act. Where an Aboriginal cultural heritage assessment requires an archaeological investigation to be undertaken, this must be done in accordance with the requirements of this Code. These requirements are summarised in Figure 1 below.

**Figure 1: Requirements of the Code**



**Other requirements**

In addition to the requirements of this Code, you may also need to comply with the requirements of other legislation.

## 1.5 Standard and additional requirements

This Code contains the **standard requirements** (Section 2) that must be met when carrying out an archaeological investigation in NSW. Depending on the investigation required to adequately characterise the proposed development area or the archaeological site type being investigated, **additional requirements** may also apply (Section 3).

### Advisory notes

This Code also contains **advisory notes** about some of the steps that may be taken to comply with the standard requirements. The advisory notes are intended as a guide only and may not be appropriate for every situation. Alternative measures may be taken as long as the standard requirements are complied with.

## 1.6 Minimum qualifications for persons to comply with this Code

When undertaking archaeological investigations in NSW in compliance with this Code, proponents must use the services of people who are skilled and experienced in archaeology and, in particular, the archaeology of Aboriginal people. These skills and experience may be available in-house or sourced from specialist service providers. For the purposes of the Code, an appropriately skilled and experienced person has:

- 1 a minimum of a bachelor's degree with honours in archaeology or relevant experience in the field of Aboriginal cultural heritage management, and
- 2 the equivalent of two years full-time experience in Aboriginal archaeological investigation, including involvement in a project of similar scope, and
- 3 a demonstrated ability to conduct a project of the scope required through inclusion as an attributed author on a report of similar scope.

## 1.7 Offences under the NPW Act

The NPW Act establishes a number of offences. The following offences and penalties apply to harm to Aboriginal objects.

Offence	Maximum penalty – Individual	Maximum penalty – Corporation
A person must not knowingly harm or desecrate an Aboriginal object	2,500 penalty units (\$275,000) or imprisonment for 1 year or both	10,000 penalty units (\$1,100,000)
	5,000 penalty units (\$550,000) or imprisonment for 2 years or both (in circumstances of aggravation)	

Offence	Maximum penalty – Individual	Maximum penalty – Corporation
A person must not harm an Aboriginal object (strict liability offence)	500 penalty units (\$55,000)	2,000 penalty units (\$220,000)
	1,000 penalty units (\$110,000) (in circumstances of aggravation)	

If a person carries out an archaeological investigation and they do not follow the requirements of this Code, and they harm an Aboriginal object, they would be committing one of the two offences set out above.

If you plan to carry out an archaeological investigation in a declared Aboriginal place you will need to apply for an AHIP.

### 1.8 Currency of these requirements

This Code is effective from 1 October 2010.

### 1.9 Amendment of these requirements

This Code may be amended from time to time. An amendment to this Code will require an amendment to the NPW Regulation to refer to the updated version of this Code.

### 1.10 Definitions

Key terms and phrases used in this Code are defined in Appendix A. If a word is not defined it must be given the meaning it has under the NPW Act or Regulations. If a word remains undefined it has its ordinary meaning.

### 1.11 Further information

Further information about the Code can be obtained from DECCW Environment Protection and Regulation Group (EPRG) Regional Offices. These locations are provided in Appendix C.

## 2 General requirements applying to all archaeological investigations

This section of the Code (Section 2) contains a set of requirements that must be followed if an act is to be excluded from the definition of harm.

Depending on the investigation required to adequately characterise the proposed development area or the Aboriginal objects being investigated, additional requirements as set out in Section 3 may also apply.

### 2.1 Reviewing existing knowledge

The first step is to compile, analyse and synthesise previous archaeological information and relevant contextual information. This process should indicate the nature and range of material traces of Aboriginal land use to be expected within the specific landscape contexts in the subject area. This knowledge provides a framework for interpreting the material traces within the subject area, and for understanding the cumulative impacts to Aboriginal heritage in the subject area.

#### Requirement 1 – Review previous archaeological work

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**Purpose:** To synthesise available information from previous archaeological and ethnohistorical studies to provide a context and baseline for what is known about Aboriginal cultural heritage in the subject area. This contributes to the assessment of the archaeological significance of the proposed development area.

#### Requirement 1a – Previous archaeological work

The review of previous archaeological work must:

- be appropriate to the scale of the proposed activity, its anticipated impacts and the size of the subject area
- include an Aboriginal Heritage Information Management System (AHIMS) search (see Requirement 1b)
- synthesise the known archaeology and ethnohistory of the region using relevant published and unpublished sources (such information is available from AHIMS), published material, local knowledge and other sources
- evaluate the results of any previous reports for the subject area in light of current knowledge
- describe the range and nature of Aboriginal sites and features present within and near the subject area, including presentation of the results in tabulated form (at the very least this must summarise the number of sites by type or features present)
- describe existing predictive models that are relevant to the project and subject area, such as models of past Aboriginal land-use strategies and cultural systems together with models of relevant taphonomic processes that highlight the main issues and regional character of the archaeology; depending on the scale of the project and information available this may be simple or complex

- be used to present a map in the Archaeological Report, preferably prepared using a geographic information system (GIS), showing the location of previously recorded sites and, where available, areas of previous surveys. Where there are restrictions placed on data by Aboriginal people, these must be respected and appropriately documented in the Archaeological Report.

This review must be documented in the Archaeological Report as set out in Requirement 11.

**Advisory note**

The synthesis of information may take the form of an annotated bibliography of relevant sources or statement of relevant sources.

Always clearly describe which are primary and secondary sources.

**Requirement 1b – AHIMS searches**

AHIMS searches must:

- be contemporaneous with the project
- include an area larger than, and wholly containing, the subject area
- include an area large enough to allow adequate landscape interpretation, and – if available – sites in large enough numbers to allow adequate understanding of the distribution of the sites within the landscape
- include a search for any previous reports relevant to the subject area
- be assessed to determine the robustness of the search, giving consideration to issues that may affect the search results, such as the number, size, intensity and results of previous surveys in the area.

The date of the AHIMS search and AHIMS client service number must be referenced in the Archaeological Report (Requirement 11).

**Advisory notes**

Refer to the AHIMS webpage for further information.

Some AHIMS searches may already have been conducted at Step 2a of the generic due diligence process described in DECCW's *Due Diligence Code of Practice for the Protection of Aboriginal Objects in NSW*. Those searches can be used for the purpose of the archaeological investigation.

Other registers that should be searched are:

- NSW State Heritage Inventory
- The Australian Heritage database.

## Requirement 2 – Review the landscape context

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**Purpose:** The purpose of reviewing the landscape context is to assist in the determination or prediction of:

- the potential of the landscape, over time, to have accumulated and preserved objects
- the ways Aboriginal people have used the landscape in the past, with reference to the presence of resource areas, surfaces for art, other focal points for activities and settlement, and
- the likely distribution of the material traces of Aboriginal land use based on the above.

The landscape description must:

- describe the landscape history at a scale that allows the subject area to be characterised into meaningful components (or units) for the archaeological investigation
- describe the landforms present within the subject area using standard or generally accepted classifications
- identify the primary modes of geomorphic activity in the subject area: aggraded, aggraded or eroded (stable), or eroded, and determine if objects are likely to be concealed below the ground surface or revealed by erosional processes
- identify the forms of erosion within the archaeologically surveyed area, and where appropriate, subject area as a whole
- describe the soils present and, where available, outline their formation history
- describe the land-use history of the subject area
- describe, and if relevant, map the natural resources and natural features that will have influenced the use of the landscape in the past.

The landscape description must be explicitly referenced in the predictive model (see Requirement 4), with regard to the potential for material traces of past Aboriginal land use to accumulate, be preserved and be observed.

The landscape context must be documented in the Archaeological Report as set out in Requirement 11.

### **Advisory notes**

#### *Rationale*

Consideration of the landscape is essential to the definition and interpretation of Aboriginal land use across a landscape. The landscape will provide clues as to those areas of land that may have been more intensively used by Aboriginal people in the past, and also provide the context within which the material remains of past Aboriginal occupation may be preserved and detectable. Landscape description is undertaken during both the background phase and fieldwork phase of any archaeological investigation.

### *Land-use history*

Land-use history refers to the past land use (e.g. agricultural) of the subject area. The nature and frequency of different land-use activities must be quantified to assess their effect on the survival of the material traces of past Aboriginal land use (e.g. a single ploughing event may have much less impact on any buried archaeological evidence than decades of annual ploughing; land clearing will have had some impact on sub-surface deposits, but may remove culturally modified trees entirely).

### *Landscape description and recording*

For an archaeological survey, the landscape divisions need to be manageable and meaningful units, as derived from, for example, Speight (2009: 15–72). It is these units that will provide the basis for:

- describing and assessing survey coverage
- assessing the detectability of material traces of Aboriginal occupation
- assessing archaeological potential
- considering site variability and patterning.

In areas where other types of published geomorphic or land classification systems are available or commonly used (such as the *Soil Landscapes* series), these may be more appropriate, and may be used in conjunction with The National Committee on Soil and Terrain 'Yellow Book' (2009).

### *Soils*

Soils and landscape information will be recorded for each survey unit (see Requirement 5). This information is expected to derive either from field observations, or ideally from a combination of field observation and available soil mapping.

Speight (2009: 52–54) provides advice and examples for the primary modes of geomorphic activity.

Charman and Murphy (2007: 14–40) and McDonald *et al.* (2009: 133–146) discuss the processes and forms of erosion.

Murphy (2007: 2–13) provides advice on soils and their formation history.

In some cases the advice of a soil scientist or geomorphologist may need to be considered where this will aid in interpreting the site, or landscape and site association.

### *Paleoenvironmental history*

Where available, a statement of the paleoenvironmental history of the subject area should be included.

### **Requirement 3 – Summarise and discuss the local and regional character of Aboriginal land use and its material traces**

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**Purpose:** To present a summary and discussion of the information collected in Requirements 1 and 2.

As set out in Requirement 11, the Archaeological Report must contain a section that synthesises the evidence from Requirements 1 and 2 in a discussion that highlights the main issues and regional character of Aboriginal land use and the material traces that it has produced.

#### **Advisory note**

Depending on the scale of the project and the amount and detail of information available, the discussion presented to satisfy this requirement may be simple or complex.

### **Requirement 4 – Predict the nature and distribution of evidence**

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**Purpose:** To present a model, or series of testable statements, about the nature and distribution of evidence of Aboriginal land use in the subject area based on the information collected from Requirements 1, 2 and 3.

#### **Advisory note**

For the purposes of satisfying this requirement, predictive models may take the form of simple observations relating past experience and available knowledge, or detailed models and considerations of large landscape areas (see Guilfoyle 2006 and references therein).

#### **Requirement 4a – Predictive model**

The predictive model must:

- integrate the distribution of known sites, summarised or modelled using the landscape descriptions derived in Requirement 2 (i.e. landscape units interpreted in terms of their archaeological potential)
- characterise the patterning of material traces from known social and behavioural characteristics evidenced in the ethnohistorical review
- consider the distribution of natural resources, and the probable land-use strategies employed by Aboriginal people in the specific landscape context
- consider the spatial and temporal relationships of sites
- identify what sorts of material traces are predicted to be present, and in what densities
- make inferences about past Aboriginal occupation of the landscape based on the evidence collected and presented.

**Advisory note**

Natural resources include features such as stone artefact raw materials, ecological communities, and the availability of water including relict water features and micro features that only function after flood episodes or wet periods. Sometimes these features may be evidenced by the vegetation present.

**Requirement 4b – Predictive model results**

The predictive model results must present statements of archaeological potential about areas – defined as the probability of objects being present (material traces of past land use and archaeological sites) – that can be verified using archaeological methodologies.

The areas of potential must be amended accordingly subsequent to further information – such as information gathered as part of fieldwork

The predictive model must be included in the Archaeological Report as set out in Requirement 11.

**Advisory notes**

In archaeology, predictive modelling refers to a process that considers variables that may influence the location, distribution and density of sites, features or artefacts across the landscape. As well as a review of the results of previous archaeological work and any available ethnographic information (to make judgements about past Aboriginal settlement of the landscape), the variables often included in a predictive model are environmental and topographic variables such as soils, distance from landscape features, slope, landform elements, and cultural resources (Orton 2000: 77).

Regardless of its size, every project that assesses the archaeological significance of an area of land will require predictive modelling of some sort.

The predictive model provides a basis for sampling strategies to be developed for the archaeological survey and, if required, archaeological test excavation.

More often than not, archaeological predictive models are statements about where in the landscape archaeological remains are likely to occur, rather than models in the sense that they can be mathematically tested. For the purposes of this requirement, both predictive statements and mathematically testable models are considered satisfactory.

It is important that the predictive model is credible, and that the predictions are transparent. The decisions and reasoning behind predictions must be presented logically, and the prediction itself should immediately preface the reasoning (e.g. 'The area is of low potential because ...' or 'Scarred trees will not be present because ...') or follow the reasoning (e.g. '... therefore the area is determined to be of high archaeological potential' or '... for these reasons, stone artefacts are very likely to occur').

Sometimes certain variables will not be relevant to the model; in these cases this needs to be stated, and the reason why explained.

## 2.2 Archaeological survey and data collection

The purpose of the archaeological survey is to identify and make up-to-date records of known and identified objects (traces of past Aboriginal land use and Aboriginal archaeological sites) within the subject area. The approach and method chosen for the archaeological survey must use the information obtained from Requirements 1 to 4 to ensure that the type of archaeological survey which is planned can logically be expected to yield the information necessary to meet the archaeological objectives stated, as set out in Section 1.2 of this Code.

The archaeological survey will contribute to the understanding of site characteristics, local and regional Aboriginal history and conservation requirements for the proposed activity.

### Requirement 5 – Archaeological survey

**Purpose:** The purpose of the archaeological survey (sometimes called a field survey) is to record all (or a representative sample of all) the material traces and evidence of Aboriginal land use that are:

- visible at or on the ground surface, or
- exposed in sections or visible as features (e.g. rock shelters, rock art, scar trees)

and to identify those areas where it can be inferred that, although not visible, material traces or evidence of Aboriginal land use have a likelihood of being present under the ground surface (potential archaeological deposits).

#### Advisory notes

##### *Vehicle traverses*

DECCW encourages the use of reconnaissance observations of the subject area prior to implementing a survey strategy. Vehicle traverses are considered to be reconnaissance activities only. They may be used to inform and design a pedestrian survey strategy. If they are to be used in the assessment, vehicle traverses must be recorded and reported separately from pedestrian survey activities, as they will not allow for suitable survey effectiveness calculations.

##### *Definitions*

Refer to Appendix A for definitions of *survey units*, *vehicle traverses*, and *potential archaeological deposits* for the purposes of this Code.

### Requirement 5a – Survey sampling strategy

The archaeological survey must not begin until a sampling strategy has been developed. Sampling must:

- include all landforms that will potentially be impacted. Where there is more than one instance of similar or the same landforms that have the potential to be impacted each individual landform must be sampled.

- place a proportional emphasis on those landforms deemed to have archaeological potential, clearly describing and justifying the reasons for their selection (see Requirement 4).

The sampling strategy must:

- describe how sampling relates to the footprint that is proposed to be impacted by the development
- clearly state when a full coverage survey will be undertaken and justify when it is not.

The sampling strategy must be documented in the Archaeological Report as set out in Requirement 11.

#### **Requirement 5b – Survey requirements**

The archaeological survey must:

- survey an area, on foot, for the purposes of discovering Aboriginal objects
- be conducted in accordance with the sampling strategy above
- be carried out using accurately defined and named survey units (see Requirement 5c below)
- include representative photographs of survey units and landforms where informative
- record landform and general soil information (see Requirement 2) for each survey unit
- record the land surface and vegetation conditions encountered during the survey, accounting as appropriate for things like vegetation, rock outcrops, coarse fragments, etc.) and how these impact on the visibility of objects
- record any Aboriginal objects (including those already registered on AHIMS or otherwise known) observed during the survey – see Requirements 6 and 7 and Section 3
- record survey coverage – see Requirement 9
- be used to calculate survey effectiveness – see Requirement 10, and
- be accurately mapped and presented visually at an appropriate scale as part of the Archaeological Report.

The survey must be documented and summarised in the Archaeological Report as set out in Requirement 11.

#### **Advisory note**

Land surface and vegetation conditions encountered during the survey can be recorded using definitions such as those in McDonald *et al.* (2009).

#### **Requirement 5c – Survey units**

The archaeological survey, using survey units, must:

- record the beginning and end points of transects or boundaries of survey units as otherwise defined

- map and record the beginning, length, and end points of transects using a hand-held GPS receiver, either by recording coordinates at start and end points or using the track function on the GPS to record the area traversed (or both) – see Requirement 8, and
- record the spacing between survey personnel.

The beginning and end of transects, or survey unit boundaries, must be defined by:

- landform boundary
- subject area boundary
- harm area boundary
- significant change in survey conditions, or
- other arbitrary termination.

### **Requirement 6 – Site definition**

**Purpose:** To clearly describe acceptable criteria for defining sites and their boundaries.

One (or more) of the following criteria must be used when recording material traces of evidence of Aboriginal land use:

- 1 the spatial extent of the visible objects, or direct evidence of their location
- 2 obvious physical boundaries where present, e.g. mound sites and middens (if visibility is good), a ceremonial ground
- 3 identification by the Aboriginal community on the basis of cultural information.

#### **Advisory notes**

An AHIMS Site Recording Form must be completed for all isolated objects or sites.

Definitions of the types of archaeological features that can be recorded on AHIMS are available on the AHIMS webpage.

Note: DECCW does not have a formal definition of an open artefact scatter, such as '2 artefacts within 50 m'. Appropriate boundary criteria and recording should be determined as described in Requirements 6 and 7.

### **Requirement 7 – Site recording**

**Purpose:** To create a record of the material traces or evidence of Aboriginal land use which is used in the archaeological assessment to interpret the Aboriginal history of the subject area. The first priority in recording any Aboriginal object must always be to avoid or minimise, as far practicable, the risk of harm to the object itself.

#### **Requirement 7a – Information to be recorded**

- Site recording must provide the information required to complete the current AHIMS Site Recording Form.

- When applicable use the appropriate AHIMS Feature Recording Form (Artefact, Modified Tree, Groove, Art, Shell).
- Identify the site boundaries and indicate how they have been determined (Requirement 6).
- Provide an accurate site plan, using professional judgement to determine the appropriate scale and precision, showing the site boundaries and all internal features and external or internal reference points.

#### **Requirement 7b – Scales for photography**

All photographs must include an appropriate graded metric scale – mm or cm graded scales (such as an International Federation of Rock Art Organisations [IFRAO] standard scale) for macro artefact or feature photography, and tens of cm or m graded scales (such as a range pole, surveying staff or tape measure) for wider angle or context photography.

#### **Requirement 8 – Location information and geographic reporting**

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**Purpose:** To accurately and consistently record and report on the location of Aboriginal objects in NSW.

##### **Requirement 8a – Geospatial information**

Geospatial information must be recorded using GPS receivers. It must include, but is not limited to, the location of:

- objects and sites
- survey units (both location and area of survey units)
- landscape units (Requirement 2)
- test excavation units (Section 3.1)
- other relevant features.

In situations where a GPS receiver cannot function, accurate recording of the location of Aboriginal objects must be undertaken and the method used documented.

**Requirement 8b – Datum and grid coordinates**

Datum and grid coordinates must be:

- reported as grid coordinates using the Map Grid of Australia 1994 (MGA94) cartesian coordinate system. MGA94 grid coordinates include:
  - zone (NSW is covered by the zones 54, 55 and 56)
  - easting – six digits to the nearest metre
  - northing – seven digits to the nearest metre
- checked and confirmed using a 1:25,000-scale topographic map (or the next best available scale where 1:25,000 is not available).

**Advisory notes**

Additional information is also available on the DECCW website.

The MGA94 is derived from a Universal Transverse Mercator projection (UTM) of the Geocentric Datum of Australia (GDA94) geographic coordinate system.

Coordinates recorded using a cartesian, geographic or local coordinate system other than MGA94 must be transformed into MGA94 coordinates for reporting to DECCW.

Transformations can be performed using GIS software, or dedicated software or spreadsheets produced by Geoscience Australia.

In NSW, topographic map sheets produced after 1999 use the GDA94/MGA94 grid, while those produced before 1999 use the AGD66/84/AMG grid. The map datum and coordinate system must be identified, and if necessary appropriate transformations applied to the derived coordinates (to produce MGA94 coordinates) before submission to DECCW.

**Requirement 9 – Record survey coverage data**

**Purpose:** To document the conditions present during the survey in order to assess the effectiveness of the survey. Recording survey coverage data allows an assessment of the obtrusiveness of Aboriginal objects to be made (i.e. whether objects are readily visible, or buried, or otherwise obscured). This is necessary because the obtrusiveness of Aboriginal objects will influence the survey results. The specific conditions affecting the detection of Aboriginal objects can be described in terms of *what reveals* and *what conceals* the objects (see Burke and Smith 2004: 74–80, NPWS 1999).

When recording survey coverage data:

- visibility and exposure must be independently described for each survey unit
- visibility must be determined and recorded to the nearest 10%
- exposure must be described in terms of the natural erosion processes responsible for its creation and any other contributing or primary processes (e.g. stocking, machinery cutting, vehicle tracks)
- exposure must be estimated to the nearest 10% as the mean percentage of the surface area of the survey where exposure was sufficient to reveal Aboriginal objects on the surface of the ground.

When recording survey coverage data in areas where obtrusive, above-surface archaeological features are the dominant form of archaeology, the survey must:


- describe the obtrusiveness of the features present (e.g. ‘rock shelters generally large and clearly visible’ or ‘small and obscured by vegetation’)
- quantify the coverage appropriately by describing any sampling procedures (e.g. ‘all or only some of the visible shelters were inspected’ or ‘inspection was confined to only some terrain units or contours’, etc.).

**Advisory notes**

Some types of Aboriginal sites are obtrusive and readily identified during a survey (e.g. rock art in shelters, culturally modified trees) but many other types of materials and sites (especially open sites containing stone artefacts) can be difficult to locate and can often go unrecorded due to adverse detection conditions such as thick grass cover or a lack of eroded exposures. Thus in any survey there is a bias against observing this unobtrusive form of evidence, although in most landscapes, open sites with stone artefacts (and in coastal contexts, buried shell middens) are the most common type of archaeological evidence.

Refer to Appendix A for an explanation of how exposure and visibility differ, and the meaning of ‘exposure’ and ‘visibility’ for the purposes of this Code.

The following visual comparison chart may be used to help estimate visibility and exposure conditions.



(Visual comparison chart modified from Terry and Chilingar, 1955, Summary of ‘Concerning some additional aids in studying sedimentary formations’, by Shvetsov M. S., *Journal of Sedimentary Research* 25: 229–234.)

An example of a survey in an area where obtrusive, above-surface evidence is the dominant form of archaeology is an environment dominated by rock shelters and rock platforms, where art and occupation shelters and petroglyphs on rock platforms would be the most common traces of past Aboriginal land use. The intent of this part of Requirement 9 is that professional experience and discretion are used to record survey coverage in these instances.

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**Requirement 10 – Analyse survey coverage**

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**Purpose:** To ensure that the survey data provides sufficient evidence for an evaluation of the distribution of objects across the landscape, taking into account archaeological potential. This information is essential to the assessment process and archaeological management recommendations (including any requirement for test excavations) that are derived from the assessment process.

The survey results must:

- be presented in the format of the example tables below or include clear justification where this format is not used, and
- include a descriptive summary of the effectiveness of the survey for each landform unit and then for the whole of the subject area.

**Advisory notes**

The aim of the survey coverage analysis is not to provide an exact percentage of ground or survey area, but a justifiable estimate.

Refer to Appendix A for an explanation of how to fill in the tables, and the meaning of each category.

## 2.3 Reporting and assessment of results

The Archaeological Report should take the form of an appendix to the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment Report. The Archaeological Report needs to be a stand-alone technical report which provides evidence about the material traces of Aboriginal land use that is integrated with the other findings from the assessment of Aboriginal heritage to support the conclusions and management recommendations in the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment Report.

### **Requirement 11 – Archaeological Report content and format**

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#### **General formatting**

- All pages must be numbered.
- All sections and sub-sections must be sequentially numbered.
- All tables, charts, plates, figures and appendices must be sequentially numbered.
- Headers or footers with a short project name should be included.

#### **Cover and title page**

The cover and title page must include:

- the title, including project name
- the date (month and year)
- local government area
- geographic identifier such as the nearest town or name of the region if this is not included in the title
- consultant's name
- author(s) of the report
- proponent's name.

#### **Report contents**

- **Table of contents** – Include a table of contents, including a list of tables, charts, plates, figures and appendices.
- **Summary** – Unless the report is very short, include a summary or abstract at the front of the report. This should be an overview of the main findings, interpretation of the results, and recommendations.
- **Introduction** – Include:
  - details of the proponent
  - explanation of the purpose of the archaeological investigation
  - project brief
  - subject area, and how this is defined
  - objectives of the assessment
  - overall project framework (development application, zoning study, etc.)
- **Investigator and contributors** – Include details of the qualifications and experience of the person carrying out the investigation and a list of contributors and their affiliations, specifically: reviewers, advisors, participants in survey activities

- **Description of development proposal** – Describe the proposed development, highlighting activities that have the potential to harm Aboriginal objects
- **Previous archaeological work** – Provide the information set out in Requirement 1
- **Landscape context** – Provide the information set out in Requirement 2
- **Regional character** – Provide the information set out in Requirement 3
- **Predictions** – Provide the information set out in Requirement 4
- **Sampling strategy** – Provide the information set out in Requirement 5 and Section 3.1 (where relevant)
- **Field methods** – Describe how the archaeological survey, and if relevant, the archaeological test excavation, was conducted and how information was recorded, including the dates and people involved, as set out in Requirements 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and Section 3.1 (where relevant)
- **Results** – Describe what was found during the survey (and if relevant, archaeological test excavation). Include an interpretation of the results, a table of survey coverage data as set out in Requirement 10, and a table of findings as follows:

- **Analysis and discussion** – The results must be interpreted using an archaeological framework that constructs an Aboriginal settlement history of the subject area.
  - The settlement history must be placed in a local and regional archaeological context.
  - Use graphs, charts and tables to effectively summarise data to support the interpretations where informative.
- **Scientific values and significance assessment** – Identify the archaeological values and assess their significance. The assessment must be supportable and the assessment criteria must reflect best practice assessment processes as set out in the Burra Charter.
- **Impact assessment** – Evaluate and discuss the potential archaeological impacts of the proposal. For known sites and areas of archaeological potential, the information must also be summarised in a table as follows:

- **Management and mitigation measures** – Evaluate the various options for management of the archaeological impacts, and justify those that are recommended.

- **Recommendations** – These must be clear recommendations for the conservation of archaeological values and mitigation of impacts to the values. If further archaeological work such as salvage excavation is recommended, justification must be provided for this in the ‘Management and mitigation’ section of the report.
- **References** – Use Harvard style (author, date) referencing.
- **Maps and figures** – These must be used as necessary to support the report, as set out in the preceding requirements.
- **Appendices** – AHIMS and other heritage register information must be included as appendices to the report.

#### **Advisory notes**

The *Style Manual: For authors, editors and printers* (2002) (ISBN 0 7016 3648 3) should be referred to for best practice with abbreviations, notations etc.

Where there are restrictions placed on data or information by Aboriginal people, these must be respected and appropriately documented in the Archaeological Report.

## **2.4 Record keeping**

### **Requirement 12 – Records**

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Records generated through implementing the requirements of this Code must be:

- kept in a legible form for at least five years
- provided in a legible form to any authorised officer of DECCW on request.

## **2.5 Non-compliance**

### **Requirement 13 – Notifying DECCW and reporting**

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#### **Requirement 13a – Notification of breaches**

Any person undertaking works in accordance with the requirements of this Code must notify DECCW of any non-compliance with the Code’s requirements that is causing harm to Aboriginal objects or declared Aboriginal places as soon as practicable after the person becomes aware of the incident. Notifications must be made by telephoning the Environment Line on 131 555.

#### **Requirement 13b – Provision of information**

Where an authorised officer of DECCW suspects, on reasonable grounds, non-compliance with the requirements of this Code and the non-compliance is causing or is likely to cause harm to Aboriginal objects, the authorised officer may request a written report of the event.

The person undertaking works in accordance with the requirements of this Code must make all reasonable inquiries in relation to the event and supply the report to DECCW within such time as may be specified in the request. DECCW may make a written request for further details in relation to the matter(s) if it is not satisfied with the report provided. The person undertaking works in accordance with the requirements of this Code must provide such further details to DECCW within the time specified in the request.

### 3 Additional requirements

Depending on the investigation required to adequately characterise the proposed development area or the Aboriginal objects being investigated, the following additional requirements may also apply:

- 3.1 Archaeological test excavation
- 3.2 Stone artefact recording
- 3.3 Rock art
- 3.4 Culturally modified trees
- 3.5 Middens
- 3.6 Burials or human remains
- 3.7 Artefact disposition and storage

#### 3.1 Archaeological test excavation

Archaeological test excavation will be necessary when (regardless of whether or not there are objects present on the ground surface) it can be demonstrated through Requirements 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 that sub-surface Aboriginal objects with potential conservation value have a high probability of being present in an area, and the area cannot be substantially avoided by the proposed activity.

The test excavations permitted by this Code are limited in their scope as described below. The first priority in test excavations, and recording Aboriginal objects during test excavations, must always be to avoid or minimise, as far practicable, the risk of harm to the objects under investigation. This means due care must be taken when excavating and collecting objects, and that unnecessary excavations do not comply with this Code.

**Purpose:** To collect information about the nature and extent of sub-surface Aboriginal objects, based on a sample derived from sub-surface investigations. Test excavations contribute to the understanding of site characteristics and local and regional prehistory and they can be used to inform conservation goals and harm mitigation measures for the proposed activity.

#### **Requirement 14 – Test excavation which is not excluded from the definition of harm**

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Acts carried out in the course of sub-surface investigation will not be excluded from harm where they are carried out in the following areas:

- 1 in or within 50 m of an area where burial sites are known or are likely to exist
- 2 in or within 50 m of a declared Aboriginal place
- 3 in or within 50 m of a rock shelter, shell midden or earth mound
- 4 in areas known or suspected to be Aboriginal missions or previous Aboriginal reserves or institutes

5 in areas known or suspected to be conflict or contact sites.  
In these circumstances it will be necessary to apply for an AHIP.

### **Requirement 15 – Pre-conditions to carrying out test excavation**

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Before archaeological test excavations can start the following conditions must be satisfied:

#### **Requirement 15a – Consultation**

Consultation must be undertaken as set out in the NPW Regulation and completed to the stage described in subclause 80C(6) of the Regulation.

#### **Requirement 15b – Test excavation sampling strategy**

A sampling strategy must be developed. This strategy must do the following:

- provide a framework for sampling all potential archaeological deposits (PAD) that are at risk of harm (within the subject area)
- describe the differentiation of the PAD to be test-excavated from the surrounding archaeological landscape (i.e. explain why the PAD is anticipated to be of higher significance than the continuous distribution of archaeological material in which it exists), and
  - test those areas of PAD that have no archaeological exposure or visibility, or
  - test the boundaries of known sites (where appropriate)
- confirm areas of low potential (where relevant).
- comply with the methods described in this Code
- describe how the sampling area relates to the area that is proposed to be impacted by the proposed activity.

The sampling strategy must be documented in the Archaeological Report as set out in Requirement 11.

#### **Requirement 15c – Notification**

At least 14 days before undertaking any test excavations the relevant DECCW EPRG regional office (refer to Appendix C) must be notified, in writing, of the following:

- the location of the proposed test excavation and the subject area
- the name and contact details of the legal entity with overall responsibility for the project
- the name and contact details of the person who will be carrying out the test excavations where this is different to the legal entity with overall responsibility for the project
- the proposed date of commencement, and estimated date of completion, of the test excavations
- the location of the temporary storage location for any Aboriginal objects uncovered during the test excavations.

A copy of the sampling strategy for test excavation must also be provided.

## **Requirement 16 – Test excavation that can be carried out in accordance with this Code**

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Acts occurring in the course of the following test excavations are excluded from the definition of harm if they are carried out in accordance with the requirements of this Code.

### **Requirement 16a – Test excavations**

Acts occurring in the course of test excavations will be excluded from the definition of harm but only if done in order to understand the site characteristics, local and regional prehistory and conservation requirements for the subject area and in accordance with the conditions set out below. This will only be the case where the purpose of the test excavations is to build on the information already obtained through the archaeological investigation carried out in accordance with the requirements of this Code.

- 1 Test excavation units must be placed on a systematic grid appropriate to the scale of the area – either PAD or site – being investigated e.g. 10 m intervals, 20 m intervals, or other justifiable and regular spacing.
- 2 Any test excavation point must be separated by at least 5 m.
- 3 Test excavations units must be excavated using hand tools only.
- 4 Test excavations must be excavated in 50 cm x 50 cm units.
- 5 Test excavations units may be combined and excavated as necessary to understand the site characteristics, however:
  - i) the maximum continuous surface area of a combination of test excavation units at any single excavation point conducted in accordance with point 1 (above) must be no greater than 3 m<sup>2</sup>
  - ii) the maximum surface area of all test excavation units must be no greater than 0.5% of the area – either PAD or site – being investigated .
- 6 Where the 50 cm x 50 cm excavation unit is greater than 0.5% of the area then point 5 (ii) (above) does not apply.
- 7 The first excavation unit must be excavated and documented in 5 cm spits at each area – either PAD or site – being investigated. Based on the evidence of the first excavation unit, 10 cm spits or sediment profile/stratigraphic excavation (whichever is smaller) may then be implemented.
- 8 All material excavated from the test excavation units must be sieved using a 5 mm aperture wire-mesh sieve.
- 9 Test excavation units must be excavated to at least the base of the identified Aboriginal object-bearing units, and must continue to confirm the soils below are culturally sterile.
- 11 Photographic and scale-drawn records of the stratigraphy/soil profile, features and informative Aboriginal objects must be made for each single excavation point.
- 12 Test excavations units must be backfilled as soon as practicable.
- 13 Following test excavation, an Aboriginal Site Impact Recording form must be completed and submitted to the AHIMS Registrar as soon as practicable, for each AHIMS site that has been the subject of test excavation in accordance with the

requirements of this Code. The DECCW Aboriginal Site Impact Recording Form is available on the DECCW website.

The test excavation should be sufficiently comprehensive to allow characterisation of the Aboriginal objects present without having a significant impact on the archaeological value of the subject area. Nothing in this requirement authorises salvage excavation.

#### **Advisory notes**

The information collected during test excavation will be used to:

- interpret the Aboriginal history of the area being investigated
- assess the cultural heritage significance of the area, and
- inform future planning decisions.

Test excavations should not be carried out in areas identified by Aboriginal people as places of significant social or cultural value and documented as part of the consultation process that must be carried out in accordance with clause 80C of the NPW Regulation.

#### *Combining test excavation units*

Test excavation units may be combined in a number of ways depending on the circumstances being investigated and providing Requirement 16a (5) can be met. It will be up to the person carrying out the test excavation to make this decision. Examples include:

- 0.5 m x 0.5 m test excavation unit
- 1 m x 1 m test excavation squares
- 2 m x 1 m test excavation trenches
- 3 m x 1 m test excavation trenches
- 6 m x 0.5 m test excavation trenches
- other irregular shaped excavations as fit for purpose (e.g. a 2 m x 1 m trench with a 0.5 m x 0.5 m square on each end etc.).

#### *Sieving*

The use of nested sieves is desirable. However, there is no restriction on the sieve aperture sizes that may be used above a 5 mm sieve in the nest. Where appropriate (e.g. for clayey soils) wet sieving should be used.

#### **Requirement 16b – Objects recovered during test excavations**

Any Aboriginal objects that are moved during test excavation must be reburied as soon as practicable in a secure temporary storage location in accordance with Requirement 26 pending any agreement reached as to the long-term management of the salvaged Aboriginal objects.

The person carrying out the test excavation is responsible for ensuring that procedures are put in place so that Aboriginal objects that are reburied are not harmed.

The location of the secure temporary storage location must be submitted to AHIMS with a site update record card for the site(s) in question.

### Requirement 17 – When to stop test excavations

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Any test excavation carried out under this Requirement must cease when:

- 1 suspected human remains are encountered (see Section 3.6), or
- 2 enough information has been recovered to adequately characterise the objects present with regard to their nature and significance.

#### Advisory note

To avoid doubt, 'enough information' means that the sample of excavated material clearly and self-evidently demonstrates the deposit's nature and significance, and may include things like:

- locally or regionally high object density
- presence of rare or representative objects
- presence of archaeological features or locally or regionally significant deposits, stratified or not.

### 3.2 Artefact recording

Stone artefacts are the most common type of Aboriginal object. Usually stone artefacts are the only remains left at the locations where Aboriginal people lived in the past. In the majority of cases the only time a stone artefact site will be recorded prior to harm is during archaeological investigation. This being the case it is important to collect as much information from the sites as possible.

The first priority in artefact recording must always be to avoid harm to the artefact site itself.

### Requirement 18 – Artefact recording

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**Purpose:** To document as much information as possible from the stone artefacts and stone artefact sites, without harming them. To make basic inferences about the type of activities that Aboriginal people carried out in different parts of the landscape, as well as identifying significant changes in the technologies used to produce stone artefacts throughout time. Wherever practicable it is preferable that artefacts be recorded in the field and remain on site.

The following requirements apply for both recording or sampling a stone artefact assemblage present on the ground surface.

#### Requirement 18a – Visible artefacts on the ground surface

- 1 Before picking up any artefact, the position of each artefact to be observed or recorded must be marked with a stake, flag, nail or similar.
- 2 Once their positions are marked, each artefact may then be picked up or moved and recorded (attributes, measurements, photography or drawing).

- 3 The artefact must then be replaced to its original position prior to repeating the process for the next and subsequent artefacts.
- 4 The requirements above do not authorise removal of artefacts from the site.

**Requirement 18b – Artefacts in section**

Under no circumstances are artefacts to be removed from a section.

**Requirement 18c – Partly buried artefacts**

Outside test excavations, if an artefact will not readily yield when pulled with fingers then it should remain buried and must not be extricated for recording or observation.

**Advisory note***Stone artefact identification*

There is a tendency to take the identification of stone artefacts, in particular flaked stone artefacts, for granted. However, 'we should not underestimate the level of skill required to accurately identify stone artefacts' (Hiscock and Clarkson 2000: 100).

The text book produced by Holdaway and Stern (2004) details the identification of and approaches to analysis of flaked stone artefacts. Hiscock (1989) provides a framework for and advice on the reasons and expectations for recording stone artefacts in the field.

**Requirement 19 – Attribute recording**

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- The attributes that must be recorded for artefacts are contained within the DECCW AHIMS Feature Recording Form and Feature Recording Table – Artefact.
- If sampling a surface artefact assemblage, be clear about the sampling method used, and provide appropriate justification and records (e.g. 'sampled because highest density area', 'sampled using 1 m x 1 m square', 'sample area clearly drawn and labelled on a site plan').

**Requirement 20 – Photography and drawing**

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- Up to six diagnostic or representative artefacts may be collected at a time for group photography or drawing without an AHIP (subject to the restrictions below).
- The artefacts must remain on site and must be returned to their original positions, as described in Requirement 18a above.
- Where informative, photographs showing the relationship of the surface conditions and artefacts (e.g. an area of particular artefact density) must be photographed.
- Photographs illustrating the context of the artefacts in relation to the wider landscape must be taken.
- All photographs must include an appropriate graded metric scale – mm or cm graded scales (such as an IFRAO standard scale) for macro artefact photography, and tens of cm or m graded scales (such as a range pole, surveying staff or tape measure) for wider angle or context photography.

### 3.3 Rock art

Rock art is images on rock surfaces. Images made by Aboriginal people on rock surfaces in the past are an Aboriginal object under the NPW Act. The images are usually found on suitable surfaces such as rock platforms, vertical rock surfaces or in rock shelters and caves. The images are usually classed with reference to their means of production:

- pictograms (produced by the adding of pigment to the rock surface – painting, drawing, stencilling, printing)
- petroglyphs (produced by breaking through or extracting the rock surface – pecking, pounding, abrading, scratching).

The first priority in rock art recording must always be to avoid harm to the art itself (including the panels or surfaces on which the art is located).

#### **Requirement 21 – AHIMS records**

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The attributes and features that must be recorded for rock art are contained within the DECCW AHIMS Feature Recording Form and Feature Recording Table – Art.

#### **Requirement 22 – Recording rock art**

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- People undertaking rock art recording must:
  - not physically touch or interfere with any pictogram or petroglyph
  - minimise disturbance to a shelter floor in the immediate vicinity of the rock art to reduce dust mobilisation
  - minimise movement on or over surfaces with petroglyphs
  - avoid, with the exception of necessity (scales, tape measures or drawing frames for recording), putting equipment on the art or the surface containing the art.
- Photograph:
  - context – landscape, shelter/feature/platform and setting at long-range and medium scales
  - internal context – to show location of panels and art
  - panels and individual motifs – use the IFRAO scale (see [www.cesmap.it/ifrao/scale.html](http://www.cesmap.it/ifrao/scale.html)); the scale must not be attached to the art panel surface with any adhesive media.
- Cross-reference all photographs, drawings and records using consistent identifiers (e.g. indicate panels or photographs on drawings).
- Include a photographic record of good quality (at least 8 megapixel) electronic images to be submitted with the site record.
- Consider the format the photographic data is recorded and provided in. Recognising that practitioners will use a range of digital cameras with differing capabilities in day-to-day activities, the preference for submission is (in order) RAW, TIFF, JPG. For archival recording RAW is essential.

**Advisory notes**

Repeated covering and uncovering of petroglyphs with soil and vegetation will adversely affect preservation conditions. Therefore removal of vegetation and soil covering petroglyphs must not be conducted without a plan for ongoing site management (Lambert 2007: 39, 42–43). This may require an AHIP.

Any rock art recording which involves the following activities requires an AHIP because it will harm the Aboriginal object:

- touching the art surface
- tracing or other contact with the art surface
- removal of pigments or other samples.

AHIMS forms must record as much information as possible. However, if harm is imminent and cannot be avoided, detailed recording by a specialist should be conducted.

### 3.4 Culturally modified trees

Aboriginal people used trees in many ways and in many environments. Bark was removed from trees for the purpose of making artefacts, vessels, shelters and medicines. In some regions of NSW, trees were carved with patterns and motifs for ceremonial purposes, or to mark burials. Bark was removed as both sheets, for shaped artefacts (e.g. canoes), and fibre for the manufacture of twine. Culturally modified trees can be a common type of archaeological site in areas where older trees survive.

The importance of scarred trees lies in their diversity and in the large amount of information they can tell us – individually, and as a class – about how and what Aboriginal people were doing at different times in the past. For example, scarred trees are the most important line of evidence with which to investigate the Aboriginal uses of wood and bark in the past, and they also record how different technologies such as steel axes were adopted and employed, and can give an insight into food-gathering activities (DEC and Andrew Long 2005).

#### **Requirement 23 – Recording culturally modified trees**

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- Culturally modified trees must not be harmed during recording. Any harm to a culturally modified tree requires an AHIP.
- The attributes and features that must be recorded for culturally modified trees are contained within the DECCW AHIMS Feature Recording Form and Feature Recording Table – Modified Tree.
- DECCW requires that identification and terminology for archaeological consideration and recording of carved and scarred trees be consistent with that specified in *Aboriginal scarred trees in New South Wales, a field manual* (DEC and Andrew Long 2005), available at [www.environment.nsw.gov.au/conservation/AboriginalScarredTrees.htm](http://www.environment.nsw.gov.au/conservation/AboriginalScarredTrees.htm).
- Where groups of culturally modified trees are present this must be noted, and must be mapped at an appropriate level of detail.

- Photographs with a clearly visible, appropriately sized (mm or cm for close-ups, tens of cm or m for distance and context) graded metric scale must be taken, showing:
  - the complete scar
  - close-up details of the scar where this is present and informative (e.g. tool marks)
  - the tree in its environmental context.
- A sketch of the tree must be made. The sketch should show relevant features such as the location and shape of the scar(s), the location of features such as tool marks, overall condition, damage, other identifying marks, nature of the dry-face and epicormic stems (if present).
- The identification of tree scars as being Aboriginal in origin is often subject to uncertainty (DEC and Andrew Long 2005: 36–49). Any uncertainty associated with a decision to record a scarred tree as an Aboriginal object should be detailed on the Feature Recording Form. The advice of an arborist (where it may resolve an issue of potential cultural origin) should be sought prior to a ‘possible’ scarred tree being recorded and registered on AHIMS.

**Advisory note**

Unlike many other kinds of Aboriginal objects, scarred trees live, grow, and die and are a relatively short-term component of the archaeological record. The objectives in recording scarred trees are to:

- establish the cause and approximate the time of scarring (e.g. Aboriginal, pre-contact, post-contact, recent, etc.)
- document the features of the scar for recording purposes and as a means of comparison with other trees and other areas, and
- document the conservation status of the tree and the scar for long-term management, monitoring and management decision-making.

The likelihood of previously unrecorded carved trees being located in NSW is low but should not be discounted. 300 sites with carved trees were known in the early years of the 20th century but by mid-century only about a third of these could be located, and by the end of the century only 78 were known to remain in their original locations (Geering *et al.* 1991: 42).

### 3.5 Middens

Given the poor conditions for the preservation of organic remains at most Aboriginal sites in NSW, shell midden sites, both coastal and inland, provide the greatest insight we have into the past Aboriginal food economy. While the same best practices relevant to the general recording of open sites and closed sites apply equally to middens, best practice for shell middens has much to do with the treatment of faunal remains.

#### **Requirement 24 – Recording shell middens**

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When recording shell middens the following steps must be followed:

- The attributes and features that must be recorded for middens are contained within the DECCW AHIMS Feature Recording Form and Feature Recording Table – Shell.
- Do not harm the midden in any way.
- Record the full range of shells (to species level if possible) and other materials visible on the surface of exposed middens.
- Provide an estimate of the rank and order of abundance (e.g. pre-dominant, common, rare) of species present.
- Draw and photograph any obvious changes in midden stratigraphy where middens are visible in section.
- Draw and photograph any features (e. g. pits or hearths) present.
- Estimate the density of shell (or bone) present, expressed as a ratio of shell (or bone) to sand (or other sedimentary context) on the basis either of ground surface exposure or exposed sections (e.g. eroding banks).

**Advisory notes**

Sullivan (1989: 51) provides a checklist of basic information about middens to record in the survey context.

Always be aware that in many cases in NSW, shell middens are also associated with Aboriginal ancestral remains.

Best practice in midden recording includes making the observations necessary to have reasonable confidence in distinguishing natural shell accumulation from an Aboriginal midden. Attenbrow (1992) and Bailey (1994) discuss the main criteria that archaeologists use to distinguish between middens and shell beds. However, there is no foolproof system of distinguishing natural shell deposits from shell midden deposits. Particular problems arise in estuarine contexts and in landscapes modified by European activities. Where there is uncertainty, best practice involves calling for an expert opinion from a person with expertise in coastal geomorphology or the archaeology of shell middens.

Best practice in midden recording includes making a determination on whether a midden has been redeposited or seriously disturbed. Expertise may be required in coastal geomorphology or shell midden archaeology.

The detectability of shell middens is limited by surface-obscuring vegetation as in the case of open sites. Middens may also be buried under metres of sand resulting from normal dune build-up and destabilisation.

Many middens are partially exposed in eroding coastal dunes or coastal and inland creek and river banks and the rest of the midden is covered by sand and vegetation.

**3.6 Burials or human remains**

Aboriginal ancestral remains may be found in a variety of landscapes throughout NSW, although most frequently they are found in middens, sand dunes, lunettes, bordering dunes and other sandy or soft sedimentary soils.

Aboriginal ancestral remains have a very special importance to Aboriginal people. This must always be acknowledged and respected.

**Requirement 25 – Aboriginal ancestral remains**

In all cases, the special importance of Aboriginal ancestral remains must be acknowledged and respected and the wishes of the Aboriginal community must be respected when making decisions regarding ancestral remains.

To avoid doubt, the precautionary principle must be applied to all physical remains suspected to be Aboriginal ancestral remains.

If any human remains are disturbed in, on or under the land, you must:

- 1 not further disturb or move these remains
- 2 immediately cease all work at the particular location
- 3 notify NSW Police

- 4 notify DECCW's Environment Line on 131 555 as soon as practicable and provide available details of the remains and their location
- 5 not recommence any work at the particular location unless authorised in writing by DECCW.

An Aboriginal community representative must be present where it is reasonably suspected burials or human remains may be encountered. If human remains are unexpectedly encountered and they are thought to be Aboriginal, the Aboriginal community must be notified immediately.

Recording of Aboriginal ancestral remains must be undertaken by, or be conducted under the direct supervision of, a specialist physical anthropologist or other suitably qualified person.

Archaeological reporting of Aboriginal ancestral remains must be undertaken by, or reviewed by, a specialist physical anthropologist or other suitably qualified person, with the intent of using respectful and appropriate language and treating the ancestral remains as the remains of Aboriginal people rather than as scientific specimens.

### 3.7 Stone artefact disposition and storage

Archaeological investigation frequently involves the collection of stone artefact assemblages.

#### **Requirement 26 – Stone artefact disposition and storage**

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**Purpose:** To describe the procedures for the disposition of stone artefacts dealt with under AHIPs or this Code.

For Aboriginal objects that are to be submitted to the Australian Museum, contact the Museum for any specific requirements they may have.

For Aboriginal objects that are to be held by an Aboriginal community or other party named in a Care Agreement, refer to that agreement.

For Aboriginal objects kept or returned to the location they originated from:

- A full catalogue, including photographic and drawn records for diagnostic stone artefacts, must be made.
- The catalogue must be in printed form, but may also include an electronic database in the form of a table containing all records.
- All stone artefacts must be either individually bagged or bagged in appropriate and identifiable units (e.g. excavation or collection units) that can be referenced back to the catalogue.
- The stone artefacts must be stored in good quality, double-bagged plastic zip-lock bags.
- The bags must be externally labelled using permanent marker, and an 'independent' label on robust material (e.g. tyvek) written with permanent marker must be placed inside each bag.
- The collection must be placed in a suitable impervious and permanent container, which must be labelled as above, or engraved.

- A full record of the final location of the collection must be made, including:
  - grid coordinates derived as set out in Requirement 8
  - a site plan or mud map referring to permanent features
  - depth of burial, if buried
  - full photographic record of the disposition.
- The record must be submitted to AHIMS with a site update record card for the site(s) in question.

**Advisory notes**

Many Aboriginal communities wish to have care of Aboriginal objects which have been excavated, disturbed or moved by development activities, erosion or other processes.

The NPW Act allows the transfer of Aboriginal objects to an Aboriginal person or Aboriginal organisation for safekeeping. The person or organisation must enter into a care agreement with DECCW.

A care agreement is a document that sets out the obligations of DECCW and the Aboriginal person or Aboriginal organisation for the long-term safekeeping of the transferred Aboriginal objects. The Aboriginal person or organisation does not become the owner of the Aboriginal objects.

## Appendix A – Definitions of terms used in this Code

**Aboriginal object** has the same meaning as ‘Aboriginal object’ in the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974* (NPW Act): ‘any deposit, object or material evidence (not being a handicraft made for sale) relating to the Aboriginal habitation of the area that comprises New South Wales, being habitation before or concurrent with (or both) the occupation of that area by persons of non-Aboriginal extraction, and includes Aboriginal remains’.

**Archaeological survey** is a method of data collection for Aboriginal heritage assessment. It involves a survey team walking over the land in a systematic way, recording information about how and where the survey is conducted, recording information about the landscape and recording any archaeological sites or materials that are visible on the land surface. The activities undertaken by a survey team do not involve invasive or destructive procedures, and are limited to note taking, photography and making other records of the landscape and archaeological sites (e.g. sketching maps or archaeological features).

**Artefact:** For the purposes of this Code, ‘artefact’ has the same meaning as object, (excluding the extension of the term to ‘deposits’) as defined in the NPW Act.

**Conflict site** means a site where confrontation occurred between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people or between different Aboriginal groups.

**Contact site** means a site relating to the period of first contact between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people.

**Culturally modified tree** means a tree that has been scarred, carved or modified by an Aboriginal person by:

- (a) the deliberate removal, by traditional methods, of bark or wood from the tree, or
- (b) the deliberate modification, by traditional methods, of the wood of the tree.

**Declared Aboriginal place** is a statutory concept, meaning any place declared to be an Aboriginal place (under s.84 of the NPW Act) by the Minister administering the NPW Act, by order published in the Gazette, because the Minister is of the opinion that the place is or was of special significance with respect to Aboriginal culture. It may or may not contain Aboriginal objects.

**Exposed in section** and **section** refers to the vertical exposure of a soil that reveals the stratigraphy or the profile of the soil and any objects it may contain. Sections may:

- be revealed during archaeological excavations (formed by the walls of the excavation)
- occur naturally in creek and river banks, land slips, wind-eroded dune faces or other such naturally formed vertical profiles, or
- be formed artificially, for example in road and railway cuttings.

**Exposure** is different to visibility because it estimates the area with a likelihood of revealing buried artefacts or deposits rather than just being an observation of the amount of bare ground. It is the percentage of land for which erosion and exposure was sufficient to reveal archaeological evidence on the surface of the ground. Put another way, exposure refers to ‘what reveals’ (see also Burke and Smith 2004: 78–80, NPWS 1999).

**Exposure type** refers to the results of erosional processes: sheet wash, gullying, blow-outs, salt scalds, tracks or animal pads. As well as erosional processes, ground exposure may be caused by earth-moving machinery (e.g. bulldozers and graders, vehicle traffic etc.).

**Full coverage survey** means a survey conducted on foot in which all surfaces within the subject area are systematically observed and recorded.

**Hand tools** include spades, trowels, shovels, pans and brushes.

**Landforms** are the units (or similar) of land description explained and defined as 'landform elements' in The National Committee on Soil and Terrain (eds) *Australian Soil and Land Survey Field Handbook*. Landforms have a characteristic dimension of about 40 m. There are 70 landform elements defined in the *Australian Soil and Land Survey Field Handbook* (Speight 1990: 16; 17–44). Landforms are the primary subdivisions for the survey stratification.

**Material traces** of past Aboriginal land use has the same meaning as 'Aboriginal object' in the NPW Act. See 'Aboriginal object'.

**Objects** has the same meaning as 'Aboriginal object' in the NPW Act. See 'Aboriginal object'.

**Potential archaeological deposit (PAD)** is an area where sub-surface stone artefacts and/or other cultural materials are likely to occur (DEC 2005: 67).

**Rock shelters** are vertical or overhanging rock formations, including any flat or not steeply inclined ground surface below the overhang or at the base of the vertical face, which contain, or may be reasonably expected to contain, material traces of past Aboriginal land use (objects).

**Section:** See 'Exposed in section'.

**Sites** is sometimes used as another name for Aboriginal objects and material traces of past Aboriginal land use. The term is commonly used in archaeological assessments and discourse.

**Survey units** are strictly defined by DECCW to include only units of land that have been surveyed on foot. A survey unit may include more than one landform unit, correspond to a landform unit or be smaller than a landform unit depending on how the sampling strategy is structured. The survey unit is the minimum analytical or descriptive unit for the survey, and may be the same as the landform. A single survey unit should not cross the boundaries of different landforms, but there may be more than one survey unit within a landform. Sometimes survey units are also referred to as 'sampling units'.

**Subject area** refers to the area that is the subject of archaeological investigation. Ordinarily this would include the area that is being considered for development approval, inclusive of the proposed development footprint and all associated land parcels. To avoid doubt, the subject area should be determined and presented on a project-by-project basis.

**Types of sites** or **types of features** refers to the particular characteristics of material traces of past Aboriginal land use. For example, a rock shelter site is a type of site distinct from a scared tree. In addition, a rock shelter site (and indeed many sites) may contain multiple archaeological or cultural features: rock art, stone artefacts, archaeological deposits.

**Vehicle traverses** are activities involving the archaeological observation of a subject area from a vehicle.

**Visibility** is the amount of bare ground (or visibility) on the exposures which might reveal artefacts or other archaeological materials. It is important to note that visibility, on its own, is not a reliable indicator of the detectability of buried archaeological material. Things like vegetation, plant or leaf litter, loose sand, stony ground or introduced materials will affect the visibility. Put another way, visibility refers to 'what conceals' (see also Burke and Smith 2004: 78–80, NPWS 1999).

## Definitions used in survey results tables

### Survey coverage definitions

<b>Survey unit</b>	See definition above.
<b>Landform</b>	The landform within the survey unit; see definition above.
<b>Survey unit area</b>	The area surveyed, calculated as the length of the survey unit multiplied by the width of the survey unit.
<b>Visibility %</b>	See definition above.
<b>Exposure %</b>	See definition above.
<b>Effective coverage area</b>	The survey unit area multiplied by the visibility % and exposure % – either square metres or hectares.
<b>Effective coverage %</b>	The effective coverage area divided by the survey unit area and multiplied by 100.

### Landform summary – sampled areas definitions

<b>Landform</b>	The landform within the survey unit; see definition above.
<b>Landform area</b>	The total area of the landform within the subject area.
<b>Area surveyed</b>	The area of the landform that has been surveyed. Calculated by summing by landform the results in the survey coverage table.
<b>Area effectively surveyed</b>	The area of the landform effectively surveyed. Calculated by grouping by landform the results in the survey coverage table.
<b>% of landform effectively surveyed</b>	The area effectively surveyed divided by the landform area multiplied by 100.
<b>Number of sites</b>	A count of the number of previously recorded and newly recorded sites, grouped by landform.
<b>Number of artefacts or features</b>	Where the data is available, a count of features and artefacts grouped by landform.





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# 1. INTRODUCTION

We all have a social and economic interest in ensuring that injured workers return to work safely and as soon as possible following a workplace injury or illness. The longer an injured worker has to wait for assistance the less likely it is to be effective and the more likely that the worker will develop long term disability and work loss. Hence, early return to work is a central feature of the workers compensation system in NSW.

Recent research<sup>(1,2,3,4)</sup> affirms that the best place to rehabilitate most injured workers is in the workplace. Apart from promoting a quicker recovery, activities undertaken at work have proven to be more therapeutic than prolonged rest or only receiving treatment in a clinic away from the workplace. Having the injured worker at work also allows for the early identification of any issues that may hinder a worker's rehabilitation and the development of strategies to overcome them.

Effective injury management relies on the cooperative efforts of all participants – employers, workers, insurers<sup>5</sup>, doctors and other health practitioners. The key principles underlying the safe, early and durable return to work of injured workers include:

- having systems in place to ensure everyone at the workplace agrees, understands and knows what to do in the event of an injury
- early reporting of injuries and early intervention
- the workplace being the most effective place for the majority of workers to recover from their injury
- key parties working together.

The requirement that employers be involved in the return to work of injured workers was introduced in the *Workers Compensation Act 1987*. In 1998, *the Workplace Injury Management and Workers Compensation Act* was proclaimed and introduced the concept of injury management to include treatment, rehabilitation and retraining of injured workers, claims management and employment management practices. In addition, the new law changed the name of a 'rehabilitation program' to a 'return to work program'. Further regulatory changes in 1999 changed the name of the rehabilitation coordinator to return to work coordinator and allowed for shared return to work coordinator arrangements between employers.



Employers must document policies and procedures outlining the system to manage workers who suffer a work related injury or illness. This document, called a return to work program, must be consistent with the injury management program of the employer’s insurer. The injury management program is the blueprint statement that sets out how treatment, rehabilitation, claims management and employment practices are to be coordinated to achieve a safe and durable return to work for an injured worker.



The *Guidelines for workplace return to work programs* will assist employers to comply with their legislative obligations under the *Workplace Injury Management and Workers Compensation Act 1998*, the *Workers Compensation Act 1987* and the *Workers Compensation Regulation 2003*.

These guidelines apply to Category 1 employers.

A Category 1 employer is an employer:

- with a basic tariff premium exceeding \$50,000 per annum, or
- who is self insured, or
- who is insured by a specialised insurer, and who employs more than 20 workers.

A Category 2 employer is any employer who is not a Category 1 employer.

Guidelines for shared arrangements for return to work coordinators for Category 1 and Category 2 employers and confidentiality guidelines are also contained in this publication.

A checklist *Return to work program content* to assist all employers to comply with the legislative requirements of injury management is contained in section 4.

## 2. OBLIGATIONS

### (i) Employer

The employer must:

- ensure the health, safety and welfare at work of all workers
- have a workers compensation insurance policy covering all employees
- initiate development of a return to work program with the commencement of business operations and have the program in place within 12 months of becoming an employer
- develop, implement and review the return to work program in consultation with workers and relevant unions at least every two years
- produce the program in printed form
- display a summary of the program prominently in workplaces
- display, at a minimum, a summary in the workplace of the Workers Compensation legislation about giving notice of an injury and the making of a claim
- appoint a trained return to work coordinator with the necessary qualifications, authority and resources to negotiate, develop and implement return to work policies and procedures
- select and nominate approved workplace rehabilitation providers in consultation with workers and relevant unions
- maintain a register of injuries in which workers record details of work-related injuries (refer to Appendix G)
- notify the insurer of all workplace injures within 48 hours
- repay the insurer the equivalent of one week of the injured worker's weekly compensation if the injury is not notified within five days of the employer becoming aware of the injury
- keep a record of wages paid for at least the previous five years (failure to comply may result in a fine of \$500 or prosecution with a penalty of up to \$55,000 – current at time of printing)
- provide wage information to the insurer within 7 days of request from insurer or receipt of information
- notify WorkCover immediately on 13 10 50 of serious incidents
- not dismiss an injured worker because of the injury within six months of the worker first becoming unfit for employment
- provide workers with adequate information about workers compensation and return to work procedures, including their choice of doctor and rehabilitation provider and how to change providers, if required
- advise the worker's nominated treating doctor and insurer on the requirements of the worker's

usual job and availability of suitable duties

- make suitable duties available to injured workers who are certified fit for suitable duties (partially incapacitated) if reasonably practicable to do so
- comply with medical restrictions resulting from the work injury as obtained from the treating doctor
- notify the insurer immediately if unable to provide suitable employment for a partially incapacitated worker and ask the insurer about any impact on premium
- provide a worker with a workers compensation claim form if requested

- send an injured worker's claim form to the insurer within seven days of receipt
- participate and cooperate in the establishment of an injury management plan for an injured worker and give effect to that plan at the workplace
- comply with obligations imposed on the employer in the injury management plan written by the insurer
- cooperate with the insurer in engaging assistance from a workplace rehabilitation provider if the worker faces barriers in returning to work
- cooperate with the insurer in providing retraining or different job opportunities to an injured worker who is unable to return to their pre-injury job
- respect the privacy and confidentiality of medical examinations by arranging a separate discussion between the worker, doctor and employer.

## **(ii) Workers**

Workers must:

- cooperate with the employer to prevent work-related injuries to self and others
- cooperate with the employer to enable the employer to meet their return to work obligations
- cooperate in workplace changes designed to assist the return to work of fellow workers if injured:
  - notify the employer of a workplace injury as soon as possible after the injury happens
  - specify one nominated doctor or medical practice who is prepared to participate in the development and implementation of an injury management plan
  - give consent for the nominated treating doctor to provide information for the purposes of an injury management plan and return to work plan
  - participate and cooperate in the establishment of the initial and subsequent injury management plans
  - make all reasonable efforts to return to work with the pre-injury employer as soon as possible

- comply with the activities detailed in injury management plan(s)
- advise of any difficulties with return to work as soon as practical to prevent delays in addressing any problems.

If the injured worker unreasonably refuses to comply with their injury management plan, the insurer can suspend weekly benefits. Before suspending benefits, the insurer must write to the worker stating the reasons for suspension and what the worker must do to prevent the suspension.

### **(iii) Insurer**

The insurer must:

- ensure that employers are made aware of their legislative obligations in relation to the insurer's injury management program
- within three working days of being notified that a worker has sustained a significant injury, contact the employer, worker and (if necessary) the nominated treating doctor. Subsequently, the insurer must develop an injury management plan in line with timeframes in the insurer's injury management program
- within seven days of being notified by the employer (or the worker, or another person) that a worker has sustained a significant injury, begin provisional payments of weekly benefits and medical expenses, or advise the worker and the employer why they will not make payments
- consult with the injured worker, employer and nominated treating doctor in the development of an injury management plan
- provide the injured worker, employer and nominated treating doctor with information on the injury management plan initially and as the plan progresses
- inform the worker that their entitlements to weekly benefits can be suspended if they do not reasonably comply with their injury management plan and what they must do to prevent the suspension
- have procedures in place for an injured worker to change their nominated treating doctor and inform the injured worker of these requirements
- consult with the injured worker, employer and nominated treating doctor when referring to a workplace rehabilitation provider. Advise the injured worker that they can choose a rehabilitation provider and inform the injured worker of the process to be followed when changing a rehabilitation provider
- ensure vocational retraining and/or assistance to obtain employment with a new employer is arranged for an injured worker as soon as it is identified that a return to pre-injury duties and provision of suitable duties is no longer possible
- ensure accuracy of payment of weekly benefits in accordance with wage as advised by the employer and legislative requirements

- provide injured worker with information about their weekly benefits and entitlements and how they may change over time.

#### **(iv) Nominated treating doctor**

The nominated treating doctor must:

- complete WorkCover medical certificates
- arrange and monitor appropriate treatment
- specify medical restrictions and advise on the suitability of duties offered by the employer
- provide information to the insurer and employer in relation to injury management and return to work plans for the injured worker
- certify time off only if it is medically necessary
- promote an early and safe return to work of the worker
- review the progress of recovery of the injured worker and revise the worker's medical management as needed
- arrange referral to an approved workplace rehabilitation provider, if required, and if not initiated by the employer or insurer
- advise employer/insurer on availability for discussion about injury management and return to work.

#### **(v) Workplace rehabilitation provider**

The workplace rehabilitation provider must:

- deliver services to workers, employers and insurers in a cost effective, timely and proactive manner to achieve a safe and durable return to work
- promote an early and safe return to work of the worker
- ensure the needs of the worker and employer are identified by means of adequate and appropriate assessment
- identify barriers to injured worker's return to work and develop strategies to address these
- identify and design suitable duties for the worker to assist the employer to meet their obligations in providing suitable employment
- identify and coordinate rehabilitation strategies that ensure the worker is able to safely perform their duties
- consider workplace industrial relations and human resource matters that may affect the worker's return to work
- focus initially on return to work in the worker's pre-injury employment or, if that is not possible, on other employment in line with the hierarchy of return to work

- arrange appropriate retraining and placement in alternative employment when the worker is unable to return to pre-injury duties
- communicate with relevant parties throughout service provision to ensure progress towards the return to work goal.

### **3. HOW TO DEVELOP A WORKPLACE RETURN TO WORK PROGRAM**

This section outlines the essential elements of a workplace return to work program, with guidelines for its establishment.

A return to work program is a summary of an agreed system that an employer must have in place in readiness for the management of workers who suffer a work-related injury or illness. The return to work program is a system agreed by the employer and worker representatives. It is made up of a series of policies and procedures. The underlying principles of the system and examples of wording are outlined in the following pages. The final wording and format is a decision for each workplace.

The policies and procedures outlined in these guidelines are a minimum requirement for a return to work program. Employers, in consultation with workers, may add additional policies or procedures that are relevant to their workplace. The return to work program for an individual employer must reflect the business practices, culture and environment of the workplace.

The workplace return to work program forms a component of the overall injury management approach of the insurer and must be consistent with that insurer's injury management program. Insurers' programs may require employers to include specific policies and procedures.

The effectiveness and continued relevance of the return to work program should be reviewed on a regular basis and agreed by the relevant parties. All programs should set specific dates for review appropriate to the circumstances of the workplace. At a minimum reviews should be conducted every two years.

## 4. RETURN TO WORK PROGRAM CONTENT

A return to work program must cover the following key areas:

- preventing occupational injuries and illness
- how the return to work program was developed and implemented including relevant information and training strategies for the workforce
- consulting with workers and any industrial unions representing those workers
- early commencement of injury management and early return to work
- providing suitable duties and/or vocational retraining/job placement assistance
- returning to work not to disadvantage injured workers.

### (i) Preventing occupational injuries and illness

An emphasis on injury prevention in the workplace will reduce workplace injury and illness.

#### Principles

- Employers must comply with their obligations under the *Occupational Health & Safety Act 2000* to ensure a safe and healthy working environment and provide for their employees' welfare.
- Employers should understand the requirements regarding identification, assessment, elimination or control of workplace risks to prevent injury and illness.
- The investigation of workplace incidents in a spirit of 'no blame' is an important factor in the development of prevention programs with a focus on identifying safety management system deficiencies.
- Formal consultation procedures between employers and their workers play an important role in helping to provide a safe and healthy working environment. Employers must consult their workers on issues concerning their health, safety and welfare at work.

#### Example of a policy about preventing occupational injuries and illness:

*'This employer is committed to preventing injury and illness through providing a safe and healthy working environment and providing for the welfare of employees.'*

#### Procedures for preventing occupational injuries and illness

- The implementation of a systematic approach to the identification, assessment, elimination or control of hazards which may cause injuries and illness.

## **(ii) How the return to work program was developed and implemented including relevant information and training strategies for the workforce**

It is mandatory for Category 1 employers to develop a return to work program, in consultation with their workforce and any industrial unions representing those workers. Category 2 employers can adopt and adapt the standard return to work program available from WorkCover in consultation with workers to better fit their workplace.

Employers can enlist assistance in developing their return to work program from bodies such as a return to work sub-committee of their occupational health and safety committee, an employer association or an approved workplace rehabilitation provider.

Use the WorkCover guidance material that follows. This material sets out the minimum legislative requirements. You may modify the steps in the return to work process to suit your individual organisation but these must comply with the principles set out below.

### **Principles**

- The return to work program outlines a plan of action common to all workers, from early notification of an injury through to return to pre-injury duties, redeployment, retraining or assistance to obtain employment with a new employer, if required.
- The workplace return to work program must be consistent with the insurer's injury management program and be reviewed at least every two years.
- The return to work program is developed in consultation with workers and any industrial unions representing them.
- The return to work program will include the names of nominated workplace rehabilitation providers, selected in consultation with worker representatives or their union.
- The return to work program should include an outline of relevant information and training strategies for the workforce.
- Injured workers can choose their own workplace rehabilitation provider, in consultation with the employer and insurer.
- The return to work program should include procedures that will apply to workers who are returning to work while receiving treatment.
- Treatment by medical practitioners and other health professionals is intended to facilitate return to work, not impede it. Workers need to nominate a medical practitioner to be involved in managing their treatment and providing advice on return to work activities.
- The return to work program should reflect management commitment to the rehabilitation of injured workers and should be signed or otherwise endorsed by senior management and by senior worker representatives involved in its development.

#### **Example of a policy for developing and implementing the return to work program**

*'This employer has, through consultation and agreement with worker representatives, developed a return to work program for the management of workers who are injured at work. This program forms part of the operating procedures of the organisation, is consistent with the insurer's injury management program and will be reviewed every two years.'*

**Procedures for developing and implementing the return to work program**

- Write the return to work program in plain English and consider making it available in other languages where required.
- Divide the return to work program into sub-headings:
  - Notification of injury
  - First aid, medical treatment
  - Early contact with worker and their treating health practitioners
  - Identification and role of the return to work coordinator
  - Nomination and role of the approved workplace rehabilitation provider
  - Provision of suitable duties
  - Arrangements with the insurer for vocational retraining and job placement assistance when required
  - Arrangements for dispute resolution
  - Administrative arrangements.
- Appoint an appropriately trained return to work coordinator, and list the name and contact details on the return to work program. The return to work coordinator has a central communication role as the link with all of the key players. More information about the role of the return to work coordinator can be found in section 5 of these Guidelines. The initial role of the return to work coordinator is to develop a return to work program in consultation with the workforce. The return to work coordinator needs to have the appropriate authority and resources to effectively negotiate, develop and implement the program.
- Nominate preferred workplace rehabilitation providers in the return to work program. Consideration should be given to the fields of expertise that a particular workplace may require. For example, a financial institution may need a rehabilitation provider who is familiar with occupational overuse injuries and/or management of critical incidents. Following consultation, the selection of nominated providers will be agreed between the employer and workers or their representatives. Management will facilitate reasonable access to the workplace by a rehabilitation provider involved in rehabilitation at that workplace. The program should also outline the procedure for changing workplace rehabilitation providers.
- Arrange discussions/meetings with worker representatives to draft the return to work program and to agree on steps to be taken to return injured workers to work as soon as possible.

**(iii) Consulting with workers and any industrial unions representing those workers**

Under the *Workplace Injury Management and Workers Compensation Act 1998*, the employer is required to consult with the workers and any industrial union representing those workers in developing a return to work program.

Workers must be informed of their rights and obligations regarding return to work and workers compensation. It is in the employer's interest to provide them with clear information to avoid misunderstandings and uncertainty. An open communication policy encourages cooperation and participation in the return to work process.

The form of consultation taken should be noted on the return to work program.

### Principles

- Consultation with workers can be facilitated through workplace occupational health and safety committees, unions or other agreed consultative mechanisms.
- The particular needs of workers who do not speak English must be accommodated.

#### **Example of a policy to consult with workers**

*'This return to work program was developed by... (management representative) in consultation with... (worker representatives).'*

*'Workers will be regularly informed of their rights and responsibilities and of company policies on return to work through for example workers' induction programs, training courses, staff meetings, newsletters and notice-boards.'*

*Workers will be consulted through a range of mechanisms such as formal consultation with workers and unions, occupational health and safety committees, tool box sessions and staff meetings.'*

#### **Procedures for consulting with workers and any industrial unions representing those workers**

- The return to work program must be displayed at all workplaces.
- Mechanisms for consulting workers can include:
  - a formal consultation mechanism with workers and unions
  - occupational health and safety committees where committee members have the appropriate skills and knowledge.
- Information about employer's requirements in relation to return to work processes can be communicated by for example worker induction programs, training courses, staff meetings, newsletters and notice-boards. A system for use of interpreters for workers who speak languages other than English is to be established. (Refer to Appendix B of this publication for information about interpreters and language services).

#### **(iv) Early commencement of injury management and early return to work**

The prospect for return to work is greatest when the process commences as soon as possible after an injury occurs. The longer an injured worker has to wait for appropriate assistance, the less likely it is to be effective.


Employers are required to notify all injuries to their insurer within 48 hours of being aware of the injury. The insurer has the responsibility to contact the worker and employer within three working days of notification of a significant injury, and to contact the treating doctor if necessary. The purpose of this insurer contact is to gather and provide information to all parties, identify needs, implement appropriate strategies and commence injury management planning.

The employer must participate and cooperate in the development of an injury management plan by the insurer for every worker with a significant injury. This plan will outline all the return to work

activities and treatment services for the individual injured worker. The employer and the worker must comply with obligations imposed on them under the injury management plan – the insurer will advise on obligations and potential penalties.

The workplace is the most effective place for the majority of workers to recover from their injury, through the provision of duties consistent with the worker's current work capacity. A constructive relationship between the employer and worker is the key to successful return to work.

### The initial steps in injury management

## Principles

- Employers need to foster a workplace culture, which promotes early return to work.
- There should be immediate treatment of the injury or illness in order to facilitate early management of the injury.
- The recovery period away from the workplace should be as short as possible.
- Priority should be given to an early, safe return to suitable duties following injury or illness, in a manner that takes account of all relevant factors including medical input.
- There should be a staged return to pre-injury duties.
- Training for another job with the current employer, or with a different employer, should be considered as soon as it is known that the injury will prevent a worker from permanently returning to pre-injury duties.

### **Example of a policy for the early commencement of injury management and early return to work**

*'This employer will ensure that the return to work process is commenced as soon as possible after an injury in a manner consistent with the worker's medical fitness for work.'*

*'This employer is committed to ensuring that early return to work by an injured worker is a normal practice and expectation.'*

### **Procedures for the early commencement of injury management and return to work**

- The employer will develop a system for early reporting by workers of injuries they sustain, and inform the workforce of their obligations to follow these procedures.
- The employer must have a system for notification of injuries to the insurer within 48 hours of becoming aware of the injury.
- Serious incidents involving a fatality, a serious injury/illness or an immediate threat to life, must be immediately notified to WorkCover's Information Centre by telephoning 13 10 50.
- A system for regular and supportive contact with the worker and the worker's treating doctor should be developed.
- The employer will assist the insurer to develop an injury management plan, inclusive of suitable duties, as soon as possible after notification of the injury.
- The times at which the worker will attend for treatment will be included in return to work plans and will be negotiated between the worker and the employer. Consideration needs to be given to, for example, the location of work and treatment, work routines, productivity and worker responsibilities while at work and at home.
- Treatment should be obtained by workers out of working hours taking into account the worker's circumstances for example:
  - if a worker is fit for reduced hours, treatment appointments would be out of working hours; or
  - if a worker is fit for pre-injury hours but would normally have child care responsibilities out of work hours, it is reasonable some treatment appointments can be made during work hours.

- When it is clear the injured worker is not able to be accommodated at the original workplace, assistance is to be provided to the worker to obtain new employment as early as possible. The insurer, employer and the injured worker should discuss how these arrangements are best managed<sup>7</sup>.
- A confidential return to work file on each injured worker will be established and maintained. The individual files will be held by the return to work coordinator, and access to the worker's own file will be granted, if requested. (Refer to confidentiality guidelines in Appendix C of this publication.) Coordinators will provide assistance to workers who speak languages other than English to understand the correspondence in the files. This may include arranging interpreter services. (Information about the provision of interpreter services and bilingual community resources is available in Appendix B.)

### **(v) Providing suitable duties and/or vocational retraining/job placement assistance**

The fact that a worker is injured does not usually mean they cannot work at all. The most important aspect of an employer's commitment to helping an injured worker to return to work in a timely and safe manner is to provide suitable duties.

At the workplace the employer, designated return to work coordinator or an approved rehabilitation provider is to identify the availability of suitable duties. The successful identification of these will ultimately be determined by the quality of information collected with regard to:

- the worker's capacity for work
- the demands and nature of tasks within the workplace
- how readily these tasks can be matched to help upgrade and improve the worker's capacity to return to pre-injury duties.

#### **Principles**

- Employers must comply with section 49 of the 1998 Act, which requires that:
  - an employer will provide suitable employment (as far as is reasonably practicable) when an injured worker is able to return to work, either on a full-time or part-time basis
  - the suitable employment provided will be (as far as is reasonably practicable) the same as or equivalent to the work being performed at the time of the injury.
- Careful individual assessment of such duties is required. Such assessment should address the possible duties, the workplace and the worker's medical restrictions and physical capacity and be in accord with occupational health and safety practice.
- Duties provided must be suitable as defined in section 43A of the 1987 Act (copy of section 43A is attached in Appendix F).
- An individual return to work plan must be developed for each injured worker who is to return to work on suitable duties. A return to work plan can be developed by a trained return to work coordinator or an approved workplace rehabilitation provider. It must be developed in consultation

with all the relevant parties, including the nominated treating doctor.

Copies of the agreed return to work plan should be distributed to the injured worker, employer, treating doctor and any other relevant signatories.

- A return to work plan should be in writing and contain:
  - the job title and location
  - agreed purpose or goal of suitable duties (for example, to return to pre-injury job, or an interim measure to assess capacity to return to pre-injury duties, or to an alternative job)
  - the supervisor
  - hours/days to be worked
  - duties, including capacity, restrictions or specific duties to be avoided
  - arrangements to attend treatment or medical appointments
  - commencement date
  - length of program
  - review dates
  - documented agreement by injured worker, employer representative, nominated treating doctor and, if applicable, union representative.
- In developing return to work plans, consideration should be given to:
  - the special needs of individual workers, for example, the communication needs of workers who speak languages other than English
  - the personal circumstances of injured workers that may impact on suitable duties, for example, child care arrangements
  - industrial issues in the workplace
  - impact on the workload of other workers
  - whether the worker may require training in the suitable duties tasks prior to the return to work plan being implemented.

#### **Example of a policy to provide suitable duties**

*'...This employer offers suitable duties to partially incapacitated workers. The officer responsible for arranging suitable duties for this workplace is...'*

#### **Procedures to provide suitable duties**

- No duties shall be offered without approval from the nominated treating doctor or, in exceptional cases, other medical advice. The employer will develop a system for communication with the worker's nominated treating doctor to confirm medical restrictions and the suitability of duties.

**Examples of communication strategies to enhance effective communication include:**

- *sending the doctor a copy of the injured worker's signed consent form*
- *asking the receptionist about the best time to phone the doctor*
- *sending a letter or fax to the doctor if unable to speak to them*
- *providing the doctor with information about available suitable duties through for example, a list of demands of the tasks, photographs or video, a workplace visit by the doctor*
- *notifying the doctor that they can charge for communication with the employer at the AMA and WorkCover agreed rate*
- *keeping the conversation as short as possible*
- *limiting discussions to the worker's functional abilities*
- *faxing a weekly summary of the worker's progress on suitable duties.*

- The following (in line with section 43A of the 1987 Act) will be considered when determining whether a job for a partially incapacitated worker is suitable:
  - the nature of the worker's incapacity and pre-injury employment
  - details of restrictions given in the medical certificate supplied by the treating doctor
  - the worker's age, education, skills and work experience
  - where the worker resides
  - the provisions of any injury management plan for the worker
  - any suitable employment for which the worker has received rehabilitation training
  - the length of time the worker has been seeking suitable employment
  - suitable duties must be productive and meaningful (not token), and not demeaning to the worker
  - other relevant matters.
- Suitable duties may be provided in many different ways – at the same or different workplace, the same job with different hours, modified duties, a different job altogether, training opportunities or a combination of these options. The first option to consider, however, is the duties closest to the worker's pre-injury duties.

The following return to work framework outlines possible return to work outcomes for injured workers. If the first option of return to work to the pre-injury job is not possible, the remaining options should be explored in accordance with the circumstances of the worker and the employer.

The following tables combine return to work outcomes with possible work hours, as a guide to developing return to work plans.

**Same employer / Same job**

When return to work with the same employer, on the same job is likely, a return to work plan may include one or more of these options that address changes to duties or hours:		
Duties	Hours	Goal
suitable duties	normal hours	upgrade to pre-injury duties
pre-injury duties	reduced hours	upgrade to normal hours
suitable duties	reduced hours	upgrade to pre-injury duties and hours

**Same employer / Different job**

When return to work with the same employer, on a different job is likely, a return to work plan may include one or more of these options:		
Duties	Hours	Goal
suitable duties for different job	normal hours	upgrade to normal duties of different job
normal duties of different job	reduced hours	upgrade to normal hours of different job
suitable duties for different job	reduced hours	upgrade to normal duties and hours of different job

**Different employer / Similar job**

When return to work with a new employer, in a similar job is likely, a return to work plan may include one or more of these options:		
Duties	Hours	Goal
suitable duties	normal hours	upgrade to normal duties
normal duties	reduced hours	upgrade to normal hours
suitable duties	reduced hours	upgrade to normal duties and hours

**Different employer / Different job**

When return to work with a new employer, in a different job is likely, a return to work plan may include one or more of these options:		
Duties	Hours	Goal
suitable duties for different job	normal hours	upgrade to normal duties of different job
normal duties of different job	reduced hours	upgrade to normal hours of different job
suitable duties for different job	reduced hours	upgrade to normal duties and hours of different job

- Suitable duties need to be time limited, monitored closely and regularly upgraded towards pre-injury hours and duties where appropriate.
- All offers of suitable duties should be in writing, clearly listing the duties to be performed, working hours, physical/medical restrictions, dates and times of treatments and review.
- All appropriate parties should be consulted in the development of, or changes to, suitable duties. Consultation on suitable duties should include, where applicable:
  - the return to work coordinator
  - the worker
  - the worker's line supervisors, usual and proposed
  - the nominated treating doctor
  - the approved workplace rehabilitation provider
  - any industrial union of employees representing that worker (current and potential)
  - the insurer.
- Return to work plans will be negotiated between the employer and worker. The plan will follow arrangements described in the return to work program and will be endorsed by the nominated treating doctor.
- Rehabilitation providers and return to work coordinators need to work cooperatively with the nominated treating doctor, that is, the doctor nominated by the injured worker to participate in the development of, and arrangements under, an injury management plan.
- Referrals to approved workplace rehabilitation providers should be considered when the return to work plan is complex and beyond the ability of the coordinator to develop. These referrals should be discussed with the insurer and worker and made as early as possible.
- If there are disputes about the suitability of duties an injury management consultant can be engaged to assist in resolution. Details of injury management consultants are available from the WorkCover website or the insurer. The Workers Compensation Commission has powers to resolve disputes about the suitability of duties offered.
- When suitable duties cannot be identified at the workplace, WorkCover's Work Trial Program can be used to provide suitable duties with another (host) employer. Details can be obtained from the rehabilitation provider involved in the case, WorkCover's Provider Services Branch and from WorkCover's website [www.workcover.nsw.gov.au](http://www.workcover.nsw.gov.au) (refer to Appendix B of this publication).

#### **(vi) Returning to work not to disadvantage injured workers**

An injured worker should not be disadvantaged while participating in the process of return to work. The overall objective of the legislation is to ensure successful return to work. Employers and workers should act collaboratively to ensure the success of the system as it is to their mutual benefit.

The spirit of the legislation is one of workplace cooperation between all the parties on all aspects of injury management. The successful return to work of the injured worker should be the paramount concern of all parties at the workplace.

When it is clear the injured worker is not able to be accommodated at the original workplace, assistance is to be provided to the worker to obtain new employment as early as possible. The insurer,

employer and the injured worker should discuss how these arrangements are best managed (reference section 52 and 53 of the 1998 Act).

### Principles

- Employers should advise injured workers of their entitlements and their rights and obligations under the *Workplace Injury Management and Workers Compensation Act 1998* and the *Workers Compensation Act 1987*.
- Employers need to include information about dispute prevention and resolution resources in their return to work programs, particularly in relation to problems about suitable duties.
- Sections 240-250 in Part 8 of the *Workers Compensation Act 1987* provide that an employer shall not dismiss an injured worker for six months (or the duration of any accident pay specified in the award or agreement that can be accessed by the injured worker) after the worker becomes unfit for employment as a result of a work-related injury. If an injured worker is dismissed because they are not fit for employment as a result of the injury received, the worker can apply to the employer for reinstatement. Application for reinstatement may be made up to two years from dismissal. During this time, the employer must inform any worker who has been engaged to replace the injured worker that the injured worker may be reinstated to the position.
- The Industrial Relations Commission may, on application by the worker, order reinstatement to employment for which the worker is fit (refer to sections 240-250 in Part 8 of the *Workers Compensation Act 1987*).

#### **Example of policy Returning to work does not disadvantage injured workers**

*'This employer is committed to ensuring that participation in a return to work plan will not, of itself, disadvantage an injured worker. All efforts will be made to resolve disagreements about the company's return to work program, or its components, through discussions and in a spirit of cooperation.'*

#### **Procedures for Returning to work does not disadvantage injured workers**

- The employer may permit workers access to their sick leave as per award arrangements, if they provide a medical certificate. If the medical condition is subsequently accepted as a compensable injury, the worker's sick leave entitlements will be adjusted.
- Injured workers are able to access certain leave entitlements in addition to workers compensation (refer to relevant industrial instruments).
- All monies that the worker is entitled to under the workers compensation legislation will be passed on to that worker as soon as practicable after the insurer notifies the employer of those monies. (Note: it is an offence to refuse or to delay passing on monies with a fine of up to \$5,500 – current at time of printing).
- The employer may allow a worker who is injured and had been scheduled for higher duties or a training program, to continue to do so, provided that the tasks of the higher duties or training program are consistent with medical restrictions.

- The employer may allow a worker who is injured and who is scheduled for a performance appraisal, to continue with that appraisal.
- Every endeavour should be made to resolve any disagreement about the return to work program through discussions amongst the key parties. These could include the return to work coordinator, the injured worker, the treating doctor, the insurer and the supervisor/manager. The discussion may require informal consultation, involvement of the workplace occupational health and safety committee, or it could require the creation of a new workplace consultative arrangement.
- An approved workplace rehabilitation provider, if not already involved, can be utilised to assist in resolving disagreements.
- If there is disagreement about suitable duties or fitness for work, referral to an injury management consultant can be organised through the insurer.
- Disputes regarding the treatment provided, including the need for ongoing treatment, can be referred for a second opinion. Independent consultants assess, for example physiotherapy, osteopathy, chiropractic, psychological and remedial massage treatment and independent doctors can assess medical treatment being offered or provided.
- If the parties are unable to reach agreement, advice can be sought from the WorkCover Assistance Service on 13 10 50.
- If a worker's compensation claim is disputed, the worker or employer may seek resolution through the Workers Compensation Commission. This includes disputes relating to an injury management plan, a return to work plan and suitable duties (see Appendix H).

**Example of an in-house policy for solving problems about return to work**

*Where return to work problems arise all parties will work towards resolution and a mutually acceptable outcome using strategies such as;*

- *negotiation between the return to work team including the injured worker, their union representative, employer representative, nominated treating doctor and insurer*
- *contact with the insurer for advice on other available resources such as injury management consultant, workplace rehabilitation provider, WorkCover vocational programs.*
- *involvement of a person e.g. injury management consultant, workplace rehabilitation provider, mediator to assist in liaison between the parties and problem solving.*

*Where resolution cannot be achieved the worker and employer may seek further assistance by contacting:*

- *WorkCover's Claims Assistance Service telephone 13 10 50*
- *their union or Unions NSW*
- *an employer association.*

### (vii) Checklist for a workplace return to work program

The following checklist will assist employers to ensure they are meeting their obligations under the *NSW Workplace Injury Management and Workers Compensation Act 1998*. It reflects the key policies and procedures outlined in this guideline.

Evidence that the systems or processes are actually used in the workplace may be verified through:

- documents
- records
- discussion with personnel.

**3. Consulting with workers and, where applicable, unions**

- a) Strategies to develop the return to work program in consultation with workers and any union representing those workers.
- b) Strategies to ensure injured workers are informed about their rights and obligations.
- c) Evidence of consultation and agreement eg signatures of senior management and senior worker representatives.

**4. Early commencement of injury management and return to work**

- a) The return to work program describes procedures for:
  - i) workers to report injuries as soon as possible to their employer
  - ii) employer to notify the insurer of injuries within 48 hours of employer becoming aware of the injury
  - iii) return to work coordinator to gain written consent from injured worker to obtain, use and disclose injury management information
  - iv) return to work coordinator to make contact with nominated treating doctor and injured worker to assist in the development of the injury management plan and return to work plan.

**5. Providing suitable duties** (for more details, see section 4. (v) of these Guidelines)

- a) The return to work program describes the employer's policy and procedures for identifying and providing suitable duties including for example:
  - i) suitable duties are consistent with the injured worker's capacity and medical restrictions
  - ii) suitable duties are meaningful and productive
  - iii) suitable duties are agreed with all relevant parties and written in an individual return to work plan
  - iv) suitable duties are time limited and include review dates, representing a graded return to pre-injury hours/duties
  - v) changes to suitable duties are initiated in consultation with all parties.
  - vi) circumstances under which suitable duties cannot be provided
- b) The return to work program describes procedures to assist an injured worker find alternative employment if they cannot return to their pre-injury job.

**6. Returning to work not to disadvantage injured workers**

- a) The return to work program describes procedures to ensure that workers are not disadvantaged.
- b) Workers are not to be dismissed within six months of becoming unfit for employment as a result of a work-related injury.
- c) The return to work program describes strategies for preventing and resolving disputes regarding suitable duties including the use of rehabilitation providers, injury management consultants and the WorkCover Assistance Service.

## 5. RETURN TO WORK COORDINATORS

The return to work coordinator is a key person in the return to work process and acts as the link with all of the parties involved. The role involves identifying the needs of the injured workers, understanding any constraints on the employer, and facilitating teamwork between the worker, employer, insurer and treating health professionals to develop and implement a return to work plan. To fulfill this role the coordinator should be familiar with, and have regular access to, all areas of the workplace, and to staff and supervisors with whom it may be necessary to discuss suitable duties.

Every Category 1 employer must designate a return to work coordinator, who must attend WorkCover approved training. The coordinator is to be someone employed by the employer, or someone engaged specifically for that purpose. Employers can enter into shared arrangements for employing a return to work coordinator.

Employers with multiple workplaces often designate staff at the sites to assist the return to work coordinator with the planning of return to work, including the provision and monitoring of suitable duties. These personnel should be assisted to carry out their functions through a formal system of advice and training.

The return to work coordinator must hold:

- a WorkCover certificate of attendance at the WorkCover approved two-day course  
*Introduction to Return to Work Coordination*
- or
- a WorkCover certificate of attendance at a two-day WorkCover approved training  
course for rehabilitation coordinators that was conducted prior to February 1995
- or
- a letter from WorkCover's Provider Services Branch agreeing to exempt the return to work coordinator from the requirement to participate in WorkCover approved training.

The role of the coordinator in return to work planning and management of injured workers is to be outlined in the employer's return to work program. Duties should include:

- developing and implementing the return to work program, educating the workforce, keeping injury and return to work statistics and developing policies to improve systems
- providing information on the return to work process and associated workers compensation benefits to injured workers
- obtaining or sighting the injured worker's consent before obtaining or releasing information about the worker's return to work
- determining the injured worker's needs by discussion with the worker, the nominated treating doctor and other treatment practitioners
- working with the insurer as they develop an injury management plan for the injured worker
- identifying suitable duties and assisting the injured worker to return to work as soon as possible
- preparing a return to work plan (see template at Appendix E of these Guidelines) in consultation with key parties that documents suitable duties and work restrictions
- referring to an approved workplace rehabilitation provider as needed

- being the focal point for all contact relating to the injured worker. Most contact will be with the worker, their supervisor, nominated treating doctor, insurer, rehabilitation provider and union
- coordinating and monitoring progress in treatment, rehabilitation provider services and return to work plans
- assisting in the redeployment of injured workers (either internally or externally) into suitable employment when an injured worker cannot return to pre-injury duties
- collecting information on locally based resources in the community, including bilingual resources, and making this information available to injured workers where necessary
- maintaining and managing confidential case notes and records in line with relevant legislation and guidelines (refer to Guidelines for confidentiality of injury management information at Appendix C).

The role does not include decision making about claim liability or treatment as this is the insurer's responsibility.

**Return to work coordinators require the following skills:**

- ability to develop and review a return to work program consistent with workplace requirements and the insurer's injury management program
- ability to implement policy and procedures of the return to work program and coordinate the training of staff
- excellent written and verbal communication skills, including negotiation and listening skills
- conflict resolution skills
- ability to implement and explain the *Workplace Injury Management and Workers Compensation Act 1998*, the *Workers Compensation Act 1987* and any relevant regulations and guidelines
- ability to identify suitable duties, consistent with section 43A of the *Workers Compensation Act 1987*
- ability to develop and implement return to work plans for individual workers
- decision making skills
- ability to effectively disseminate information to all relevant parties
- case and caseload management skills
- organisational and time management skills
- ability to assess personal strengths and weaknesses and identify when professional provider services are required.

For employers who wish to employ a return to work coordinator with formal qualifications the following are recommended:

- health professionals such as occupational therapists, physiotherapists, rehabilitation counsellors, exercise physiologists, nurses or psychologists with workplace rehabilitation experience
- individuals with human resources or occupational health and safety qualifications who have workplace rehabilitation experience and an understanding of the role and expertise of health professionals involved in workplace rehabilitation.

## 6. ENGAGED RETURN TO WORK COORDINATOR ARRANGEMENTS

The following guidelines cover situations where the return to work coordinator is not an employee of the Category 1 employer but has been engaged for that purpose. Engaging a return to work coordinator can include:

- a shared arrangement between two or more employers who establish a single return to work program and engage a person to be a return to work coordinator on a shared basis for the members of the group.
- the return to work coordinator is not an employee of the employer but has been engaged under another type of work arrangement (eg through a labour hire company or contract arrangement). For all intents and purposes the return to work coordinator will be like an employee, apart from the hiring arrangement.

Employers wishing to engage a return to work coordinator (either as an alternative hiring arrangement or on a shared basis) need to provide WorkCover with a copy of their return to work program and be able to demonstrate that:

- workers will not be disadvantaged
- the return to work coordinator has appropriate qualifications and experience
- in a shared arrangement, the employers have a common interest. An example of common interest could be employers in the same industry, or in the same geographical location such as an industrial park or office complex
- the shared or engaged arrangements will provide improvements in the provision of return to work services
- the return to work program is formally reviewed every two years, with the amended program lodged with WorkCover.

### **Qualifications, experience and role of the engaged return to work coordinator**

When a Category 1 employer engages a return to work coordinator under shared arrangements, or through another type of work arrangement, it is essential that injured workers and employers receive a service that is equal or superior to the usual arrangements for employers. For this reason, an engaged return to work coordinator must have the knowledge and skills to fulfill all the duties of a return to work coordinator as outlined in these guidelines. They must have significant experience in workplace rehabilitation preferably as a return to work coordinator and have completed training in a WorkCover approved *Introduction to Return to Work Coordination* course. It is preferable that they have tertiary qualifications.

The cost of an engaged return to work coordinator is not a claims cost.

Employers will need to obtain WorkCover approval prior to entering into a shared arrangement or engaging a return to work coordinator who is not an employee. For more information, phone the WorkCover Provider Services Branch on 1800 801 905.

**Shared return to work coordinators for Category 2 employers**

There is no requirement for Category 2 employers to appoint a return to work coordinator, however, employer associations and unions may establish shared return to work coordinator arrangements to assist smaller employers (Category 2 employers) to fulfill their obligations.

Where a shared return to work coordinator is used by a Category 2 employer they must:

- have training and experience as specified in these guidelines for shared return to work coordinators
- undertake the duties specified in these guidelines for return to work coordinators.
- be registered with WorkCover to undertake these duties for a specific industry or geographical area. For more information, phone the WorkCover Provider Services Branch on 1800 801 905.

## 7. APPENDICES

### APPENDIX A

#### GLOSSARY OF INJURY MANAGEMENT TERMS

##### **Approved medical specialists**

Approved medical specialists are senior specialists with a sound knowledge of the NSW workers compensation system and workplace-based injury management. They are appointed by the Workers Compensation Commission to assess disputes about medical issues. There are two types of approved medical specialists:

- those who help to resolve disputes about general medical issues regarding the worker's condition, such as cause, treatment options or fitness for employment
- those who help resolve disputes about the evaluation of permanent impairment.  
(Refer to the Commission's website [www.wcc.nsw.gov.au](http://www.wcc.nsw.gov.au))

##### **Approved workplace rehabilitation provider**

An organisation approved by WorkCover to provide injured workers with specific rehabilitation services to assist them in return to work. Rehabilitation providers are staffed with occupational health professionals such as occupational therapists, physiotherapists, rehabilitation counsellors, exercise physiologists, psychologists and nurses with occupational health experience (refer to WorkCover's publication *Approval of workplace rehabilitation providers within the new workers compensation system – general guide*).

##### **Injury management consultant**

Injury management consultants (IMCs) are registered medical practitioners experienced in occupational injury and workplace-based rehabilitation. IMCs are facilitators who will assist insurers, employers, workers and treating doctors find solutions to the problems in complex return to work plans and injury management. IMCs are not involved in the treatment of an injured worker, nor do they provide any opinion on the current treatment regime.

Referral to an IMC should be considered when the following situations arise: confused goals, complexity of injury or workplace environment; poor communication between insurer/ employer and nominated treating doctor; perceived conflict between the nominated treating doctor's recommendations and the workplace requirements; disagreement about the suitability of duties offered to an injured worker (refer to WorkCover publication *Guidelines for the appointment and functions of injury management consultants*).

##### **Independent medical examiner**

An independent medical examiner is a specialist medical practitioner with qualifications relevant to the treatment of the injured worker's injury but who is not in a treating relationship with the worker. A referral for an independent medical examination is only appropriate when information from the treating

medical practitioner(s) is inadequate, unavailable or inconsistent and where the referrer has been unable to resolve the problem directly with these practitioners (refer to WorkCover publication *Guidelines on independent medical examinations and reports*).

### **Injury management plan**

Section 42 of the *Workplace Injury Management and Workers Compensation Act 1998* states that:

‘An injury management plan is a plan for coordinating and managing those aspects of injury management that concern the treatment, rehabilitation and retraining of an injured worker, for the purpose of achieving a timely, safe and durable return to work for a particular worker.’

Within three days of notification of a significant injury to a worker, the insurer will contact the worker, the employer and the treating doctor. In the time set out in the insurer’s injury management program, the insurer will subsequently develop an injury management plan (which should be completed no more than 20 working days after notification).

### **Injury management program**

An injury management program is a coordinated and managed program that integrates all aspects of injury management including treatment, rehabilitation, retraining, claims management and employment management practices. The purpose of injury management is to achieve a timely, safe and durable return to work for the injured worker.

Section 43 of the 1998 Act states that each insurer must have an injury management program. The insurer must ensure that each employer is aware of this program and the employer’s obligations under the program. The employer’s return to work program must be consistent with their insurer’s injury management program.

### **Return to work plan**

When a worker is to return to work on suitable duties with restrictions, the employer/return to work coordinator or rehabilitation provider must develop and document a return to work plan in consultation with all parties. This plan must be regularly monitored and reviewed by the return to work coordinator or provider. Medical restrictions, suitable duties, hours worked, supervision arrangements, treatment times and review dates must be clearly outlined in the return to work plan.

### **Return to work program**

Section 52 of the *Workplace Injury Management and Workers Compensation Act 1998* states that:

‘An employer must establish a return to work program with respect to policies and procedures for the rehabilitation (and, if necessary, vocational re-education) of any injured workers of the employer. An employer’s return to work program must not be inconsistent with the injury management program of the employer’s insurer and is of no effect to the extent of any such inconsistency.’

Therefore a workplace return to work program only satisfies the requirements of the 1998 Act where there is no inconsistency with the insurer's injury management program.

Any return to work program must be in accordance with these guidelines.

The Act requires that employers develop their return to work programs in consultation with their workers and any industrial union of employees representing them. Return to work programs must be in writing and be displayed in the workplace.

Experience has shown that successful return to work requires all parties to follow the procedures agreed to by employers, their workers, and where applicable, any relevant unions.

### **Serious incidents**

Some examples of a serious incident as listed under clause 344 of the *Occupational Health and Safety Regulation 2001* are:

- an incident where there has been a fatality
- an incident where there has been a serious injury or illness, such as when a person:
  - has a limb amputated
  - is placed on a life-support system
  - loses consciousness
  - is trapped in machinery or a confined space
  - has burns
- an incident where there is an immediate threat to life such as major damage to machinery or buildings, or the collapse of an excavation.

### **Significant injury**

Significant injury means a workplace injury that is likely to result in the worker being incapacitated for work for a continuous period of more than 7 days, whether or not any of those days are work days and whether or not the incapacity is total or partial or a combination of both (refer to section 42(1) of the 1998 Act).

### **Vocational retraining**

Retraining under section 53 is considered when the injured worker is unable, because of their injury, to return to the same or a similar job with either the pre-injury employer or a different employer.

Retraining is considered when assessments conducted by the rehabilitation provider/return to work coordinator have determined that the worker has no marketable transferable skills to seek and secure suitable alternative employment. It provides opportunities for workers to gain qualifications to enable them to continue in productive employment (refer to WorkCover guide *Retraining of injured workers*).

The cost of retraining injured workers under section 53 of the NSW *Workplace Injury Management and Workers Compensation Act 1998* is excluded from the worker's claim cost for the purpose of premium calculation.

**Work Trial**

The Work Trial Program is a voluntary agreement between a host employer, an injured worker, a rehabilitation provider and WorkCover NSW. It involves short-term placement of an injured worker with an employer other than the employer responsible for his/her injury. The purpose of this placement is to either provide a suitable work environment for increasing work capacity or to increase the worker's transferable skills with a view to gaining permanent employment.

The maximum period of time in a Work Trial available to an injured worker is 12 weeks. Under exceptional circumstances WorkCover can approve an extension of time where there is a probability of placement in durable employment at the completion of the Work Trial (refer to WorkCover publication *Work Trial guidelines*).

**WorkCover Claims Assistance Service**

The Claims Assistance Service (CAS) provides assistance to injured workers and employers with enquiries about workers compensation and injury management. The service provides information about injury and accident notifications, making a claim, entitlements and the dispute resolution process. The aim of the service is to prevent an issue from turning into a dispute that needs to be addressed by the Workers Compensation Commission.

The telephone number of the WorkCover Assistance Service is 13 10 50.

**Workers Compensation Commission**

The Workers Compensation Commission is an independent statutory tribunal within the justice system in New South Wales to resolve workers compensation disputes between injured workers and employers, eg disputes about weekly compensation for loss of income, payment of medical expenses and compensation for permanent impairment/pain and suffering. It provides a single place to help parties come to agreement about a dispute (conciliation) or, when needed, will make a decision about a dispute (arbitration).

# APPENDIX C

## GUIDELINES FOR CONFIDENTIALITY OF INJURY MANAGEMENT INFORMATION

### Introduction

These Guidelines have been developed with a view to balancing the employer's and insurer's need for information with the injured worker's right to privacy. They establish policy and procedures for return to work coordinators and approved workplace rehabilitation providers in relation to the confidentiality of injury management information involving injured workers.

### What is injury management information?

Injury management information is any information that involves the treatment, rehabilitation, retraining, claims management and employment management practices that are directed to assisting an injured worker to return to work.

It includes:

- file notes, letters, faxes and return to work plans completed by the return to work coordinator
- treating doctor assessment and reports
- specialist doctor assessment and reports if the injured worker was referred to the specialist by the treating doctor.
- approved workplace rehabilitation provider documents such as:
  - referral/approval for workplace rehabilitation service
  - approved rehabilitation provider plans
  - approved rehabilitation provider progress reports
  - invoices for workplace rehabilitation services
  - return to work plans
  - injury management consultant reports.

### Injury management information does not include:

- section 40 assessments
- copies of independent medical examiner reports initiated by the insurer
- insurance company print-outs of claims estimates and premium costs
- common law and legal proceedings.

## POLICY

### Confidentiality of information

All injury management information concerning an injured worker is confidential. Staff with access to such information are to be made aware that it is confidential and should not be discussed with or shown to or read by anyone who is not directly involved in the worker's return to work.

Section 243 of the 1998 Act, the *Federal Privacy Act 1988*, the National Privacy Principles and the *NSW Health Records and Information Privacy Act 2002* apply to the information collected and used for the purposes of handling a worker's claim. In relation to workers compensation claims, medical advice must be kept confidential and information released to other parties only on a "need to know" basis eg medical information would only be released by an insurer to an employer if it was relevant to an injured worker's return to work.

### Procedures

#### 1. Access to the return to work file

- a) It is recommended that return to work coordinators maintain a case file on all workers who require assistance to return to work. The case file is a record of the case management of an individual injured worker. Employers should ensure that access to an injured worker's return to work file by people within their organisation is restricted to those with a legitimate need to know. Access should be confined to relevant documents on the case file and limited to:
- those who have a direct responsibility for coordinating, monitoring or providing return to work services to the injured worker, and
  - those involved in providing clerical and administrative support to these personnel.

Examples of people with a legitimate need to know may therefore include the:

- return to work coordinator
  - worker's immediate supervisor
  - supervisor of the area in which suitable duties have been identified
  - occupational physician/workplace medical officer
  - occupational health nurse
  - worker's compensation case manager or personnel officer handling workers compensation claims.
- b) Most private sector employers are subject to the *Federal Privacy Act 1988*. State and Commonwealth government organisations are also subject to Freedom of Information legislation. These Acts are to be read in conjunction with these guidelines.
- c) Employers should ensure that access to selected documents on the case file by people who need to know is limited to information that is relevant to their area of responsibility for the worker. For example, the worker's immediate supervisor may need information relating to the worker's return to work plan but would not need detailed medical information.

- d) The employer should give the worker access to the return to work file and a copy of any injury management information on request unless there is an exception as outlined in the *Federal Privacy Act 1988*.

These exceptions include, for example, that the information relates to existing or anticipated legal proceedings between the organisation and the individual, contains information about or from others, or would prejudice an investigation of possible unlawful activity (fraud).

National Privacy Principle 6.5 in the *Federal Privacy Act 1988* provides that if a person establishes that the personal information is not accurate then the organisation must take reasonable steps to correct the information.

- e) If an employer receives a request from the worker for a health report, the author of the report should be contacted before it is released (refer to the National Privacy Principle 6.1(b) in the *Federal Privacy Act 1988*).

## 2. Obtaining or releasing injury management information

- a) The WorkCover medical certificate includes a section for the worker to sign, giving consent to the nominated treating doctor, the employer, the insurer, other treating practitioners, rehabilitation providers and WorkCover NSW to exchange information for the purpose of managing the worker's injury and compensation claim.
- b) The employer is a party to this consent and can release information to the relevant parties as specified on the medical certificate.
- c) In the context of the workplace, however, it is appropriate for the employer to review and discuss the relevance and nature of information to be exchanged with the injured worker. This facilitates communication and ensures a clear understanding by all parties.
- d) To ensure the informed consent of the injured worker and that all parties involved in the return to work are included, consent should be obtained by having the worker sign an 'Information Consent Form' (see Appendix D). If necessary, interpreter services may be used to assist the injured worker.
- e) The worker's consent to the employer obtaining or releasing information may be withdrawn at any time. However, workers should be advised that, if consent is withdrawn, return to work may not proceed and it may affect the worker's entitlements to workers compensation benefits.
- f) Employers and providers may only release information concerning individual injured workers for research purposes with the prior written permission of both the worker and WorkCover NSW. For more information, phone the WorkCover Provider Services Branch on 1800 801 905.

## 3. Management of records

- a) Employers should protect return to work files, including electronically stored information, from unauthorised access, interference, misuse, loss and theft. Consideration should be given to lockable filing cabinets, password secured computer systems, and secure arrangements for any transfer of files.

- b) An employer should keep workers' return to work files separate from other personnel records, as personnel records are often accessed by people other than those specified in point 1(a) above.

#### **4. Storage of closed records**

The confidentiality of information in files where return to work is completed and the case/claim is closed, should also be protected. It is recommended that these records be properly stored, secured and retained for a minimum period of seven years.

#### **5. Transmission of information**

Where information is transmitted electronically (eg. by fax) care should be taken to protect the confidentiality of the information. For example, prior to faxing information, telephone the recipient to arrange for its collection immediately after transmission.

## APPENDIX F

### **WORKERS COMPENSATION ACT 1987 – SECTION 43A**

#### **43A Suitable employment**

(1) For the purposes of sections 38, 38A and 40: suitable employment, in relation to a worker, means employment in work for which the worker is suited, having regard to the following:

- (a) the nature of the worker's incapacity and pre-injury employment,
- (b) the worker's age, education, skills and work experience,
- (c) the worker's place of residence,
- (d) the details given in the medical certificate supplied by the worker,
- (e) the provisions of any injury management plan for the worker,
- (f) any suitable employment for which the worker has received rehabilitation training,
- (g) the length of time the worker has been seeking suitable employment,
- (h) any other relevant circumstances.

(2) In the case of employment provided by the worker's employer, suitable employment includes:

- (a) employment in respect of which:
  - (i) the number of hours each day or week that the worker performs work, or
  - (ii) the range of duties the worker performs, is suitably increased in stages (in accordance with a rehabilitation plan or return-to-work plan or otherwise), and
- (b) if the employer does not provide employment involving the performance of work duties suitable training of a vocationally useful kind provided:
  - (i) by the employer at the workplace or elsewhere, or
  - (ii) by any other person or body under arrangements made with the employer, but only if the employer pays an appropriate wage or salary to the worker in respect of the time the worker attends the training concerned.

(3) However, in any such case, suitable employment does not include:

- (a) employment that is merely of a token nature and does not involve useful work having regard to the employer's trade or business, or
- (b) employment that is demeaning in nature, having regard to subsection (1) (a) and (b) and to the worker's other employment prospects.

(4) A worker is to be regarded as suitably employed if:

- (a) the worker's employer provides the worker with, or the worker obtains, suitable employment, or (b) the worker has been reinstated to the worker's former employment under Part 7 of Chapter 2 of the Industrial Relations Act 1996.



## APPENDIX H

### DISPUTES ABOUT RETURN TO WORK

Once all “in house” attempts to resolve problems about return to work have been exhausted, a dispute can be referred to the Workers Compensation Commission (section 306 of the 1998 Act).

Such an action must be considered in the context of the objectives of the Commission, in particular the obligation to provide a timely and effective dispute resolution service in relation to the worker’s entitlements under the workers compensation legislation, including, return to work disputes.

#### **Registrar’s powers to deal with return to work disputes**

Paraphrasing the legislation, the Registrar may deal with the dispute:

- a) by conciliating in connection with the dispute (to bring the parties to agreement) having proper regard to relevant entitlements and obligations under the *Workers Compensation Acts*), or
- b) by directing that an injury management consultant or other suitably qualified person (paid for by the employer) conduct a workplace assessment in connection with the dispute, or
- c) by referring the dispute to the Authority, or
- d) by making a recommendation.

The Registrar may refer the dispute to the Commission (that is an Arbitrator) for determination if a party rejects any recommendation made.

#### **Employer’s safeguards**

Section 309 provides an employer with some safeguards at a Registrar’s hearing of all work injury management disputes, including return to work disputes, so that the best solution can be reached:

- an employer may admit liability without breaching the terms of its insurance policy, and
- whatever the employer admits or says at work injury management or return to work teleconferences cannot be used against the employer in any other matter before the Commission.

#### **Steps in the Commission for commencing and conducting all work injury management disputes, including return to work disputes**

##### **Step 1 - Application to the Commission**

A worker, employer, or insurer/scheme agent can commence proceedings in the Commission by lodging an Application to Resolve a Workplace Injury Management Dispute (Form 6).

##### **Step 2**

Complete the Application (Form 6) and attach to the Application the following documents:

- name of contact person and telephone number for the teleconference
- a document setting out the relief sought

- a detailed statement by the Applicant setting out the history and full details of the following, so far as they are relevant to the return to work dispute:
  - the alleged failure to provide or perform work duties
  - how the injury management plan has not been followed
  - how the return to work plan has not been followed
- all injury management plans
- all return to work plans
- all workplace assessment reports
- medical certificates certifying the worker's limitations for work duties and the period of incapacity
- all medical reports about the worker's capacity for work duties including reports from injury management consultants
- any other information pertinent to the dispute and which is to be relied on
- any investigative report relevant to the return to work dispute.

Do not lodge any X-ray, ultrasound or MRI films or scans with the Commission (Rule 14.1(4)).

### **Step 3**

The Applicant lodges only one (1) Application with all the documents attached in the Commission. The Commission does not issue sealed copies.

### **Step 4**

On the same day as lodging the Application in the Commission, a copy of the Application with all the documents must be sent to the other party.

- If the worker is lodging the Application against the employer, the worker must send a copy of the Application and attached documents not only to the employer but also the employer's insurer (except a self insurer);
- If the employer/insurer is lodging the Application it must send a copy of the Application and attached documents to the worker.

### **Step 5 – The Reply**

The Respondent has 7 days after receiving the Application to lodge a Reply with the Commission and to send a copy to the Applicant. While there is no specified form for a Reply, the Commission's Form 1B can be adapted.

The following documents must be attached to the Reply if they are not already attached to the Application:

- name of contact person and telephone number for the teleconference
- a detailed statement by the Respondent setting out the history and full details of the following, so far as they are relevant to the return to work dispute
- the alleged failure to provide or perform work duties
- how the injury management plan has or has not been followed

- how the return to work plan has or has not been followed
- all injury management plans
- all return to work plans
- all workplace assessment reports
- medical certificates certifying the worker's capacity for work and the period of incapacity
- all medical reports about the worker's capacity for work duties including reports from injury management consultants
- any other pertinent information that is to be relied on
- any investigative report relevant to the return to work dispute.

#### **Step 6 - Procedure in the Commission**

When the Registrar receives a Form 6 Application it will be registered and given a matter number and sent to one of the Registrar's Delegates for action. The parties are to contact the Registry on tel: 1300 368 040 to obtain the matter number.

Prescribed procedures for the production of documents under the *Workers Compensation Commission Rules 2006* do not have application to these disputes.

#### **Step 7 - Teleconference:**

The Registrar will usually schedule a telephone conference within 14 days of receipt of the dispute Application and will notify all the parties of the scheduled date and, if the Registrar thinks it is necessary, will request further information from the parties.

The employer, the insurer and the worker, must attend and participate in the teleconference.

#### **Step 8**

When the Respondent is notified of the teleconference the Reply must be lodged as a matter of urgency, if not already lodged.

#### **Step 9 – What happens at the teleconference**

All the parties will be connected by phone by the Registrar on the telephone numbers supplied.

All the parties present, irrespective of the presence of legal representation, will be encouraged to participate in a full and frank discussion of all the issues in dispute, any relevant background to the dispute and to make suggestions about how the dispute can be resolved to achieve a return to work.

#### **Referral to an Injury Management Consultant or other suitably qualified person**

If the dispute cannot be resolved between the parties at the teleconference the Registrar may, on the Registrar's own motion, or at the request of either or both parties refer the dispute to a WorkCover approved injury management consultant (IMC) or other suitably qualified person, who will conduct a workplace assessment and an assessment of the worker's capacity for work.

Both parties will be given an opportunity to make submissions or raise specific questions to be sent to the IMC or other assessor by the Registrar.

Rule 9.7 of the Workers Compensation Commission Rules 2006 sets out the information that will be contained in the Registrar's Direction to the IMC. The Registrar will choose the IMC, make the arrangements for the workplace assessment in consultation with the parties, and send the Direction to the IMC with all the documents lodged by both parties together with any submissions. The parties will be advised of the date and place of the assessment and the medical examination.

**Step 10 - Time frame for workplace assessment – rule 9.7 of the Commission Rules:**

The IMC must contact the parties and arrange the assessment as soon as practicable, but not more than 7 days after receiving the Registrar's Direction.

After conducting the workplace assessment and examination of the worker the IMC will submit a detailed report and recommendation, as soon as practicable, but not more than 7 days after the assessment.

The Registrar will forward the IMC's report to all parties and give the parties an opportunity to make any submissions as to why the Registrar should not issue a Recommendation in the terms stated by the IMC.

**Step 11**

If referral is made to an IMC, or other suitably qualified person, a further teleconference may be scheduled to consider any recommendations contained in the report before the Registrar issues the final Recommendation.

**Step 12 - Registrar's recommendations after the telephone conference (refer to rule 9.7(7))**

After a teleconference and/or an IMC report the Registrar may:

- make a recommendation in the terms of the IMC's recommendation;
- make a recommendation that a party take a necessary or desirable specified action to remedy any failure causing the dispute having regard to section 49 of the 1998 Act for the provision of suitable employment;
- refuse to make a recommendation;
- refer the matter to the Authority, or
- refer the dispute to the Commission.

**Step 13 - Compliance with recommendations of Registrar**

A party has 14 days (or such longer period as the Registrar may allow):

- a) To comply with the recommendation, or
- b) Request the Registrar to refer the dispute to the Commission for determination

If a worker fails to comply with the Registrar's recommendation the worker is not entitled to receive weekly benefits during any period of that failure.

If an employer fails to comply with the Registrar's recommendation the insurer may recover from the employer the amount of weekly benefits paid to the worker during the period of the employer's failure to comply.

**Step 14 - Referral of the dispute to the Commission**

The Registrar may refer a return to work dispute to the Commission (i.e. an arbitrator) for determination:

- If the matter was not resolved following the recommendation of the Registrar;
- On the Registrar's own motion
- At the request of either party within 14 days of the recommendation and if the Registrar thinks fit.

**Step 15 - Powers of the Commission**

If the dispute is referred to the Commission for determination, the Commission may make orders with respect to any matter that can be the subject of a recommendation by the Registrar.


